


# A CU-BOULDER SUMMER

Summer at the University of Colorado, Boulder offers students a variety of opportunities for study, individual development, and recreational activity. Summer session scholars can choose from more than 450 courses, allowing progress toward a degree in almost every area of study.

### OUR COURSES COMPLEMENT YOUR INTERESTS

In addition to summer courses that enable students to fulfill specific degree requirements, there are other summer offerings that complement particular areas of interest. For instance, some English and theatre courses are



taught in conjunction with the nationally recognized Colorado Shakespeare Festival held on campus each summer; several environmental biology course field studies are conducted at the University's Mountain Research Station, one of the principal sites in the nation for alpine research; the School of Education offers many graduate courses designed for teachers continuing their education; and

the University's Distinguished Visiting Professor Program offers students the opportunity to take courses from well-known scholars in residence during the summer. Another special offering is the College of Music's annual Colorado Gilbert and Sullivan Festival.

### OUTDOOR EXPLORATION

A focal point of campus recreational activities is CU-Boulder's expansive Recreation Center, one of the finest facilities of its type in the country. Especially popular is the Recreation Center's Outdoor Program, offering mountain sports enthusiasts organized instruction in activities such as backpacking, rock climbing, and rafting.

# THE BOULDER CAMPUS

The University of Colorado, Boulder covers 600 acres of land near the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. The campus includes a total of 160 buildings, most constructed from native sandstone and crowned with red tile roofs in the Rural Italian Renaissance architectural style. Guided walking tours of the Boulder Campus leave Regent Administrative Center 125 each weekday at 11:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. and provide a special introduction to the campus. No advance reservations are necessary.

### A VARIETY OF FIELDS

A major research university with an enrollment of over 20,000 students, CU-Boulder offers a broad curriculum in a variety of fields, ranging from the baccalaureate through postdoctoral levels. The Board of Regents at the University of Colorado reserves the right to establish enrollment levels for all academic areas. # RELATED LOCAL FACILITIES

Many teaching and research programs on the Boulder Campus are closely integrated with other facilities in the Boulder area, including the National Bureau of Standards (NBS), the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR), and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), among others.

#### YEAR-ROUND PROGRAM

The summer session is an integral part of the year-round instructional program at the University of Colorado, Boulder. The University operates on a semester system, with 16-week fall and spring semesters and a 10-week summer session that includes shorter terms (1 to 4, 5, or 8 weeks) scheduled within the



10-week session (for the specific dates of the various 1986 summer terms, see Dates to Remember, page 2).

### CONTINUING EDUCATION

CU's Division of Continuing Education coordinates outreach programs for the Boulder Campus, offering students, other members of the community, and visitors a variety of credit and noncredit courses, workshops, seminars, job training and skills improvement programs, and independent study projects. # BOULDER AND ENVIRONS


Along with the University's academic, cultural, and recreational offerings, the City of Boulder is the scene of a variety of activities. Situated where the Great Plains meet the Rocky Mountains, Boulder—only 20 miles from the Continental Divide

and 30 miles from Denveroffers easy access to spectacular mountain meadows, as well as to the skyscrapers, museums, and shops of metropolitan Denver (population 1.8 million people). Denver can be easily reached by traveling on U.S. 36, a highway also known as the Denver-Boulder Turnpike. Denver's Stapleton International Airport is served by most major air carriers and is located northeast of Denver, about 45 minutes from Boulder. Denver and Boulder are also connected by a public transportation system.

#### **PEAKS AND PRAIRIES**

Boulder, itself over 5,000 feet in elevation, holds magnificent views of both snowcapped peaks and expansive prairies. Boulder County encompasses five ecological zones, from 5,000 feet above sea level (plains, grassland) to 14,000 feet (alpine tundra). Within and near the city limits of Boulder are miles of hiking trails that wind among pines and under the steep faces of the Flatirons, a range of magnificent, almost vertically inclined rock formations that provide a dramatic backdrop to Boulder and the University.



#### A RARE ATMOSPHERE

The City of Boulder, an engaging community of 80,000 people, combines a cosmopolitan atmosphere with the flavor of a small town. A walk down the Boulder Mall reveals many of the town's numerous small restaurants and outdoor cafes, shops, street musicians, and vendors, Chautaugua Park, located in the foothills overlooking Boulder, offers a summer concert series and is host to an annual Fourthof-July outdoor musical celebration. All the elements of the CU-Boulder summer combine to create a distinctive experience in which individuals can develop more fully the mastery of a particular subject, expand their intellectual capacities, and deepen their appreciation of the environment in the context of this positive academic, cultural, and recreational atmosphere.

### MOUNTAIN RESEARCH STATION

The Mountain Research Station offers students the opportunity to spend an exciting summer studying environmental science in the mountains of Colorado and Wyoming. Undergraduate and graduate credit is available through intensive field courses in botany, climatology, ecology, environmental field techniques (EPOB 435/535 and EPOB 463/563 in the Schedule of Courses), forest geography, geography, geological sciences, geomorphology, snow science, and wilderness management.

The Station is located just 25 miles west of Boulder at an altitude of 9,500 feet and only a short distance from the Continental Divide. It is a University field facility operated by the Institute of Arctic and Alpine Research. The Station offers unique opportunities for study and research in mountain environments. Classrooms, laboratories, computers, and a library are located in the John Marr Alpine Laboratory. The Laboratory is surrounded by cabins for students, visiting scientists, and the Station staff. Students may arrange for a cabin, if they apply early enough, or may commute with the opportunity to stay overnight between class days. A dining hall is available for the convenience of both residents and commuters. To make commuting easy, a shuttle service runs between the Station and Boulder from Monday through Friday.

Students can look forward to long days out-of-doors at altitudes from 8,000 to 12,500 feet. Prospective students are encouraged, but not required, to enroll in more than one course where schedules permit.

# WESTERN CONSORTIUM FOR ORIENTAL LANGUAGES

Through the Western Consortium for Oriental Languages, intensive training is provided to students of Consortium schools; course credits are fully transferable. Consortium members are the University of Colorado, Boulder, the University of Arizona, and Arizona State University. Non-Consortium school participants will be permitted as space permits. Students must register for 10 semester hours and cannot register for one term only.

# DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSORS

Two well-known scholars will be in residence at CU-Boulder during Summer Session 1986 as part of the Distinguished Visiting Professor Program.

Dr. James F. Short, Jr. During Term A, Dr. James F. Short, Jr., Director of the Social Research Center and Professor of Sociology at Washington State University, will be teaching a course on juvenile delinquency. (SOC 496). Professor Short is a past president of the American Sociological Association and is considered one of the most prominent sociologists of this time. He will deliver a public lecture concerning trust, acceptable risk, and the law, entitled "Risky Business: Science and Values in an Age of Uncertainty," on Thursday, June 26, at 7:30 p.m. (location to be announced).

Senator Eugene McCarthy. During Term B, the Honorable Eugene McCarthy—former threeterm senator from Minnesota, three-time candidate for the presidency of the United States, writer, poet, and social critic—will be teaching "Current Political and Governmental Thought and Institutions" (P SC 484 and PHIL 490). lecture, entitled "Thorstein Veblen: Prophet of the Over-Consuming Society," will be presented on Tuesday, July 29, at 8:00 p.m. (location to be announced).

# ECONOMICS INSTITUTE

The Economics Institute, a specialized program sponsored by the American Economics Association, is mainly for international students planning to enter graduate degree programs in economics, management, administration, and related fields at universities throughout the United States. Some students attend the program to complete an Institute Diploma in the Foundations of Economic Science or in the Foundations of Management and Administration. The curriculum includes course work in English, as well as a variety of course offerings in economic theory, mathematics, statistics, computer literacy, information systems, management, accounting, finance, marketing, and law.

The Institute's 1986 Summer Program is from June 2 through August 15 and is divided into two terms; the second term begins July 7. The faculty is recruited from universities throughout the United States.

While most of the Institute's participants come from abroad, selected courses may be taken by domestic students on a special student enrollment basis. The Institute also sponsors a special lecture series in economics, business, and government, which is open to all Summer Session students, and a number of activities designed to foster intercultural communication.

# EDUCATION



# GERMANIC LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES DEPARTMENT

The Department of Germanic Languages and Literatures offers an intensive, one-week seminar entitled, "Language Instruction: Oral Proficiency" (GER 731) for 2 hours of graduate credit. For non-English-speaking students planning to study at United States colleges or universities, the University's International English Center (IEC) provides year-round intensive



English language instruction. cultural orientation, and academic placement counseling. The eight-week summer program is also appropriate for tourist visitors seeking a general English course combined with intercultural enrichment. All classes-at beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels of English proficiency-meet for five hours each day, five days each week. Tuition for Summer Session, June 11 to August 8. 1986, is \$1,195. For special study groups from abroad, the IEC also offers a variety of shortterm summer programs. # LATIN PROGRAM

The Department of Classics offers a program for current or future teachers of Latin or other interested persons who wish to increase their knowledge and understanding of the Ancient World and receive graduate credit. The Summer 1986 schedule includes "Classical Art and Archaeology" (CLAS 528), "Ancient Athletics" (CLAS 550, Term A), and "Greek Mythology" (CLAS 550, Term B). It also includes a 10-week accelerated beginning Latin course (LAT 593) intended for current or future teachers of Latin who wish to upgrade or review the language, for modern foreign language teachers who wish to learn the language, and for graduate students and scholars who need a reading knowledge quickly. It will cover all grammatical forms and syntax during the first 5 weeks. In the second 5 weeks, representative passages of prose and poetry (Caesar, Cicero, Catullus, and Ovid) will be read. # MUSIC



#### COLORADO GILBERT AND SULLIVAN FESTIVAL

The annual Colorado Gilbert and Sullivan Festival (June 6-July 31) will feature full-scale productions of Gilbert and Sullivan's lolanthe and Trial by Jury, along with Cox and the Box by Arthur Sullivan and F.C. Burnand, and Mozart's The Impressario. These shows will be directed again by John Reed, O.B.E., who for 28 years was the principal comedian of the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company of London. Robert Olson of the University of Colorado Opera Program will be the Music Director.

