This information is preliminary and subject to being updated after all records have been compiled early next week.

Sep. 6. – Eastern Washington Recap:

The first home game of the 2008 season in Folsom Field could best be described as “average” from a police perspective. One spectator was jailed for Obstruction, one person was cited for urinating in public and one was cited for violating a court order. No major incidents were reported.

Sep. 18. – West Virginia:

The West Virginia game is the first night game of the 2008 season. Night games are typically busier from a law enforcement standpoint and this game was no exception. At the time of this release, much of the paperwork from the game is still in the process of being completed and is unavailable. The incidents listed above are the known items from the football game. Additional items will be added on Friday September 19th when this release is updated with complete numbers.

UPDATE Sep. 19, 2008 2:30 PM – After all paperwork was gathered from the game, the number of incidents was updated. There was one person who was arrested and jailed from an incident at the game. Michael Streicher a 26 year old resident of Wilmington, Delaware was arrested for Third Degree Assault against an at-risk victim. Mr. Streicher allegedly struck a 63 year old male in the face with his fist.

Oct. 4. – Texas:

A somewhat blustery fall Saturday evening played host to the first home Big XII football contest of the 2008 season. A 5:10 PM kickoff time contributed to the amount of police activity that took place at the game. The number of incidents was similar to those from the previous game, also a nighttime kickoff.

Oct. 4. – Kansas State:

Family Weekend often sees a lower than average level of police activity at the football game. This Family Weekend was no exception, despite the evening kickoff time, this game was marked by the lowest level of enforcement activity for any night game this season, and rivaling the level of activity of the Eastern Washington game.

Nov. 8. – Iowa State:

The early kickoff time and a smaller crowd are probable reasons that things were relatively quiet for the police at the Iowa State game.

Nov. 15. – Oklahoma State:

The final home game of the 2008 football campaign was also the busiest for the police officers working the game. The numbers of ejections, detox holds, citations and other police activity were season highs. Two individuals who were contacted for being intoxicated were so under the influence of alcohol that they were taken to the hospital for appropriate treatment.

Walter Thomas Rumpf (20 years of age) was contacted by officers for being visibly intoxicated. When contacted he told the officers that he was underage. As the officer was walking him to a processing area to issue a summons for underage alcohol, Rumpf broke free from the officer and a short foot chase ensued. Rumpf was caught and physically resisted arrest, ultimately requiring several officers to control him. Rumpf was arrested for underage possession/consumption of alcohol, resisting arrest and obstructing an officer.

An incident occurred where a 17-year-old female who was being transported to the detox center assaulted another female detox detainee during the transport. Both females were being transported in a Boulder County

Sheriff's Jail Van. The suspect in the assault was ultimately hospitalized due to intoxication. A complete investigation into the assault will be conducted next week, and if appropriate, charges will be filed at that time.
