

Origami Networks: The Story of a Smith Hall Artist

Bronwen Sandle, a CU freshman and Smith Hall resident, can fold a paper crane left-handed with her eyes closed. She has folded thousands of origami figures, creating large scale pieces which have appeared in galleries and a competition.

"It's kind of a counterintuitive thing because origami is really small," said Sandle. "Basically what I do is take smaller things and construct them into larger things... it's just taking teeny tiny little elements and building them into something bigger."



Sandle's inspiration comes partly from artist Do Ho Suh's piece *Network*, a net composed of small figurines.

Sandle's fascination with the process of art also inspires her. "The cool thing about origami is that each piece is a part of the process. Each piece is something I made by hand and that I folded and that was a part of my life for a minute."

Art plays an important role in Sandle's life. "All the art I make represents where I am in my life... it's kind of an integral part of art and what it means to be an artist, taking everything you're thinking and feeling and putting it in a visual way."

Currently, Sandle is working on a floral piece made with rice paper and a piece involving cracked limestone in which origami flowers will fill in the cracks.

Sign-Up and Attendance Tracker Policies

Sign-up sheets for events are posted on the bulletin board near the community center (front desk) in Smith. Each will have name and contact information for flock leader(s) leading the event. If, having signed up, you choose not to attend, cross out your name and email the flock leader. Sign-ups end once sheets are taken down. Persons who signed up will be contacted by the flock leader(s) for additional details about the event.

Attendance tracker punches can be had for an event organized by a flock leader or faculty-in-residence, up to one per week.
