Martha Berhane used her Global Grant to study abroad in the Dominican Republic, where she interned with a local NGO.

This gave her practical experience in helping low-income and unemployed families affected by HIV. She also took courses and spent Saturdays as a volunteer math tutor for local children.

"I got a job as an immigration paralegal assistant at a Latino justice center in Washington, D.C.," says Martha. "My study abroad program helped develop my Spanish for the position and taught me about immigration issues—I was inspired to keep working on these issues at home."

Global Grants

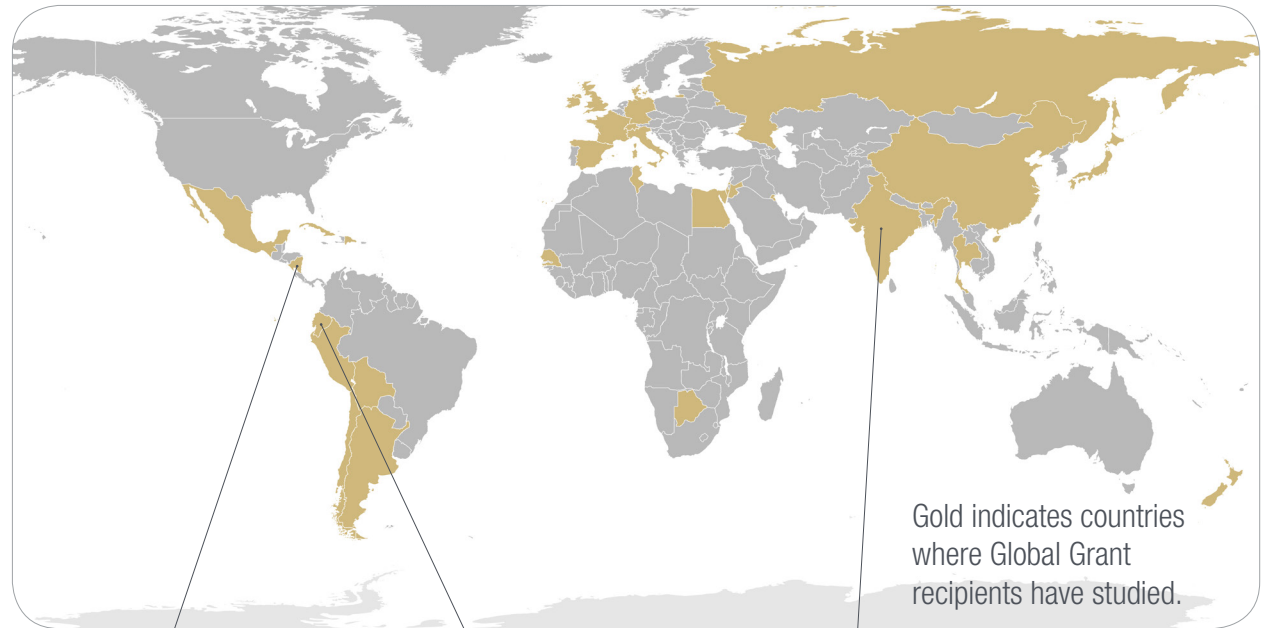
Global Grants are \$1,000 need- and merit-based scholarships for International Affairs majors studying abroad on academically challenging and service-oriented programs.

To date, we have awarded over \$70,000 in Global Grants. Students have used this funding to study international development in Ecuador and India; Arabic language in Amman, Jordan; Chinese language in Beijing, China; public health in Thailand and Botswana; diplomacy in Geneva, Switzerland, and many other topics.