The program offers courses that survey the problems, skills, and theatrical elements of producing, directing, and performing in music theatre, as well as a variable-credit-hour practicum in rehearsal and performance of



Gilbert and Sullivan. Students may select up to 6 semester hours of credit from these courses. Scholarships are available to qualified performers and theatre technical personnel. ### SUMMER START PROGRAM, JUNE 30-AUGUST 8

Summer is a good time to start college free from the pressures that frequently accompany the traditional fall back-to-school season. For this reason, the University has established the Summer Start Program (SSP), which permits students to begin their University experience during the summer as participants in a program specially designed to give them a good start at CU-Boulder. The Program is open to all freshmen regularly admitted to the campus. Students admitted on Conditional or Provisional status are not eligible for SSP.

SSP is special because it gives freshmen the opportunity to

- begin in a small class (no more than 20 students), as a member of a community in which everyone is a beginner.
- become fully involved in one subject area. Instruction is provided in a modified block system so that a student takes only one course for three weeks, followed by its sequel for the next three weeks. In 1986, the sequence will be ANTH 103 and ANTH 104.
- be taught by experienced faculty known for their excellence in teaching.
- go on a guided field trip of archaeological ruins.
- fulfill half of the College of Arts and Sciences graduation requirement in Social Science.

The Program offers an intense academic experience. Classes meet every day, and much of the time between classes must be set aside for assignments. Students should expect to be busy, to be challenged, and to be fully involved in the academic experience from the beginning.

The Program Fee for SSP is \$120, in addition to regular tuition, fees, and room and board (1985 charges for a double room were approximately \$460). Students who wish to attend the Program but are unable to afford the Program Fee may apply for assistance; a small amount of money is available for such support. SSP applications must be received by May 15, 1986.



### YOUNG SCHOLARS SUMMER SESSION, JUNE 30-AUGUST I

The Young Scholars Summer Session (YSSS) is a program designed for college-bound high school honors students who will be between their junior and senior years during summer 1986. YSSS is intended to make the student's first encounter with college a stimulating and rewarding one. In addition to the academic opportunities, the Program enables students to take full advantage of the numerous recreational and cultural activities available during summertime in Colorado.

In Summer Session 1986, students in YSSS may select one or two courses from the following University-level offerings planned especially for YSSS: Principles of Macroeconomics

Introduction to Philosophy General Astronomy The American Political System Religious Dimension in Human Experience Principles of Anthropology General Biology I The World of the Ancient Greeks Interpersonal Communication Expository Writing Contemporary Mass Media Introduction to Programming I Introduction to Business



Class size is limited to no more than 20 students, and students earn college credit for their work. Instruction is provided by some of the best faculty on the Boulder Campus.


The cost is \$975 (includes instruction for one course), in addition to room and board (1985 charges for a double room were approximately \$390). A student who wishes to take two courses will have to pay an additional \$225. Provisions can be made to accommodate a limited number of day students who live within commuting distance from the Boulder Campus. Some scholarships are available for qualified students. YSSS applications must be received by May 30, 1986

- 1. As undergraduate students working toward baccalaureate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder.
- 2. As graduate students working toward graduate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder.
- 3. As Special Students who are not currently enrolled in degree programs at the University of Colorado. High school students who wish to take college courses should apply as Special Students.



All credentials presented for admission to the University of Colorado become the property of the University and cannot be released to an applicant. The University reserves the right to deny admission to applicants, including Special Students, whose

credentials reflect an inability of the applicant to assume those obligations of performance and behavior deemed essential by the University and relevant to any of its lawful missions, processes, and functions as an educational institution.

The University of Colorado Board of Regents reserves the right to establish enrollment levels on all categories of students accepted. Admission to a college or school of the University of Colorado does not guarantee eligibility for future transfer into other programs, colleges, or schools within the University.

### CONFIRMATION PROCEDURES

Degree applicants selected for admission are sent the appropriate forms to confirm their intent to enroll and are encouraged to return them as soon as they have decided to enroll. Admission becomes complete when the Office of Admissions receives and processes the signed Student Confirmation Form.

### UNDER-GRADUATE STUDENTS

### NEW UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE STUDENTS

Applicants seeking an undergraduate degree at the University must submit a nonrefundable \$20 application fee as part of their admission credentials. This fee, in the form of a check or money order (not cash), must accompany the Application for Admission included

in this publication. Degreeseeking applicants should *not* use the Application for Special Student Admission.


Early application is encouraged. Applications *received* after May 23, 1986, may result in processing delays or delays at Registration.

Applicants who are admitted by April 18, 1986, will receive Registration materials by mail. New students admitted to the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Engineering and Applied Science, College of Music, and School of Education will be sent information about a required orientation session before Registration.

Freshman Applicants. For freshman admission criteria, applicants should refer to A Guide to Undergraduate Programs and Application Materials 1986-87 or the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog. Freshman applicants must submit:

- 1. the Application for Admission and the *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee
- an official transcript of high school work completed, including rank in class, courses in progress for the entire senior year, and expected date of high school graduation
- 3. scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Board or the American College Test (ACT)
- 4. if applicable, a copy of the Certificate of High School Equivalency, a copy of the GED test scores, and an official transcript of all high school work completed (grades 9 through 12)

Transfer Applicants. Applicants are considered transfer students if they have enrolled for any college-level work, full-time or part-time, since graduation from high school. College-level course



work taken while still in high school does not qualify an applicant as a transfer student. To be considered for admission, transfer applicants must report all previous college work and have a high school diploma or its equivalent. Detailed transfer student admission criteria are indicated in A Guide to Undergraduate Programs and Application Materials 1986-87 and the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog. Transfer applicants must submit:

- 1. the Application for Admission and the *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee.
- 2. two official transcripts from each college or university attended. Transcripts must be sent directly to the Office of Admissions. Courses in progess must be included on the application. The applicant may not disregard any part of a previous collegiate record. Violation of this regulation may result in the student's dismissal from the University.

All transfer students who have completed fewer than 24 semester hours (or 36 quarter hours) of college work must submit an official high school transcript. Those students who have completed fewer than 12

semester hours (or 18 quarter hours) of college work must submit SAT or ACT scores in addition to a high school transcript. Students who are not high school graduates must submit copies of a certificate of high school equivalency and GED scores in addition to the above documents.

(Important: College of Business and Administration, College of Engineering and Applied Science, and College of Environmental Design applicants must submit an official high school transcript and SAT or ACT test scores regardless of the number of hours of college course work completed.)

Students who meet the College of Arts and Sciences foreign language requirement (satisfactory completion of Level III [third year] of a single foreign language in high school) must submit an official high school transcript directly to the College of Arts and Sciences Dean's Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0275, within the first year of attendance at CU-Boulder.

Note: The School of Pharmacy accepts transfer student applications for fall semester only.

# FORMER CU-BOULDER UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE STUDENTS

Former students (including Foreign Students who were previously enrolled in a degree program) of the University of Colorado, Boulder who were not in attendance during Spring Semester 1986 must reapply for admission.

Former degree applicants must submit:

- the Application for Admission and the nonrefundable \$20 application fee.
- 2. two official transcripts from each college attended since their last attendance at the University of Colorado, if applicable. (This includes students attending Semester at Sea Spring Semester 1981 or thereafter.) Transcripts must be sent directly to the Office of Admissions.


Early application is encouraged. Applications *received* after May 23, 1986, may result in process-

ing delays or delays at Registration. Applicants who are admitted by April 18, 1986, will receive Registration materials by mail. New College of Arts and Sciences and new and former College of Music students will be sent information about a required orientation session before Registration.

Degree-seeking students in attendance at the Denver Campus, Colorado Springs Campus, or Health Sciences Center of the University of Colorado during Spring Semester 1986 who wish to apply for admission to the Boulder Campus must follow former student application procedures. No application fee is required for these students.

# INTRAUNIVERSITY TRANSFER (IUT)

A Boulder Campus undergraduate student who is enrolled for Spring Semester 1986 and who wishes to transfer to a different college or school on the Boulder Campus for Summer Session



1986 must consult with the college or school to which they are applying for appropriate instructions, deadlines, and application forms. Some colleges and schools allow Intrauniversity Transfer for fall and spring semesters only.


An undergraduate student who is not enrolled for Spring Semester 1986 on the Boulder Campus and who wishes to transfer to a different college or school on the Boulder Campus for Summer Session 1986 must submit an Application for Admission to the Office of Admissions as described under the Former CU-Boulder Undergraduate Degree Students section of this publication.

For further information on recommended course work in preparation for Intrauniversity Transfer and other criteria, students should consult college and school sections of the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog or talk with an academic advisor in the program to which they plan to transfer. It is important to emphasize that admission to a college or school through the IUT process is competitive. and not all students who apply are admitted. Decisions are based on course preparation. hours completed, grade point average, and other criteria the specific college or school deems appropriate.

# GRADUATE STUDENTS

Continuing graduate degree students who are enrolled during Spring Semester 1986 are eligible to register for Summer Session 1986 without submitting an Application for Admission, provided they are in good standing and did not complete a degree at the end of Spring Semester 1986.

