Investigating the impacts of conditional cash transfers on various child health and educational outcomes in Mexico, Nicaragua and Yemen, determining the long-term effects of family planning and early child health interventions on cognitive development of older children and adolescents, using a randomized experiment in Yemen to test the unitary model of the household and to determine if expenditure patterns differ depending on if money is in the hands of men versus women, exploring the effect of electrification on poverty in Brazil.
