### Financial Aid and Scholarships for Freshmen and Transfer Students

**T**HE FIRST STEP in applying for financial aid at CU-Boulder is to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), each academic year, after January 1. The FAFSA determines your eligibility for grants, loans, work-study, and need-based scholarships. The most efficient and accurate way to fill out the FAFSA is online at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). Paper versions can be found at high school and college financial aid offices.

The priority deadline for full financial aid consideration at CU-Boulder is April 1, meaning that your FAFSA must be on file in our office by this date. After April 1, CU-Boulder continues to offer aid as long as funds are available. The federal Pell Grant, federal Stafford Loan, or federal PLUS (Parent) Loan are available throughout the academic year.

It is important to submit your admission application to CU-Boulder as early as possible. We cannot process your financial aid application until you are officially admitted.

To expedite the match of your financial aid records with your admission to CU-Boulder, report your social security number on your application for admission.

### Eligibility for Financial Aid

The information you report on your FAFSA is used to determine your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which is calculated by a formula established by federal law. The EFC is an index used to determine how much financial aid (grants, loans or work-study) you are eligible to receive. If your EFC is below a certain number, you'll be eligible for a federal Pell Grant assuming you meet all other eligibility requirements.

The amount of your Pell Grant depends on your EFC and your enrollment status (full time, three-quarter time, half time, or less than half time).

For other aid programs, we will calculate your estimated cost of attendance (tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, transportation, medical, personal, and other eligible costs) and then subtract your EFC, the amount of a federal Pell Grant you are eligible for, and aid you will get from other sources. The result is your remaining financial need:

#### Cost of Attendance

- Expected Family Contribution (EFC)
- Federal Pell Grant Eligibility
- Aid from Other Sources

= **Remaining Financial Need**

Federal aid recipients may not receive need-based aid in excess of their financial need; therefore, the school may be required to cancel or reduce financial aid according to federal guidelines when an overaward exists.

If you have unusual financial circumstances affecting your ability to pay for college, contact the Office of Financial Aid.

### Dependency Status

If you are considered dependent, your parents' income and assets as well as your own must be reported on the FAFSA. If you are independent, you will report only your own income and assets (and those of your spouse, if you are married).

For the 2010-11 academic year, you are independent if at least one of the following applies to you:

- you were born before January 1, 1987
- you are married
- you will enroll in a master's or doctoral program during the 2010-11 school year

- you have children who receive more than half their support from you
- you have dependents other than your children/spouse who live with you and receive more than half of their support from you
- you are a veteran of the U.S. armed forces
- you are currently serving on active duty in the armed forces for other than training purposes
- at any time since you turned age 13, both of your parents were deceased, you were in foster care, or you were a dependent or ward of the court
- you are an emancipated minor as determined by a court in your state of legal residence
- you were in legal guardianship as determined by a court in your state of legal residence
- at any time on or after July 1, 2008, your high school or school district homeless liaison determined that you were an unaccompanied youth who was homeless
- at any time on or after July 1, 2008, the director of an emergency shelter or transitional housing program funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development determined that you were an unaccompanied youth who was homeless.
- at any time on or after July 1, 2008, the director of a runaway or homeless youth basic center or transitional living program determined that you were an unaccompanied youth who was homeless or were self-supporting and at risk of being homeless.

Under unusual circumstances, the Office of Financial Aid can change your dependency status, based on adequate documentation. Contact our office for more information.

## Types of Available Aid

### Grants and Scholarships

Grants and scholarships do not have to be repaid and many are need-based. Submit the FAFSA for consideration for federal, state, and institutional grants or need-based scholarships.

Need-based grants vary and are awarded to low income students. Amounts are determined from your FAFSA results.

Donations from private individuals, corporations, foundations, and the University of Colorado are all funding sources

for scholarships, among others. Scholarships can be based on academic achievement, financial need, affiliation, community service, or any combination of these. If you apply for scholarships that have a financial need requirement, results of your FAFSA must be on file no later than March 1, 2010.

Scholarships are highly competitive at CU-Boulder and most awarded by the Office of Financial Aid require demonstrated financial need. The selection committee also considers academic achievement, honors, leadership, school activities, and service to the community.

The Office of Financial Aid, academic departments, academic programs, clubs, and organizations all provide scholarships on campus. We encourage you to thoroughly search CU-Boulder's website for more information.