Former graduate degree students who did not attend Spring Semester 1986 must submit the



Application for Admission found in this publication and submit the nonrefundable \$20 application fee. Students are encouraged to submit their applications before May 23, 1986. Applications received after May 23 may result in processing delays or delays at Registration.

All other graduate students, including those who received a degree in May, must submit a new Graduate Admission Application and be accepted in order to pursue another degree or attend Summer Session as Special Students.

Students wishing to enroll as Special Students should see the Special Student section of this publication.

New students seeking a graduate degree should obtain application materials and further information from the specific academic department in which they wish to undertake graduate work.


Additional Information. Graduate applicants are urged to consult the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog for detailed departmental offerings and requirements.

All requests for financial assistance should be made to the department at the time the application is submitted.



# SPECIAL STUDENTS

The Special Student classification meets the needs of those students who wish to take University courses but who do not currently intend to work toward a degree at the University of Colorado. With the exception of high school students who have the approval of the Office of Admissions, Special Students must be 18 years of age or older and have a high school diploma or its equivalent in order to qualify for admission. Except for Summer Session, students who have attended a college or university must be in good standing at all collegiate institutions attended. Students may register for Summer Session to raise grade point averages to work toward a release of academic suspension.



Permission to register for regularly scheduled Boulder Campus courses is contingent upon availability of space. Special Students are not permitted to enroll in Business courses during the regular academic year. However, summer Special Students are allowed to take Business courses subject to completion of appropriate prerequisites.

Special Students may take course work through the Colorado Consortium for Independent Study. Students register for this option through the Division of Continuing Education.


Special Students may register for courses on a Pass/Fail basis. However, such courses will be counted in the hours of Pass/Fail permitted according to the rules of the college or school to which the student is admitted if the student changes to degree status.

Special Students who have completed 6 semester hours of credit must have and must maintain a 2.00 cumulative grade point average. Failure to maintain the required average will result in suspension.

Prospective Special Students for Summer Session may obtain further information from Summer Admission and Registration Information, University of Colorado at Boulder, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0007, phone (303) 492-7424. High school juniors who are interested in attending CU-Boulder the summer before their senior year are encouraged to apply for Summer Session as Special Students, High school records will be reviewed to determine the student's readiness to enroll in collegelevel courses.

Foreign students who want to apply to the University as Special Students should read the Foreign Students section of this publication. Students interested in teacher certification should refer to the School of Education section of the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog.

Application Procedure for Special Student Applicants. All Special Student applicants for Summer Session 1986 (except foreign students) must submit the Application for Special Student Admission to the Office of Admissions. Applicants who are admitted by April 18, 1986, will receive Registration materials by mail. Since applications received after May 23, 1986, cannot be processed before Registration, students applying after May 23 should bring their applications to Registration for processing and should anticipate admission on a space-available basis and a delay at Registration.



#### SPECIAL STUDENTS TRANSFERRING TO A DEGREE PROGRAM

A student who is currently enrolled or has been enrolled at any CU campus as a Special Student may apply for admission to an undergraduate degree program by submitting an Application for Admissions with complete credentials and the *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee. Admission as a degree student is subject to enrollment levels.

Applicants must have earned a high school diploma or its equivalent, and all previous college-level work must be reported on the application. Two official transcripts from all colleges and schools attended (outside the University of Colorado system) must be sent directly from any previously attended institutions to the Office of Admissions. Special Students planning to transfer to a degree program should also refer to the Transfer Applicants section of this publication.

A degree-seeking applicant may transfer, with the approval of the appropriate dean's office, a maximum of 12 semester hours taken as a Special Student. It is extremely important that Special Students who wish to transfer credits to a Boulder Campus degree program actively seek

academic advising from the appropriate dean's office. Acceptance of credit toward degrees at the University changed in 1970. Special Students enrolled before that date may transfer credit in accordance with provisions in effect between January 1969 and August 1970.

Transfer of credit to another college or university is within the discretion of the degree-granting institution.

Students wishing to transfer to a graduate degree program should refer to the Graduate School section of the *University of Colorado* at *Boulder Catalog*.

# HIGH SCHOOL

High school students who wish to take a University class the summer before their senior year must submit a high school transcript to the Office of Admissions and a completed Application for Special Student Admission signed by both a high school counselor or principal and a parent or legal guardian. High school records will be reviewed regarding readiness to take college-level courses. See the Especially for Summer section of this publication for information on programs of special interest to high school students.

# TEACHER CERTIFICA-

Certified teachers with a baccalaureate degree who seek only a renewal of the certificate currently held and who do not require institutional endorsement or recommendation should apply for admission as Special Students. Persons holding a baccalaureate degree who seek initial teacher certification are directed to apply to the School of Education for the Teacher Education Program. For information on the deadlines for admission to the Teacher Education Program, applicants should consult the Office of Teacher Education, University of Colorado at Boulder, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0249, phone (303) 492-6555.



#### **FOREIGN STUDENTS**

Foreign students may apply as Special Students for Summer Session provided they are in the United States in appropriate nonimmigrant status that extends their lawful stays through the summer. (Students who have established permanent resident status in the United States and have alien registration numbers are not considered foreign students.) The University of Colorado. Boulder does not issue Forms I-20 or assume any immigration responsibility for Special Students.

Students holding temporary visas may gain admission as Special Students only with special permission from Foreign Student and Scholar Services, University of Colorado at Boulder, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0124, phone (303) 492-8057.

Foreign students who wish to apply for admission as Special Students for only the summer should complete the Application for Special Student Admission included in this publication and send it to Foreign Student and Scholar Services.

Foreign student applicants must send the following with their applications:

A letter from the foreign student advisor, dean, or other appropriate official at the school they currently attend certifying that they are in good standing and that they are eligible to and

Live in a cabin at the Mountain Research Station while you study there.

intend to return to that school in the fall term, or evidence that < they are eligible to and intend to enroll in another school in the fall term

- 2. A photocopy of both sides of their immigration Forms I-20 ID copy, I-94, or other documentary information regarding their immigration status
- 3. Documentary evidence of their financial support for the summer

Foreign Student and Scholar Services will determine eligibility for Special Student status for all foreign students. Admission as a Special Student is for the summer only and does not constitute admission to a degree program or permission to continue enrollment beyond the summer.

Persons who are not already in the United States are not encouraged to come to the United States for the purpose of attending Summer Session as Special Students at the University of Colorado, Boulder. The University cannot issue Forms I-20 or other immigration documents for this purpose.

Students who wish to seek undergraduate or graduate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder should not apply for admission as Special Students. Rather, they should call or write the Office of Admissions to obtain instructions and application materials with which to apply for degree status.

Upon arrival in Boulder, all foreign students should check in, with passports and immigration documents, at Foreign Student and Scholar Services in the Environmental Design Building. The staff will provide instructions for Registration and other information necessary for new foreign students.

Sponsored students whose tuition and fees are paid to the University by a sponsoring agency must provide—before Registration—documentary evidence of that sponsorship and a billing authorization to the Bursar's Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative

Center 102, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0048, with a copy to Foreign Student and Scholar Services. All other students must be prepared to pay Summer Session tuition and fees at the time of Registration.

#### EARLY REGISTRATION FOR CONTINUING STUDENTS— SUMMER 1986

Degree-status students who are enrolled at CU-Boulder for Spring Semester 1986 are encouraged to register for Summer Session 1986 in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center the week of April 14-18. Students may register between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00

p.m. and until 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 17. A Registration Deposit (\$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state) must be paid at this time.

At all other Registrations, students will be required to pay a substantial Registration Deposit (\$85 per semester hour in-state or \$200 per semester hour out-of-state), based upon the number of hours for which the student is registering.

#### **MAIL REGISTRATION**

The following students may register by mail for courses listed in the Schedule of Courses section of this publication if they have been admitted to CU-Boulder through April 18: Former CU-Boulder undergraduate students in Arts and Sciences and Engineering and Applied Science; all undergraduate students in Business and Administration, Education, Environmental Design, Journalism and Mass Communication, and Pharmacy; all Education majors in the Graduate School; and all undergraduate and graduate Special Students. Students in these categories are encouraged to apply early so they can register by mail.

Registration materials will be mailed out beginning Monday, April 14, and must be returned by Friday, May 9. A Registration deposit (\$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state) must be included when returning Mail Registration materials. Those students admitted after April 18, 1986, must register on June 6, 1986 (or on July 14, 1986, for Terms B or F only). At all other Registrations, students will be required to pay a substantial Registration Deposit (\$85 per semester hour in-state or \$200 per semester hour outof-state), based upon the number of hours for which the student is registering.

College of Arts and Sciences new freshmen, new transfer students, and conditional students (including Special Students transferring to a degree program and Campus-Change Students) should follow instructions in the New Arts and Sciences Students section of this publication. All other students should follow instructions in the Registration—June 6 or Registration—July 14 section of this publication (see below)

### DEPOSITS, SCHEDULES, AND BILLS

Early Registrants. Early registrants (on-campus and mail) will be required to pay a Registration Deposit (\$100 instate or \$300 out-of-state) at the time of Registration. This deposit will be refunded only if a student notifies the Office of Registrations in writing of withdrawal from the University for Summer Session by May 9, 1986. Class Schedules and Tuition and Fee Bills must be picked up by early registrants June 6-13 for Terms A, C, D, and E. Schedule and Bill Pickup for Terms B and F is July 14-21. Undergraduate and Special Students who do not pick up their Class Schedules on these dates will be withdrawn from the University. See Dates to Remember for locations.

