

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BA ECONOMICS MAJOR WITH **INTERNATIONAL EMPHASIS**

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO BOULDER

The Economics Major with International Emphasis is designed for qualified economics majors who have an interest in taking courses with an international perspective both within the Economics Department and in other departments. This program is recommended for Economics majors who are considering careers in international fields, e.g. economic development, international law and diplomacy, international business, or international education and international non-profits. Students completing this program will receive a certificate from the Economics Department upon graduation. Completing this emphasis does not provide a distinctive diploma/transcript.

The International Emphasis may be added to the Economics major track after the student has completed at least two of the following intermediate-level courses (ECON 3070, 3080 and/or 3818), and averages at least a 3.0 GPA in two of the three stated courses. Students interested in adding this emphasis should contact their Economics advisor once they are in compliance with these conditions. All Economics and ancillary courses applied to the emphasis must be completed with grades of C- or better. A student's major GPA must be at or above 3.000 at the time of graduation in order for the emphasis certificate to be awarded.

Students must complete **at least 32 hours of Economics courses** plus **9 hours of international-related ancillary course work** from outside the Economics Department. ECON 1078 and 1088 do not count toward the minimum economics credit requirement, but do count in the Econ major GPA calculation. With presentation of a course syllabus, the Undergraduate Studies Director will consider topically relevant ancillary courses on a case-by-case basis for fulfillment of the required ancillary course work in substitution for those listed below. Please contact your Economics advisor for further assistance. Transfer students must complete at least 6 hours of this ancillary course work at the University of Colorado at Boulder.

I. **REQUIRED ECONOMICS COURSES**

A. Lower Division – Econ. Requirements

ECON 2010 Principles of Microeconomics and ECON 2020 Principles of Macroeconomics (8 hrs.)

Note: Students will *not* receive credit for ECON 2010/2020 and ECON 1000.

Lower Division - Math Requirements*

Choose Option 1 ECON 1078 Math Tools for Economists 1 and ECON 1088 Math Tools for Economists 2 (6 hrs.) **OR**
 one option Option 2 MATH 1071 Finite Mathematics and MATH 1081 Calculus for Social Sciences/Business (6 hrs.) **OR**
 Option 3 MATH 1150 Precalculus Mathematics and MATH 1300 Analytic Geometry and Calculus 1 (9 hrs.) **OR**
 Option 4 Eight hours of mathematics at or above the level of MATH 1300 (MATH 2380 is not applicable)

B. Upper Division Requirements

Take all ECON 3070 Intermediate Microeconomic Theory (3 hrs.)
 ECON 3080 Intermediate Macroeconomic Theory (3 hrs.)
 ECON 3818** Intro. to Economics Statistics with Computer Applications (4 hrs.)
 Choice of: ECON 4818 Intro. to Econometrics (3 hrs.) **OR** ECON 4848 Applied Econometrics (3 hrs.)

* At the time the major is declared, if the student has only completed an equivalent Calculus course and no Finite Math or Precalculus, he/she may elect to either complete an additional quantitative economics course (ECON 4070/4808/4818/4838/4848/4858), in addition to the upper division requirements stated above, or complete an equivalent Calculus II course

**APPM 4520, APPM 4570, CHEN 3010, CVEN 3227, MATH 4520, SOCY 4061 are approved substitutes for ECON 3818. Students are not required to complete a replacement economics course when applying an approved substitute statistics course.

C. International Courses in Economics (6 hrs.)

Choose two ECON 4413 International Trade (3 hrs.)
 or more ECON 4423 International Finance (3 hrs.)
 ECON 4514 Economic History of Europe (3 hrs.)
 ECON 4774 Economic Reform in Developing Countries (3 hrs.)
 ECON 4784 Economic Development (3 hrs.)

Note: 9 hrs. required for those transferring six credits of micro and macro Principles courses.

D. Economics Electives

6 credit hours of 4000-level economics electives.

II. REQUIRED COURSES OUTSIDE Economics

Students must complete 9 hours of upper division course work in other departments. The following is a list of courses in other departments that may be used to satisfy this requirement. Students are responsible for completing the prerequisites needed for the courses they choose. With presentation of a course syllabus, the Undergraduate Studies Director will consider topically relevant courses on a case-by-case basis for fulfillment of the required ancillary business course work in substitution for those listed below. Transfer students must complete at least 6 hours of this ancillary course work at the University of Colorado at Boulder.