### Educational Loans

Submit the FAFSA to be considered for the federal Stafford and Parent PLUS Loans.

**Federal Stafford Loans** are low-interest (fixed 5.6 percent) loans. Subsidized Stafford Loans are offered on the basis of need, which means you will not be charged any interest before you begin repayment. Unsubsidized Stafford Loans are not awarded on the basis of need. You will be charged interest (fixed 6.8 percent) from the time the loan is disbursed until it is paid in full. Repayment on both types of Stafford Loans generally begins six months after you graduate, leave school, or drop below half-time status. Refer to the following chart for federal annual and lifetime aggregate Stafford Loan limits.

**Parent PLUS Loans** are low-interest (fixed 7.9 percent) loans that enable parents who do not have an adverse credit

history to pay the education expense of each child who is a dependent undergraduate student enrolled at least half time. Interest is charged on the loan from the date that the first disbursement is made until the loan is paid in full. Generally, repayment must begin within 60 days after the final loan disbursement for the period of enrollment for which parents borrowed. Deferment options may exist. CU-Boulder participates in the **William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program**. Under the Direct Loan Program, your lender is the U.S. Department of Education. CU-Boulder assists the federal government in administering the Direct Loan Program by distributing the loan application, processing the loan, and disbursing the loan funds. Therefore, students and parents do not apply for loans through banks or other lending institutions.

### Work-Study

Submit the FAFSA for work-study consideration. A variety of jobs are available on and off campus at competitive wages. Jobs are listed in the portal for students once they complete orientation and are enrolled. Access is given to freshmen students after completion of orientation. If you are not awarded work-study, call Student Employment at **303-492-7349** for information about the wait list.

## CU Promise Program

Through the CU Promise Program, CU-Boulder guarantees an award of grants and work-study to cover the student's share of tuition, fees, and estimated book expenses, for students meeting the following criteria:

- Colorado residents entering as first-time freshmen or transferring from a community college with no prior bachelor's degree;
- Students who demonstrate eligibility for a Pell Grant and have a family income at or below 100 percent of the federally established poverty level.

Eligible students must meet all other program requirements by July 1. For more information on the CU Promise Program, refer to the Office of Financial Aid website at [www.colorado.edu/finaid](http://www.colorado.edu/finaid).

## Alternative Student Loans

Alternative student loans are available to students who are not eligible for federal loans or who need additional assistance. These loans are made privately through banks and other financial institutions and are subject to their terms. The best option is to keep your loan debt to a minimum by planning ahead and budgeting carefully. Alternative loans should only be considered after applying for federal student aid and after careful review of how you will manage your total debt upon graduation. ## Student Employment

Studies indicate that students who work part time are as successful academically as those who do not. Generally, freshmen work 8–15 hours a week. The Student Employment Office posts an average of 600 part-time on-campus and off-campus jobs for students who were not awarded work-study. Jobs are posted in the portal for students once they complete orientation and are enrolled. Access is given to freshmen students after completion of orientation. ## Student Work Assistance Program

The Student Work Assistance Program (SWAP) gives students who have a university room and board contract a credit against their housing bill in exchange for hours worked in one of the dining centers. Contact Dining Services at **303-492-6325** for more information.

## Private Scholarships

If you receive a scholarship from an organization outside the university, notify Scholarship Services in the Office of Financial Aid. In addition, we encourage you to write to your donor and express your gratitude.

When a scholarship donor does not specify how to disburse the funds, the financial aid office divides awards of \$1,000 or more equally between the fall and spring semesters. Private scholarships of less than \$1,000 are applied in full to the current semester bill.

To avoid late and service charges, students should ask their donors to mail scholarship checks at least one month prior to the bill payment deadline. If your scholarship check is not received by the bill payment deadline, you should make other arrangements to pay your bill.

In most cases, the combination of all financial aid and scholarships cannot exceed your total cost of attendance. If adjustments are made, a revised award letter is sent to you.

We encourage students to look for private scholarships in a variety of places including the use of online search engines. The following are samples of organizations that commonly have resources available:

- college financial aid offices

- college academic departments
- local libraries
- big businesses (consumer products, restaurant chains, department stores, etc.)