#### REGISTRATION— FALL 1986

Students who are enrolled in a degree program on the Boulder Campus for Spring Semester 1986 must register for Fall Semester 1986 between April 30 and May 2. 1986, as announced in the Spring 1986 Schedule of Courses. Students who miss this deadline should come in to the Office of Registrations, Regent 125, to determine if enrollment levels have been reached and if Registration is still possible for Fall Semester.

Summer degree students who were not enrolled in a degree program on the Boulder Campus for Spring Semester 1986 and who wish to continue in Fall Semester 1986 must register in Regent 125, July 1-31, Monday through Friday, between 8:30 a.m. and noon, or between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. A Registration deposit (\$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state) will be required by 4:00 p.m., July 31 1986. Because of enrollment levels, it is extremely important for students who wish to continue in the fall to register during this time. Failure to complete

Registration and pay the deposit by July 31, 1986, may result in the student not being allowed to register on the Boulder Campus for Fall Semester 1986.

NOTE: Arts and Sciences new summer freshmen and summer transfer students must register for Fall Semester in conjunction with their Orientation program.

### **REGISTRATION—JUNE 6**

All students who have not yet registered for Summer Session 1986 may register on Friday. June 6, between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. in the Events/Conference Center. Students who were not enrolled in a Boulder Campus degree program for Spring Semester 1986 should apply for admission by the deadlines indicated in the Dates to Remember section of this publication; however, students who have not vet applied but would like to attend Summer Session may bring a completed application to Registration on June 6.

Students are encouraged to register April 14-18 at the Early Registration for Continuing Students, or by mail for all terms of Summer Session, if they are eligible for these Registrations. Students who wait until June 6 to register will be required to pay a substantial Registration Deposit (\$85 per semester hour in-state or \$200 per semester hour out-of-state), based upon the number of hours for which the student is registering.

### REGISTRATION— JULY 14

Students who are not already registered for Summer Session may register on July 14 for Terms B and F. The process begins in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center, continues to the academic department offices for Add Forms, goes on to the Cashiers at Regent 150, and is completed in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center Students registering on July 14 will be required to pay a substantial Registration Deposit (\$85 per semester hour in-state or \$200 per semester hour outof-state), based upon the



number of hours for which the student is registering. Registration will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Students who are already registered for any term of Summer Session need not register on July 14. These students only need to obtain Add Forms for Term B or F classes from the academic department offices and submit the Forms to the Office of Registrations, Regent 125. See Dates to Remember and Add and Drop Procedures.

# NEW ARTS AND SCIENCES STUDENTS

College of Arts and Sciences new summer freshmen, summer conditional students, and new summer transfer students must attend a mandatory two-day Orientation and Registration program June 5-6 or July 13-14. During the two-day program, students will register for summer classes. For further information, call the Orientation Office at the Multicultural Center for Counseling and Community Development, (303) 492-6766.

### REGISTRATION—INTENSIVES

Students interested in intensive classes (Section numbers 500 or 600) are encouraged to register on campus April 14-18 or by mail, if they are eligible, or at June 6 or July 14 Registration. Registration may also be completed on the first day of the class by obtaining Add Forms

from the department and proceeding to Regent Administrative Center 125, between 8:30 a.m. and noon, or between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. Total tuition and fees must be paid at the time of Registration. Late fees will be charged for Registration after the first day of class.

### LATE REGISTRATION

Students are encouraged to register on campus April 14-18 or by mail, if eligible, or at June 6 or July 14 Registration.
Students may register late, but a Late Registration Fee will be assessed at the rate of \$20 the first day, \$25 the second day, and \$30 the third day and thereafter. The Late Registration Fee will apply to all course work, including Independent Study and Thesis. Students should also plan to pay full tuition and fees at the time they late register.

If an exception to the Late Registration Fee is requested, substantial evidence for the delay must be presented. This policy applies to graduate students, as well as to undergraduates and Special Students.

Late Registration begins the first day following the scheduled Registration and will be held in Regent Administrative Center 125 between 8:30 a.m. and noon, and between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m.

### FACULTY/STAFF REGISTRATION

Application Procedures, Faculty and staff who are Special Students, or those students not enrolled in a degree program, have to reapply for each semester they wish to attend CU-Boulder. Degree students who are former or Campus-Change students (not enrolled on the Boulder Campus during Spring Semester 1986) must also apply for admission for Summer Session. Applications are provided in this publication. Summer Session Registration materials will be automatically prepared for students who were enrolled in a degree program for Spring Semester 1986.

Registration Procedures. All faculty and staff who wish to enroll for Summer Session 1986 must take a copy of their PAF and a consent card, signed by their supervisor, to the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office by May 19. These cards are available at the Bursar's Office, Regent 150. Special Students, new students, and former students may turn in the appropriate Application for Admission to the Bursar's Office with their PAF and consent card.

To take advantage of the free semester hours (6 per academic year for full-time faculty and staff), students must register on June 9 for Terms A, C, D, and E, and on July 15 for Terms B and F. Registration will be held between 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. in Regent 125.

Add Forms from the departments must be completed and turned in with Registration materials to Accounts Receivable, Regent 150, by the published add deadline for each term.


# SUPERVISION OF STUDENTS

All summer degree students enrolled at the University of Colorado, Boulder are under the jurisdiction of their respective academic deans.

All Boulder Campus Special Students are under the jurisdiction of the Director of Registrations.

## ADD AND DROP PROCEDURES

Drop/Add begins June 9 for most colleges and schools and continues through the dates announced in the Dates to Remember section of this publication. No Drop or Add Form is processed until the proper signatures, as applicable, have been obtained from department offices and the Forms have been accepted by the Office of Registrations, Regent Administrative



Center 125. When dropping or adding courses, all students must show their validated Summer ID and Authorization to Register form. When the Forms are submitted, students will be given a validated receipt, which should be retained.

A student who stops attending a course without officially dropping the course will receive a grade of *F*. Students who wish to drop their last or only course should refer to the section entitled Withdrawal Procedure.

Courses dropped after the deadlines indicated below will appear on the final grade list, the student grade report, and the permanent record page with a W in the grade column. Students must be passing a course at the time it is dropped. No tuition and fee adjustment will be made for courses dropped after the deadline.

#### TERMS A, B, C, D

The deadlines for adding a class, for dropping a class without recording a W on the transcript, and for dropping a class and receiving a tuition refund are the fifth day of class for Terms A and B and the tenth day of class for Terms C and D.

After these deadlines, students must obtain their instructor's signature to drop courses until the *tenth* day of class for Terms A and B and until the *seventeenth* day of class for Terms C and D.

After these deadlines, courses may no longer be dropped unless there are circumstances clearly beyond the student's control (i.e., accident, illness); in addition to the instructor's approval, students must obtain approval from their academic dean.

#### **INTENSIVES**

The deadlines for adding a class, for dropping a class without recording a W on the transcript, and for dropping a class and receiving a tuition refund are the second day of class for courses lasting two weeks or less and the fifth day of class for courses lasting for more than two weeks through five weeks.

Courses that last more than five weeks but do not start on June 9 or July 15 will have the Drop/Add deadlines listed above based on approximately 40 percent of the number of class days. For example: for a six-week class, the twelfth day of class; for a seven-week class, the fourteenth day of class.

After these deadlines, students must obtain the instructor's signature to drop courses until the last two days of class. At that time, courses may no longer be dropped.



# CREDIT/NO CREDIT

Students who wish to register for course work for No Credit must inform the Office of Registrations by the add deadline

of each term. No changes in Registration for credit will be permitted after this date. Tuition is the same whether or not credit is received in a course.

# PASS/FAIL (P/F)

- 1. Any student who wishes to register for a course on a Pass/Fail basis should do so during the regular add period.
- 2. Academic deans and faculty will not be informed of Pass/Fail Registration. All students who register on a Pass/Fail basis appear on the class roster, and a letter grade is assigned by the instructor. When grades are received in the Office of Registrations, those registrations that require a *P/F* designation are automatically converted. Any grade of *D* and above converts to the grade symbol *P* and is not calculated in the GPA. A grade of *F* is calculated in the GPA.
- 3. Only 6 semester credit hours of course work may normally be taken *P/F* in any given semester.
- 4. Exceptions to the *P/F* regulations are permitted for certain courses that are offered only on a *P/F* basis.
- 5. Students should refer to college and school sections of the *Catalog* for special requirements or procedures.

# FINAL EXAMS


Final examinations are expected to be given in most University courses. There are certain courses, such as graduate seminars, excepted from this general expectation. Final examinations, when required, are given during the last two class periods in the term. Early examinations are not permitted.

# WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURE

Students who have registered for any summer term and find it necessary to withdraw for the entire Summer Session must follow withdrawal procedures established by the Office of Registrations. Students who fail to withdraw will be liable for the full amount of tuition and fees assessed on the number of hours for which they are registered for Summer Session 1986 (in compliance with the Board of Regents ruling on August 18, 1971).

Before their classes start, a letter may be sent to the Withdrawal Coordinator, Office of Registrations, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0007. After their classes have started, students must pick up Drop Forms for all classes for which they are registered and turn them in to the Office of Registrations, Regent 125, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Special withdrawal interviews are conducted for those students. who have attended CU-Boulder in Fall 1985 or Spring 1986 and have chosen to withdraw from the University during their summer enrollment. These students are asked to stop by the Information Window at Regent 125 to begin the withdrawal interview.



# TIME OUT PROGRAM

The University's Time Out Program (TOP) is a planned leave program for currently enrolled CU-Boulder students who are in good standing in their college or school and whose dean approves their leave for a minimum of one semester or a maximum of one year. (Example: after completing a fall semester in December, the student returns the following September or a year later in January.) A \$20 program fee is required at the time of application.


