This information is preliminary and subject to being updated after all records have been compiled early next week.

Sep. 6. – Colorado State Recap:

Information above is a very preliminary accounting of police activity at the CU-CSU game. Formalized statistics should be available on Tuesday or Wednesday, and updating of this information will occur at that time.

“This game reflected the fact that we had a near-capacity crowd at the Stadium. We had a higher number of arrests and summonses issued than typical for a football game,” said Commander Tim McGraw. “Additionally, we had over a dozen transports for medical care, along with several responses by medical personnel to assist people in need attending the game.”

Sep. 19. – Wyoming:

A dramatic reduction in police actions occurred at the CU-Wyoming football game. The number of ejections, and alcohol-related ejections, were virtually half of those encountered at the first home game. “Virtually all the fans really seemed to be into the game, and despite a large crowd, we had fewer issues than we might have anticipated,” said Commander Tim McGraw of the University of Colorado Police Department.

October 17, 2009 - Kansas:

The football game between Colorado and Kansas occurred during Family Weekend at CU. Traditionally police activity during the Family Weekend game is less than average, and preliminary statistics indicate this was the case at this game. In addition to issuing 15 summonses for underage possession/consumption of alcohol, police also cited two persons for marijuana possession, one for theft, one for false reporting, and one for obstruction and resisting. One person was summonsed for Physical Harassment after one of the Kansas coaching staff members complained of pushed or struck at halftime.

Following the game, fans rushed the field. Commander Tim McGraw said, “One fan coming down on the field was hurt when the fan fell on the blacktop at the south end of Folsom Stadium.” The fans on the field “were cooperative when asked to leave following several minutes of celebrating on the field,” according to McGraw/

October 31, 2009- Missouri

A smaller crowd and earlier start time contributed to an overall slower day for police at the CU-Missouri game. Generally games that start earlier have few contacts, ejections, and enforcement action by police. “Since many of our issues are predicated on alcohol consumption, earlier starts results in less consumption and fewer issues,” said Commander Tim McGraw, UCPD spokesperson. “The progression of the game also resulted in many fans leaving early,” said McGraw, “so simply from a numbers stand point we had few people who needed our attention. But despite the lopsided loss, most fans were very well behaved, even if a bit frustrated.”

November 7, 2009- Texas A & M

Police activity at the CU-Texas A&M game was comparable to the prior home football, likely due to the earlier start time and smaller-than-capacity crowd. 29 ejections occurred during the football game, along with 4 summonses for underage alcohol possession, 2 alcohol recovery center admissions, and one full-custody arrest. The arrest was of a non-student male for Disorderly Conduct and Resisting Arrest. “The game itself was a close contest, and this probably contributed to fans being very attentive to an exciting game,” Commander Tim McGraw said.

Some fans rushed on the field for a few moments following the game, but were described by McGraw as being “cooperative” when asked to leave. “They simply wanted to celebrate with the team after the victory, and fortunately no one was hurt,” McGraw said.
