## Janette's Fellowship

To honor Janette Kettmann Klingner's long-time career as a Professor of Bilingual/ Special Education in the School of Education at the University of Colorado Boulder, the Kettmann family has created a fellowship to support doctoral candidates in the completion of their dissertations.

Eligible students must be doctoral candidates enrolled in the Educational Equity and Cultural Diversity program.

Scholarship recipients will be selected annually by the BUENO Center faculty working with the School of Education.

## Research Careers in Educational Equity & Cultural Diversity

The doctoral program in Educational Equity and Cultural Diversity (EECD) offers a course of study devoted to the critical examination of theory, practice, and policy in two major areas: the education of culturally and linguistically diverse students and the education of exceptional children. The program stresses analysis, evaluation, and implementation of educational programs for students who represent diverse learning needs within the public school system. School culture, language policies, and the social and political contexts of schooling are examined across emphases. Policies that affect the assessment, placement, and services provided for exceptional children also are examined.

EECD PhD graduates typically become faculty in schools of education or work as researchers. Other graduates serve in professional positions with state and federal agencies as well as local school districts.

Dr. Klingner devoted her distinguished career to bilingual special education. She was widely known as one of the premier researchers and advocates in this field.

Dr. Klingner's peers have recognized her with numerous awards, including the 2013 Distinguished Researcher Award from the AERA Special Education Research SIG.

Dr. Klingner served in leadership positions in several professional organizations. She was President-Elect of the Council for Exceptional Children and served as Vice-President for the International Academy for Research on Learning Disabilities, of which she was a named fellow. She was an associate editor for the *Journal of Learning Disabilities*, on the editorial boards of 10 other journals, and a past co-editor of the *Review of Educational Research*.