TOP will guarantee students a place in their current college or school and in their current major. Also, Intrauniversity Transfer is available to students in TOP. Additional information and applications can be obtained from the Office of Registrations, Regent Administrative Center 125, phone (303) 492-8673.



# TUITION AND FEES

Tuition rates and medical coverage fees have not been set for Summer Session 1986. The following table shows Summer 1985 rates. Tuition for Summer 1986 will differ from the rates shown. Final rates depend upon the level of support provided by state appropriations as determined in late Spring of 1986. Further information on tuition. fees, and deposits is available from the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office, (303) 492-5381. The Board of Regents reserves the right to change tuition without notice.

 Summer Session students are required to pay health and activity fees. The amount of fees is based on the number of weeks a




student is enrolled. Exceptions are as follows: students registering for Independent Study (Section 900) only will be assessed two weeks fees: students registering for Intensives (Sections 500 or 600) only will be assessed no fees. The fees pay for some of the services available at Wardenburg Student Health Center, as well as for services at the libraries and the Recreation Center. These fees have not been set for Summer 1986, but it is estimated they will not exceed \$9 per week.

- 2. Continuing students who have student health insurance for Spring Semester 1986 are covered for Summer Session; dates of coverage are approximately mid-January through the last week of August. New students or students who wish to purchase insurance should check with Wardenburg Student Health Center personnel.
- 3. There is no Concurrent
  Registration during Summer Session. Students registering
  separately on more than one
  campus of the University for a
  single term pay tuition and fees
  to each campus at the rate appropriate to the number of
  semester hours for which they
  are registered on that campus.
- 4. Any permanent full-time employee may enroll for 6 semester hours of credit and any permanent part-time employee for a proportionate number of semester hours of credit for the academic year (Summer 1986, Fall 1986, Spring 1987), without payment, on a space available

basis. Course work must be taken outside scheduled working hours or with an adjusted work schedule of equivalent hours acceptable to the employing department. Further information is available from the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office, (303) 492-5381.

- 5. Out-of-state students enrolled as master's ''Candidates for Degree'' in order to take a comprehensive examination for a master's degree will pay for 3 semester hours at 60 percent of the 3-credit-hour charge for out-of-state graduate students.
- Zero or a fractional semester hour of credit is regarded as 1 semester hour in assessing tuition and fees.
- 7. Tuition for courses taken for no credit (NC) is the same as for courses taken for credit.
- 8. Special Students with degrees will be assessed tuition at graduate student rates. Special Students without degrees will be assessed tuition at undergraduate rates.

#### **MATRICULATION FEE**

There is a one-time nonrefundable Matriculation Fee of \$15 for new degree students. This fee will be assessed at the time of initial Registration. By paying this fee, students are able to drop courses and request official transcripts free of charge. A Special Student who is admitted to degree status will be assessed a \$15 Matriculation Fee at the time of the student's first Registration as a degree student.



### TUITION AND FEE REGULATIONS

1. Payment of Tuition and Fees. At the time of Early Registration, students will be required to pay a Registration Deposit (\$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state). At all other Registrations, students will be required to pay a substantial Registration Deposit (\$85 per semester hour in-state or \$200 per semester hour out-of-state). based upon the number of hours for which the student is registering. Any remaining balance will be billed to the student's local address.

Tuition and Fee Bills must be paid in full by 4:00 p.m. on June 24; however, students registering for a Term B, E, or F class *only* or a combination of Term B, E, and F classes will have a deadline of 4:00 p.m. on July 29. Tuition and fees may be paid in full at Registration. The Deferred Payment Plan is not available during the summer.

All students who register and attend classes are liable for payment of tuition and fees even if they withdraw from school. Students having unpaid financial obligations to the University will not be allowed to receive their diplomas or any transcript of credits; the only exceptions are loans maturing after graduation. Students with outstanding financial obligations may not be allowed to enroll for a subsequent term.



- 2. Personal Checks. Any student who pays a Tuition and Fee Bill with a check that is returned from the bank will be subject to disenrollment from the University. In addition, payment will be required for the amount due plus a \$15 returned check charge and late payment charges if the due date for payment of Tuition and Fee Bills is past. Any check presented to any department of the University that is returned from the bank unpaid will require payment of the amount due plus a \$15 returned check charge. The student may also be liable for collection costs and prosecution under one of the following Colorado Criminal Statutes: 18-4-401, Theft by deception; 18-5-205, Fraud by check; 18-5-512, Issuance of a bad check. The University of Colorado, Boulder is a member of the Boulder Credit Bureau. Specific inquiries concerning reporting should be directed to the Collections Department of the Bursar's Office, phone (303) 492-5571.
- 3. Late Registration Fee. A Late Registration Fee will be charged all students (including those registering for doctor's thesis) who fail to complete Registration according to the instructions and to pay fees during the specified period. The Late Registration Fee is \$20 for the first day, \$25 for the second day, and \$30 thereafter.
- 4. Withdrawals. Students registered for the 10-week session or an 8-week term who withdraw during the first 10 days of classes will be assessed charges according to the following: \$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state. Beginning on the eleventh day of classes and thereafter, students will be assessed 100 percent of their tuition and fees.

Students registered for a 5-week term who withdraw during the first 5 days of classes will be assessed charges according to the following: \$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state. Beginning on the sixth day of classes and thereafter, students will be assessed 100 percent of their tuition and fees.




Students registered for any intensive lasting 2 weeks or less who withdraw during the first 2 days of classes will be assessed charges according to the following: \$100 in-state or \$300 out-of-state. Beginning on the third day of classes and thereafter, students will be assessed 100 percent of their tuition and fees.

Students registered for any intensive lasting between 2 weeks and 5 weeks who withdraw during the first 5 days of classes will be assessed charges according to the following: \$100 instate or \$300 out-of-state. Beginning on the sixth day of classes and thereafter, students will be assessed 100 percent of their tuition and fees.

Any questions regarding withdrawal policies and procedures should be referred to the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office, phone (303) 492-5381, or the Office of Registrations at (303) 492-6970.

5. Drop/Add. It is the responsibility of the student to be aware of the deadlines. Adjustment of tuition and fees will be made on changes of academic schedules through the fifth day of a 5-week term, or tenth day of an 8- or 10-week term. Intensives that last 2 weeks or less have a deadline of 2 days. Intensives lasting for more than 2 weeks through 5 weeks have a deadline of 5 days. No refunds of any charges will be made for dropping courses after the fifth day of a 5-week term or intensive course, or the tenth day of an 8- or 10-week term. Charges will be assessed for the addition of hours at any time.




# IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE TUITION

New students are classified as in-state or out-of-state for tuition purposes on the basis of information provided on the Application for Admission and other relevant information. Applicants may be required to submit evidence substantiating their claim of in-state eligibility. Applicants who feel their initial classification is incorrect may address inquiries to the Tuition Classification Coordinator.

To be eligible for in-state classification, applicants or their parents (if the applicant is an unemancipated minor), must maintain legal residence in Colorado for the 12 months preceding the term for which instate status is claimed. Students who will not be 22 years of age by the first day of class are assumed to be unemancipated minors and to have the same legal residence as their parents. Such students whose parents do not live in Colorado must petition to prove emancipated status for the preceding year. Students normally lose in-state eligibility if they, or their parents (if the student is an unemancipated minor), maintain domicile outside Colorado for one year or more. Such students are responsible for notifying the Tuition Classification Coordinator of the loss of their in-state eligibility.

### PETITIONING FOR IN-STATE CLASSIFICATION

Applicants and students who feel their classification is incorrect or who have become eligible for a change to in-state status must submit a petition with documentation in order to have their status changed. The necessary petition forms and an explanation of the Colorado tuition classification statute are available from the Tuition Classification Coordinator, University of Coloado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0068, phone (303) 492-6868. Students at other campuses should address their inquiries to the appropriate Office of Admissions and Records.



### **CLASSIFICATION NOTES**

- 1. Summer petitions must be submitted by the first Friday of the term for which the applicant seeks reclassification. Requests for review of an out-of-state classification made on the basis of an application must also be made by the first Friday of the term.
- In-state classifications become effective as of the first term that begins one year after legal residence in Colorado has been established. Changes of classification never take effect mid-term.
- Students who willfully give false information to evade payment of out-of-state tuition or who fail to provide timely notice of their loss of in-state eligibility are subject to retroactive assessment of out-of-state tuition, as well as disciplinary and legal action.
- 4. Tuition classification is governed by Colorado statutes and by judicial decisions that apply to all state-funded institutions in Colorado and is subject to change without notice.

### FINANCIAL AID

Degree-seeking students who plan to enroll in the University of Colorado, Boulder Summer Session for 6 or more semester hours (3 for graduate students) are eligible to apply for needbased financial aid. These students must complete an aid application, either the Family Financial Statement (FFS), which is processed by the American College Testing (ACT) Service, or the Financial Aid Form (FAF), which is processed by the College Scholarship Service (CSS). CU-Boulder's filing deadline is March 1, 1986, which means that the aid application must be received by the need analysis service by this date for the application to be considered on time. In order for students to be considered for summer assistance, they must also have provided complete answers to any Office of Financial Aid requests for information by the deadline date printed on the Additional Information Request (AIR) form. Students are only sent the AIR if the Office of Financial Aid needs additional information to complete their file. It is expected that need-based funds will be extremely limited for Summer Session 1986, if available at all.

Aid applications are available through the Office of Financial Aid, located in the basement of the Environmental Design Building, or from local high schools or colleges.

