The Department of Philosophy is sponsoring this second colloquium in honor of our recently retired colleague, Bertram Morris. Following the commitments of its namesake, the colloquium is concerned with the philosophical significance of a contemporary social issue. It is our hope that the Morris Colloquia will become annual events of interest both to the University and to the community at large.

Bertram Morris joined the faculty of the University of Colorado in the Fall of 1947. Since then he has been distinguished as a scholar, a teacher, and an active member of the community. His published works include THE AESTHETIC PROCESS, PHILOSOPHICAL ASPECTS OF CULTURE, and INSTITUTIONS OF INTELLIGENCE. He has been a member of the Executive Committee of the American Philosophical Association, a member of the Board of Trustees of the American Society for Aesthetics, a member of the National Council of the American Association of University Professors, a member of the Colorado Federation of Teachers, and a member of the State Board of the Colorado Civil Liberties Union. While at the University of Colorado he has won the Thomas Jefferson Award and the award of Research Lecturer. Throughout his career he has been noted for his teaching, his participation in faculty governance, and for his committed involvement in the social issues of the Boulder Community. He initiated, and for a number of years, directed on a volunteer basis an outreach program which still continues at Manual High School in Denver. He is presently serving as a trustee of the State Colleges and University Consortium of Colorado. In token of their admiration and gratitude his departmental colleagues institute this colloquium.