## 2010–11 Checklist

- Apply for scholarships online at [www.colorado.edu/finaid](http://www.colorado.edu/finaid) by the March 1, 2010, deadline. You do not have to be admitted to CU prior to applying for scholarships.
- Complete the 2010–11 FAFSA online at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). April 1, 2010, priority date. For scholarships requiring FAFSA results, your FAFSA must be on file no later than March 1, 2010.
- If requested, mail or fax signed copies of the first two pages of your parents' 2009 federal tax return to the financial aid office. Write your name and student identification number on each page.
- If you meet independent requirements as outlined on pages 1–2, submit a signed copy of the first two pages of your 2009 federal tax return.
- Beginning in March 2010, the Office of Financial Aid sends planning letters to admitted freshmen who have applied for financial aid.
- Beginning in April 2010, the Office of Financial Aid sends award letters to students who have submitted the FAFSA and required tax documents.
- Beginning in April 2010, Scholarship Services sends award offers to incoming freshmen with most scholarships finalized by May 1.

## Notification and Acceptance of Your Award Offer

Entering freshmen who submitted a FAFSA and are officially admitted receive a financial aid planning letter. We begin sending these mid-March 2010 through April 2010. The letter shows an early estimate of your financial aid award offer from CU-Boulder. This allows families to receive financial aid information quickly and begin planning for the upcoming academic year.

Upon review of your FAFSA results, we may request additional documentation such as copies of federal tax returns,

citizenship papers, social security cards, and selective service registration. In most cases, we require signed copies of parents' 2009 federal tax returns. If parents' information is not required on the FAFSA, submit a signed copy of the student's 2009 federal tax return. Once the financial aid file is complete, we will send an official award offer beginning in April 2010.

## Additional Information

### Residency (Tuition Classification)

Tuition classification is governed by state law (Colorado Revised Statutes §23-7-101, *et seq.*) and by judicial decisions that apply to all public institutions of higher education in Colorado. The University of Colorado does not have discretion to make exceptions to the rules as defined by state law. Borrowing the Parent PLUS Loan is regarded as parental support on in-state residency petitions. ### Nonresidents

### International Students

Financial aid for international students is generally very hard to find. The cost of an education in the United States is very high, and you must show proof of sufficient funds before being admitted as an international student. In general, there is little financial support available for undergraduate international students.

### Paying Your Bill

### Taxation of Scholarships

According to IRS Publication 970, a scholarship or fellowship is tax free only if you are a candidate for a degree at an educational institution and the grant is a qualified scholarship or fellowship. A qualified scholarship or fellowship is any amount used for tuition, fees, books, supplies, and equipment that is required for the courses at the educational institution. If the terms of the grant require its use for other purposes, such as room and board, or specify that the grant cannot be used for tuition or course-related expenses, the amounts received under the grant are not tax free.

You are encouraged to keep your receipts and copies of university bills. For more information regarding Publication 970, go to [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov), or request one from your tax advisor.

### Tax Credits

### Eligibility for State of Colorado Public Benefits

Effective August 1, 2006, Colorado law (c.r.s. 24-76.5-101) requires all persons 18 years of age or older to provide proof that they are lawfully present in the United States prior to receipt of certain public benefits. For higher education, public benefits include in-state resident tuition rates, the College Opportunity Fund (COF), institutional and state-sponsored financial aid, and any other state-sponsored payments or assistance. A recipient of any such benefits, whether as a Colorado resident or as a non-resident, must comply with the university's verification process or the benefit will be forfeited.

## Scholarship Application Process

The scholarships listed in this booklet require either the Office of Financial Aid Scholarship Services online scholarship application, a separate application for the individual scholarships, or are automatically offered. Refer to each section for instructions and information. Information may change due to fund appropriations, federal regulatory changes, or donor request.

After December 15, 2009, you can begin to apply for scholarships offered by the Office of Financial Aid at **mycoulboulder.colorado.edu**. To access the application you must apply for admission to CU-Boulder. **You may apply for scholarships prior to being admitted to CU.** Students without access to the Internet should call our office for assistance.

**The scholarship application closes at 5:00 P.M. MST on March 1, 2010.** Recognize that we will not offer scholarships to students who are not admitted to the

University of Colorado at Boulder and, unless otherwise noted, students must enroll full time to receive payment.

If you are applying for scholarships that have a financial need requirement, results of your FAFSA must be on file in the financial aid office on March 1. **NOTE:** This is earlier than the financial aid priority deadline of April 1.