Students interested in applying for a Guaranteed Student Loan (GSL) should obtain an application from their local lender. Applications for the GSL must be completed and submitted to the Office of Financial Aid no later than March 4, 1986, for the GSL check to be available by tuition payment deadlines for Summer Session 1986. Families with combined incomes greater than \$30,000 must demonstrate financial need to be eligible.



#### STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Two types of employment opportunities are available to summer students: Full-Time Summer Work-Study (FTSWS) and regular or hourly employment.

Full-Time Summer Work-Study. The FTSWS program is designed for students who are not attending Summer Session, but who wish to work 40 hours per week to save money for the academic year. Students are not allowed to take more than one course during the summer when participating in this program. These students may work as few as 35 hours per week with their supervisor's approval. This program is not to be confused with regular Work-Study, which is limited to full-time students. Students interested in FTSWS must apply using the aid application and meet the filing deadline as explained previously.



In addition, a separate FTSWS application must be completed and submitted to the Office of Financial Aid no later than Monday, March 3, 1986. Meeting these deadlines is critical. Late applicants will not be considered. Applicants should be sure to retain the receipt confirming the date that the FTSWS application was submitted to the Office of Financial Aid.

Hourly Employment, Hourly employment opportunities do not require an aid application. Position notices are posted in the student employment area of the Office of Financial Aid. The Job Locator Development (JLD) coordinator is available to assist students in locating suitable offcampus hourly employment. Interviews are scheduled on an appointment basis, and interested students are advised to come to the Office of Financial Aid or to call (303) 492-5091 to arrange an appointment.



# COURSE LOAD DEFINITIONS

The following are the definitions of a full-time summer course load. For further information and guidelines regarding other course load regulations, students should see specific college and school sections of the *University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog*. Students receiving financial aid, receiving veterans' benefits, or living in University housing should check with the appropriate office regarding course load requirements for eligibility purposes.

### UNDERGRADUATE

A full-time undergraduate student in the summer is one who is enrolled for at least 5 semester hours.

### **GRADUATE**

A full-time graduate student in the summer is one who is enrolled for at least 3 semester hours in course work numbered 500 or above or 4 semester hours in a combination of undergraduate, graduate, or professional course work used for graduate credit, or any number of thesis hours.

### GRADING SYSTEM

The following grading system is standardized for all colleges and schools of the Boulder Campus. The addition of plus/minus grades was approved for the colleges and schools to implement at their discretion in Spring Semester 1984. Each instructor is responsible for determining the requirements for a course and for assigning grades on the basis of those requirements.


### EXPLANATION OF IF AND IW

An IF or IW is an incomplete grade. Policies with respect to IF/IW grades are available in the individual college and school dean's offices. Use of the IF or IW is at the option of the academic dean's office.

The student must ask for the incomplete grade. An incomplete grade is given only when students, for reasons beyond their control, have been unable to complete the course requirements. It is understood that

a substantial amount of work must have been satisfactorily completed before approval for such a grade is given.

If an instructor decides to grant a request for *IF* or *IW*, the instructor sets the conditions whereby the course work will be completed. The instructor may set less time than one year for completion. The student is expected to complete the requirements within the established deadline and not retake the entire course.



However, the instructor, with approval of the department, determines if the course should be retaken. If a course is retaken, the student must reregister for the course and pay the appropriate tuition.

The final grade (earned by completing the course requirements or by retaking the course) does not result in deletion of the *IF* or *IW* grade symbol from the transcript. A second entry is posted on the transcript to show the final grade for the course.

At the end of one year, *IF* and *IW* grades for courses that are not completed or repeated will be regarded as *F* or *W*, respectively. Requests for an extension of time to complete the course beyond the one-year deadline will normally not be approved by the academic dean's office.



#### GRADE POINT AVERAGE

The grade point average is computed by multiplying the credit points per semester hour by the number of semester hours for each course, totaling the hours and the credit points for all courses and dividing the total credit points by total semester hours. Grade symbols of P, NC. Y, W, IP, IW, and IF are not included in the grade point average. IFs that are not completed within one year are calculated as F at the end of the one year grace period. All grades of F, including those earned when registered Pass/Fail, are calculated in the GPA.

It is University of Colorado policy that the undergraduate GPA is calculated separately from the graduate GPA.

If a course is repeated, all grades earned are used in determining the University GPA.

Students should refer to their academic dean's office for individual grade point average calculations as they relate to academic progress and graduation from their college or school.

# ACADEMIC STANDING

Good academic standing in most colleges and schools requires a 2.00 grade point average (GPA). Students should consult the appropriate dean's office regarding college or school minimum GPA requirements and probationary policies.

#### **GRADE REPORTS**

Grade reports for any of the summer terms (Term A through Term F) will be available for students to pick up from their dean's office on approximately August 29. Grade reports are not automatically mailed; however, a self-addressed, stamped envelope may be supplied to the dean's office by individual students.

### **OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS**

The official transcript includes the complete academic records of courses, undergraduate and graduate, taken at all campus



locations or divisions of the University of Colorado. It contains the signature of the Director of Academic Records and the official embossed seal of the University. Primary usage of the Official transcript is for application for transfer to other academic institutions and for employment purposes.

Transcripts of academic records at the University of Colorado (all campuses) may be ordered in person or by mail from the Office of Academic Records, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Transcript Section, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0068. Official transcripts that include summer term grades will be available beginning the first week of September. A transcript that is to have the degree recorded will be available the first week of October. Requests should include the following:

- 1. Student's full name (include maiden or other name if applicable).
- 2. Student number.
- 3. Birthdate.
- 4. The last term and campus where the student was in attendance.
- 5. Whether the current semester grades are to be included when a transcript is ordered near the end of a term.

- 6. Full names of the recipients of the transcripts, whether they are agencies, colleges, or individuals. Complete mailing addresses should be included. Transcripts sent to students are labeled "issued to student."
- 7. Student's signature. (This is the student's authorization to release the records to the designee.)

There is no charge for official transcripts. Transcripts are prepared only at the student's request. A student having financial obligations to the University that are due and unpaid will not be granted a transcript. Copies of transcripts from other institutions cannot be furnished.

### UNOFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS

The unofficial transcript is the complete academic record at the University of Colorado that is primarily used for advising and counseling within the offices on campus and within the offices at other University of Colorado campus locations. The unofficial copy does not carry the embossed seal of the University.

Whenever an unofficial transcript is needed, the student may pick up a copy at the appropriate academic dean's office with the following exceptions:

- 1. Graduate students pick up their copy at their major department office.
- 2. Arts and Sciences, Business, and Special Students pick up copies at Regent Administrative Center 125.
- 3. In cases when a dean's office cannot provide the unofficial transcript, students may pick up copies at Regent Administrative Center 125.

A charge of \$.50 is made for immediate service. There is no charge for copies delivered to other University of Colorado offices at the student's request.

### FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT

Periodically, but not less than annually, the University informs students of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. This Act, with which the institution intends to comply fully, was designed to protect the privacy of education records, to establish the right of students to inspect and review their education records in all offices, and to provide guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal and formal hearings. Študents also have the right to file complaints with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Office concerning alleged failures by the institution to comply with the act.



Local policy explains in detail the procedures to be used by the institution for compliance with the provisions of the act. Copies of the policy can be found in the Government Publications Office in Norlin Library, the Law Library, or the Office of Academic Records on the Boulder Campus. Copies of the policy are also located in the libraries or the Office of Admissions and Records on the other campuses.

The Director of Academic Records on the Boulder Campus and the registrars on the other

University campuses have been designated by the institution to coordinate the inspection and review of student education records located in various University offices. Students wishing to review their education records must complete a request form in the office of the Director of Academic Records or registrar for the appropriate campus. Requests should list the item or items of interest. Records covered by the Act will be made available within 45 days of a request.

Students may not inspect the following as outlined by the Act: (1) financial information submitted by their parents, (2) confidential letters that they have waived their rights to review, or (3) education records containing information about more than one student, in which case the institution will permit access only to that part of the record that pertains to the inquiring student. Records that may be inspected include admissions, academic, and financial files and cooperative education and placement records.

The following items of student information have been designated by the University of Colorado as public or directory information: name, address, telephone number, dates of attendance, registration status, class, major field of study, awards, honors, degree(s) conferred, past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors (height, weight) of athletes, date and

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place of birth. Such information may be disclosed by the institution for any purpose, at its discretion.

No other information regarding students' education records may be disclosed to anyone without the written consent of students, except (1) to personnel within the institution, (2) to officials of other institutions in which students seek to enroll, (3) to persons or organizations providing students financial aid (this includes the parents upon whom students are financially dependent as defined by the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, Section 152), (4) to accrediting agencies carrying out their accreditation functions, or (5) to persons in an emergency to protect the health or safety of students or other persons.

The University requests that parents who would like a copy of their child's transcript have the student obtain one for them.

Currently enrolled students may withhold disclosure of directory information under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. To withhold disclosure, students should inquire at the appropriate campus office before the eleventh day of classes each term. The University of Colorado assumes that failure on the part of any student to specifically request the withholding of directory information indicates individual approval for disclosure.

Boulder Campus students should request the form that describes the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act from the Office of Academic Records, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125. Students on other campuses should inquire at their respective Office of Admissions and Records.

Housing is available through both University facilities and private listings. The University provides many types of housing for single and married students. These facilities are available through the offices designated below.

# UNIVERSITY HOUSING

#### **RESIDENCE HALLS**

Students should send the Residence Halls Application in this publication to the Residence Halls Reservation Center, University of Colorado at Boulder, Hallett 80, Boulder, Colorado 80310. An advance payment of \$60 is required to complete a University of Colorado Residence Halls Application—Summer 1986. Students should note that all Residence Hall facilities are reserved on a first-come, first-served basis, without regard to race, religion, or color.


