**WILLARD GAYLIN, M.D.** is professor of clinical psychiatry at Columbia University. He is also President and co-founder of the Institute of Society, Ethics and the Life Sciences, The Hastings Center, Hastings-on-Hudson, New York. He is the author of numerous books and articles. His most recent book is Feelings: Our Vital Signs (1979).

**ALASDAIR MACINTYRE** is University Professor of Philosophy and Political Science at Boston University. Among his many publications are A Short History of Ethics and Against the Self-Images of the Age: Essays in Ideology and Philosophy. **TOM L. BEAUCHAMP** is professor of ethics in the Joseph and Rose Kennedy Institute of Ethics at Georgetown University. Among his recent articles is "Paternalism and Bio-behavioral Control." He has also edited Ethics and Public Policy and Contemporary Issues in Bioethics (with LeRoy Walters).

**Bioethics: Health and Human Values**

Bertram Morris joined the faculty of the University of Colorado in the Fall of 1947. Since then he has been distinguished as a scholar, a teacher, and an active member of the community. His published works include THE AESTHETIC PROCESS, PHILOSOPHICAL ASPECTS OF CULTURE, and INSTITUTIONS OF INTELLIGENCE. He has been a member of the Executive Committee of the American Philosophical Association, a member of the National Council of the American Association of University Professors, and a member of the State Board of the Colorado Civil Liberties Union. While at the University of Colorado he has won the Thomas Jefferson Award and the award of Research Lecturer. Throughout his career he has been noted for his teaching, his participation in faculty governance, and his committed involvement in the social issues of the Boulder community. He initiated and directed an outreach program which still continues at Manual High School in Denver. He is presently serving as a trustee of the State of Colleges and University Consortium of Colorado. In token of their admiration and gratitude his departmental colleagues have instituted this colloquium.
