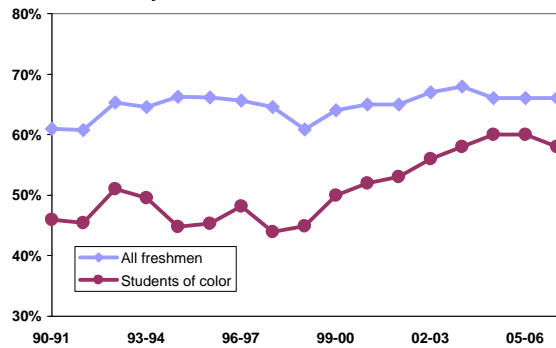
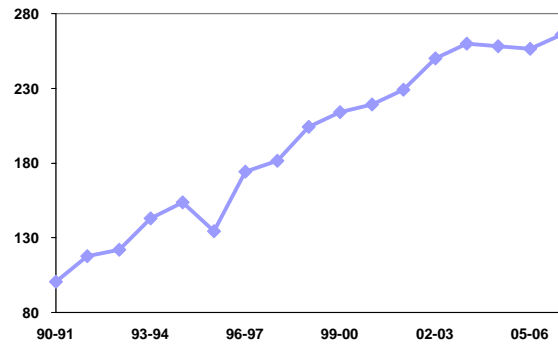

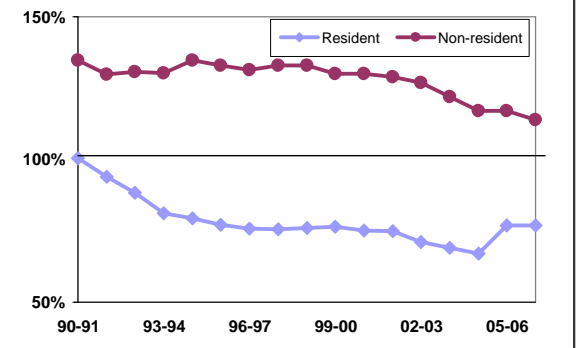
Six-year Freshman Graduation Rates



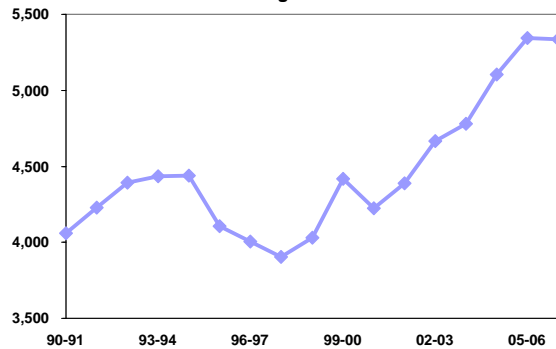
Sponsored Research Awards (in millions)

Bachelor's Degrees Awarded



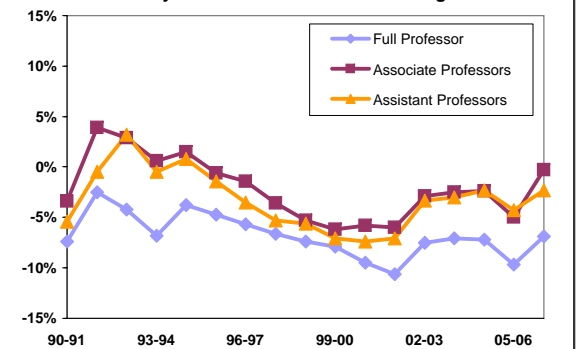
Campus Growth and Other Increases

Six-year freshman graduation rates have been steady at approximately 66%, while the students of color graduation rate increased from 45% in the early 1990's to nearly 60% currently.

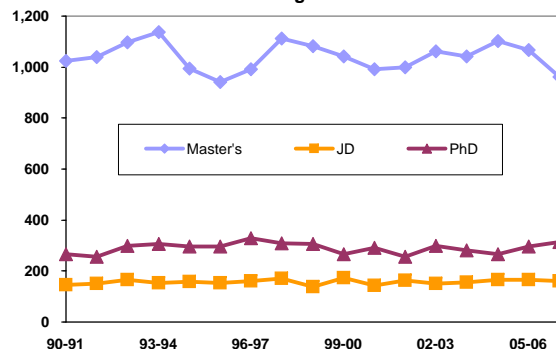
Bachelor's degrees have increased from 4,000 to over 5,300 today, which is reflective of the growing undergraduate population. Graduate and professional degrees awarded have been relatively stable over time, with the average number of graduate and professional degrees awarded at 1,488.

Faculty sponsored research awards have grown 266% from 1991 to present. The campus has maintained approximately \$260M of annual research expenditures for the past two years.

Campus Challenges to Managing Growth

Undergraduate resident tuition as a percent of the Association of American Universities (AAU) public universities, or peers, had been decreasing from 1990-1991 to 2004-2005. In recent years the gap has decreased from the low in 2004-2005 of 67% to 77% in 2006-2007. Non-resident tuition rates are well above the peer average.

During the 1990's, UCB faculty salaries began a ten-year downward trend when compared to the Association of American Universities (AAU) public universities average. This downward trend has reversed in the most recent years, with associated professors near the mean, and both full and assistant professors still below the mean.

State funding in current dollars had been decreasing slightly each year during the 1990's with a large drop in early 2000's. Current State funding per resident student still lags behind pre-cut State funding levels regardless whether adjusted or not for inflation.