The information in this publication refers to reservations for Summer Session only. The University cannot assure residence beyond Summer Session on the basis of a summer housing application; a separate housing application and advance payment must be submitted for Fall Semester 1986.

University Housing reservations (and advance payments) and University confirmation procedures (and deposits) are totally separate transactions, one of which does not guarantee the other. For information regarding admission to the University or confirmation procedures, call the Office of Admissions at (303) 492-6301.

Only regularly enrolled students or other persons authorized by the Director of Housing will be permitted the use of University of Colorado Residence Hall facilities. Students should not request reservations for summer housing until they have received notification of admission to the University.

Subject to the availability of space, freshman students are reguired to live in a University Residence Hall for Summer Session, as well as the following academic year (both fall and spring semesters), unless they are married or live with parents or relatives in the Boulder area and have permission to commute. Requests from freshmen for permission to reside off campus for other reasons will be considered on their merit, taking into account the individual circumstances of the petitioner.


For information regarding freshman permission to reside off campus, write the Assistant Director of Housing, University of



Colorado at Boulder, Hallett 64, Boulder, Colorado 80310. Questions regarding the possibility of such permission should be resolved before prospective students confirm their intent to enroll at the University.

All rooms are rented on a room and board basis, with no refunds for meals missed. No meals will be served on Sundays. Residents must be prepared to pay room and board for the entire period reserved at the time they check into the Residence Hall. Rates for Summer Session 1986 were not yet determined when this publication went to press; however, an increase over 1985 is anticipated. Persons making reservations will be informed of any rate increase. Rates are subject to change.





Rooms may be occupied after 8:00 a.m. on the day preceding Registration for the term to be attended. Registration dates are June 6 for the first 5-week term and the 10-week term and July 14 for the second 5-week term. Unless advance notice is given, students must occupy their rooms no later than the first day of classes for the term in which they are enrolled or the rooms will be released to other students. All residents must vacate their rooms before 10:00 a.m. on the day after the close of the term. If changes in the University academic calendar require changes in Residence Hall occupancy and meal service dates, notice will be sent with room assignments.

Students taking a short-term course (less than 5 weeks) may arrange to live in a Residence Hall. For further information, write to the Residence Halls Reservation Center.

Residence Hall Accommodations. Residence Halls that will be in use for Summer Session 1986 were not designated when this publication went to press. Halls to be designated will offer a variety of attractive and comfortable accommodations, including single and double rooms and a dining room within the building or nearby.

It is expected that freshmen and sophomores will be assigned together in a designated hall. A few single rooms will be available on a first-come, first-served basis for freshmen and sophomores who request them. Other areas will be set aside for upperdivision students. It is anticipated that single rooms will be available in these areas for most students who request them. However, single rooms cannot be guaranteed.

A limited number of furnished buffet apartments will be available without board in Reed Hall for seniors and graduate students only. Except in the case of mutually requested roommates, all assignments in Reed are singles. Private bath, two closets, and kitchenette with stove and refrigerator are included. Rates per apartment were \$626.13 for Summer Session 1985, based on calendar occupancy from June 6 to August 17. Summer 1986 rates are expected to increase.

Except for late applicants, students will be informed by mail of their specific Residence Hall assignments before the beginning of the term to be attended.

# OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING

The UCSU Off-Campus Housing Office maintains listings of rooms, houses, and apartments for rent in the Boulder community and of students looking for roommates. Students are invited to come to the Office, located in UMC 336, to look at these listings or obtain their own set of computerized rental listings (10¢/page), to use the free telephones, and to talk with counselors about the Boulder housing market.

In addition, counselors are available to advise students about leases, security deposits, effective roommating techniques, and ways to avoid landlord/tenant problems. The office provides Boulder maps (\$1.00) and free copies of the Boulder Tenants' Guide (an easy-tounderstand summary of tenants' rights and responsibilities), the Boulder Model Lease, the Roommate Survival Guide (a pamphlet describing communication techniques and other tips for successful roommating), and handouts on furniture rental, moving tips, grocery stores, local banking services, and other offcampus housing related matters.

Visit the Off-Campus Housing Office Monday through Friday between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. or call (303) 492-7053. During July and August, the Office is also open on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Freshman students are reminded that they must obtain written permission from the University Housing Department before obtaining off-campus accommodations.

# AUTOMOBILE REGULATIONS

Students who wish to park a vehicle in a parking lot on campus must purchase a permit. These are available at Registration or from the Parking Management Office, 1511 University Avenue. # CAREER SERVICES

Career Services offers career planning assistance, cooperative education opportunities, and placement services to CU-Boulder students.

Career Planning. Career planning services include career counseling, workshops on career topics, an extensive Career Resource Library, and referrals through the Alumni Career Network.

Cooperative Education/Internships. Cooperative Education/Internships works with students and employers to arrange supervised work experience relating to a student's major field of study.

Placement Services. Placement services include the annual hosting of over 350 employers on campus to interview graduating students, the weekly Job Vacancy Bulletin, referrals to employers through the computerized job match service, and credential file assistance to those applying to graduate/professional school or for teaching positions.


Career planning services are available to all University of Colorado, Boulder students. Clients of Cooperative Education and most placement services

# CHILDREN'S CENTER

The University Family Housing Children's Center at 2202 Arapahoe Avenue provides day care for the children of University Family Housing residents. University staff, University students, and others in the community, though Family Housing residents have first priority. The facility is state licensed and has a full-time professional staff serving 60 children on a full-day, half-day, and hourly (by request) basis. A summer day camp is available for children from 6 to 10 years of age. Children two and one-half through six years of



age (toilet trained only please) are eligible for day-care service. The Center is open five days a week, from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. For information on services, schedules, and rates, call 492-6185.

# COMPUTING FACILITIES

Academic Computing Services (ACS) provides support for instructional and research programs through a Universitywide network of computing facilities. ACS resources include a Control Data Corporation Cyber 170/720, Digital Equipment Corporation VAX computers (an 11/785, an 11/780, and three 11/750s), computing sites across the campus that allow general access to batch and timesharing computing, and access to computational resources of other institutions. In addition, ACS maintains 14 campus computing sites that are equipped with personal computers (Colonial Data, IBM, Macintosh, Zenith). Interactive network access is also available through more than 50 dial-up ports.

Software available on ACS computers includes programming languages such as FORTRAN, PASCAL, COBOL, and BASIC, as well as a library of mathematical and statistical packages and other applications programs. Academic Computing Services offers computing assistance through student and staff advisors, seminars and workshops, on-line documentation, and the ACS newsletter, DIGIT. In addition to the resources of ACS, a number of departments support extensive computing facilities for specialized research and instruction.

# COUNSELING SERVICES

The Multicultural Center for Counseling and Community Development (MCCCD) has the responsibility for assisting students in the areas described below. The services are free to CU-Boulder students.

Individual Counseling. Individual counseling services are offered to any students who are experiencing concerns in some area of their personal, social, or educational life. Some examples of student concerns are loneliness, family or marriage conflicts, poor academic performance, anxiety, drug or alcohol issues, or relationship difficulties. These concerns may be discussed frankly and confidentially with the psychologists or counselors on staff.

Student Development Program (CUOP). This area of the Center offers individual counseling. group counseling, career development/resource programs, and academic assistance to meet the ethnic minority student's educational, career, and personal planning needs. Students from minority backgrounds and disadvantaged backgrounds (i.e., American Indian, Asian American, Black, Chicano, and migrant) are encouraged to take advantage of this comprehensive program.

Group Counseling. Throughout the year, MCCCD offers workshops and group counseling experiences that are designed to help students gain skills in specific areas and work on solving personal or interpersonal problems. These activities allow each student an opportunity to interact with other students who have similar academic, career, personal, or cultural needs and concerns. Groups and workshops have approximately 6-10 members and are led by a counselor or a psychologist. Peer counselors lead some special workshops.

Center for Educational and Career Transition (Women's Center). The Center offers individual counseling, academic and job information, and testing services to University students, faculty, and staff, or to any individual who wishes to resume an interrupted academic program or to change or enrich a career.

Peer Counseling. Peer counselors (undergraduate paraprofessionals) are trained to provide academic assistance to students in the College of Arts and Sciences and to assist in various workshops.

Testing and Assessment.
Achievement, interest, and personality tests are utilized as aids to the counseling available for students. All test batteries are interpreted for students by one of the Counseling Services staff.

CUOP Career Development.
Choosing a career path is an important part of the educational experience. This program is designed to assist ethnic minority and disadvantaged students in identifying and analyzing their values and needs as they make a choice of major or career.

# CU OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM AT BOULDER (CUOP)

The CU Opportunity Program (formerly EOP) provides minority, migrant, and educationally or financially disadvantaged students an opportunity to study and obtain a quality education while taking advantage of a full range of exceptional support services. Students from ethnic minority backgrounds (e.g., Asian American, Black, Hispanic/ Chicano, American Indian) are encouraged to apply for admission through CUOP. In recognition that all students have not had equal opportunities to prepare for university work. special admission and financial aid assistance and consideration are given.

A comprehensive academic support program offered through the University Learning Center assists CUOP students in improving their learning potential and increasing their ultimate academic success at the University. Of special interest to CUOP students are intensive core freshman courses, workshops, learning laboratories, and individual tutorial services.

Through the Multicultural Center for Counseling and Community Development, CUOP students have an opportunity for involvement with their own growth and development. Students' participation in the planning of their personal, academic, and career goals is emphasized. With the assistance of staff and peer counselors, a complete academic support system is provided for each entering CUOP student.


In addition to college student support activities, CUOP offers several precollegiate programs to minority high school students from Colorado. These programs provide minority students early access to the University and opportunities to develop and excel in basic academic areas.

### FOREIGN STUDENT AND SCHOLAR SERVICES

Foreign Student and Scholar Services, located in the Environmental Design Building, is available to provide orientation and Registration assistance to foreign students, to help them become acquainted with the campus and the community, and to offer information and guidance in all matters that are special to foreign students. Foreign students are encouraged to check in at Foreign Student and Scholar Services before Registration and to utilize the services of

the staff there as needed. During the summer, the Office is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to noon and 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

# LIBRARIES

The University of Colorado Libraries consist of a central library (Norlin Library) and five branch libraries-Business, Music, Engineering, Math-Physics, and Earth Sciences. The School of Law also operates a library. The combined collections total over 2,000,000 volumes and more than 3,000,000 microforms, recordings, audiovisual materials, and maps. Approximately 20,000 periodical and serials titles are currently received. Norlin Library is a full regional depository for government publications. The libraries are fully staffed and open on a regular schedule during Summer Session.

Norlin Library hours during Summer Session are 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday; 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Friday; 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday; and noon to 10:00 p.m., Sunday.

# MUSEUM

The University of Colorado Museum is a primary resource for teaching and research through its collections in anthropology, botany, zoology, and geology. Because of its extensive program of exchanges of specimens and information, the Museum has an international reputation.

The exhibit halls, open daily to the student body and the general public, show informative and entertaining exhibits for study, recreation, and general education at all levels. Special Exhibitions drawn from the Museum's own collection and from other sources are on display in the main gallery throughout the year.

The Museum may be visited free of charge from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Fri-


day; from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday; and from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Sunday.

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# OBSERVATORY

The Sommers-Bausch Observatory on the Boulder Campus is equipped with 18- and 24-inch-diameter reflecting telescopes and a variety of auxiliary equipment. The Department of Astrophysical, Planetary, and Atmospheric Sciences operates the Observatory for astronomy courses and astronomical research.

The Observatory is open to the public for viewing of planets, stars, and nebulae, as weather permits. There is no admission charge, but reservations are required, as space is limited. For further information, call (303) 492-8915.



# OMBUDSMAN OFFICE

The goal of the Ombudsman Office is to facilitate communication, understanding, and effective conflict management among the constituents of the University—faculty, staff, and students.

Ombudsman duties include hearing concerns, complaints, and grievances; investigating such concerns; referring individuals to



other University resources when appropriate; mediating complaints if necessary; making findings of repeated or serious breakdowns in the University environment; and offering recommendations to University constituents regarding redesign of areas where breakdowns occur.

The Ombudsman Office maintains impartiality and confidentiality in working with individuals, and works independently of the usual administrative authorities. The staff is familiar with the organizational structure of the University and can provide current information about campus services, programs, policies, and procedures. The Office is located in Willard 302, telephone 492-5077.

# PLANETARIUM

The Fiske Planetarium, equipped with a Zeiss VI star projector in a 62-foot-diameter dome, is one of the largest and finest planetarium facilities in the world. Seating 213 in an attractive theatre, Fiske is used as a teaching facility for classes in astronomy and many other fields.

# RECREATION CENTER

The Recreation Center offers the following facilities: swimming pools, ice rink, handball/racquetball courts, squash courts, a general gym for volleyball, badminton, fencing, and other activities, a fitness systems room with Cam II and Hydragym equipment, a free weight room, tennis courts, training room, and saunas. There are adjoining facilities, not part of the Recreation Center, but often available for recreational purposes that include an indoor running track, basketball gyms, and additional small gyms.

Any student who pays fees is automatically a member of the Recreation Center. Faculty, staff, alumni, affiliates, citizens, and daily guests are assessed user fees. For additional information on membership fees and other areas of the Recreation Center, call (303) 492-6561.

Free equipment may be checked out on a daily basis for badminton, racquetball, handball, squash, table tennis, basketball, tennis, baseball, football, rugby, soccer, water polo, horseshoes, track and field, hockey, and broomball. Ice skates and some outdoor camping equipment are available at a nominal rental fee.

The Recreation Center offers organized activities in:

Outdoor Programs. Outdoor program activities include technical rock climbing instruction, white water river rafting, wilderness backpacking trips, and nontechnical ascents of some of the highest peaks in Colorado. There is also an extensive variety of activities available in the winter. In addition to outdoor activities, educational seminars are offered on outdoor leadership, low impact camping, mountaineering equipment, wilderness first aid, map and compass navigation, avalanche safety and forecasting, and nature interpretation. Outdoor equipment, including back-packs, sleeping bags, tents, and cross-country ski gear, is available for outdoor program functions. All outdoor program

classes and trips are available to students and members at nominal rates. For further information regarding classes, trips, fees, or general information, call (303) 492-6080.

Intramurals. Leagues, tournaments, and special events are offered, including organized competition in tennis, handball, racquetball, squash, and other sports. Call (303) 492-7244 for further information.

Instruction. A variety of noncredit sports-oriented classes emphasizing participation, learning, and fun is available through the instruction program. Summer classes include aerobics, tennis, scuba, swimming, diving, windsurfing, and more. The Instruction Program phone number is (303) 492-5258.

Club Sports. There is a wide range of sports activities organized on the club sports level. Call the Club Sports Office, (303) 492-5471, for information on those clubs that are active during the summer months.

### STUDENT HEALTH CENTER

The Wardenburg Student Health Center is a 22-bed infirmary and outpatient clinic located on the Boulder Campus. The infirmary and after hours care clinic are closed during Summer Session and during semester breaks. Students needing immediate care may utilize the walk-in clinic. Those wishing to schedule an appointment should call (303) 492-8321. Wardenburg's general information phone number is (303) 492-5101.

During Summer Session, the outpatient clinic is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Saturday. Semester break hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 8:00 a.m. to noon on Saturday.


Student fees pay for unlimited physician visits. Ancillary services that are available for minimal charges include physical therapy, laboratory, and x-ray services.

The Apothecary, operated by the School of Pharmacy, will fill prescriptions at reduced or competitive rates.

A major medical health insurance plan is available to students, in addition to student fees. For more information, call 492-5101, extension 22.



The University Memorial Center (UMC) serves as the focal point for campus nonacademic activities. Built as a memorial to those who died preserving our democratic freedoms and recently rededicated as a multicultural center, the UMC houses a reception desk that provides campus information; a games area





featuring bowling, billiards, and an arcade; a photo lab; the Fine Arts Center with an art gallery, browsing room, and music listening rooms; the University Book Center; food service that includes a cafeteria, grill, delicatessen, pizza parlor, vending area, Mexican cantina, and catering service with several private dining areas; a computerized ticket service; a copy center; and a variety of retail shops and services, including a travel agency, a flower shop, a record store, and banking facilities. The UMC also provides a conference center with special meeting rooms; the Glenn Miller Ballroom; the Forum Room for lectures and movies; attractive lounges; and office space for the University of Colorado Student Union (student government), nonacademic room scheduling. KAIR, and numerous student organizations.

# VETERANS OFFICE

The CU-Boulder Veterans Office assists eligible veterans and eligible dependents of veterans during their association with the University. Counseling and tutoring are available.

New and transfer students may visit or write the University Veterans Office stating their intent to enroll. If V.A. educational benefits have been used previously, it is essential to include the claim number. The V.A. requires that the student be enrolled for an approved degree objective. V.A. regulations now restrict independent study. Students should check with the V.A. office concerning benefits. If the degree-granting institution is not the University of Colorado. evidence from the other school should be submitted to verify that the courses taken during the summer will apply toward an approved degree.

The University must enroll the veteran or eligible dependent with the V.A. Regional Office for the student to receive benefits.

Promptness is imperative and a current local address is desirable. The V.A. now pays only after classes have been completed during each month. Financing should be planned accordingly.

Information about course loads and V.A. benefits for summer terms is available from the Veterans Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Willard Administrative Center 229, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0139.



The information below gives a detailed explanation of the *Schedule of Courses* included in this publication. Please refer to this information when creating your schedule.

At the top of each page are the following abbreviations:

**Dept. No.**—The department number is essential for filling out course requests. Students should not confuse this with the major code number.

**Dept.**—The department name abbreviated to a maximum of four spaces.

**Crs. No.**—The course number. Courses are numbered according to the following system: 100 and

200 levels (lower division), for freshmen and sophomores; 300 and 400 levels (upper division), primarily for juniors and seniors. Normally, courses numbered 500 to 800 are for graduate students only; see college and school sections for special provisions. Any exception to this system is explained in the course description.

**Cr.**—The number of semester hours of credit the course offers (3 means 3 semester hours; 2-4 indicates that credit is variable and students *must* indicate on course requests whether they want 2, 3, or 4 semester hours. Credits are expressed in semester hours. One semester hour is the equivalent of 1½ quarter hours.

**Title of Course**—An abbreviated description of the course.

Term—A = First 5-week term
B = Second 5-week term
C = 8-week term
D = 10-week term
E and F = Intensives.
Inclusive dates for each course noted in the
Schedule of Courses section of this publication.

Sec.—This is the section number and it is the same as the lecture number. When an L precedes the number (L004), it indicates a laboratory (lab) to be taken along with the lecture. When an R precedes the number (R010), it indicates a recitation (rec) to be taken along with the lecture. Some classes have all three: lecture, lab, and recitation.

**Time**—Meeting time of the class.

**Days**—Meeting days of the class (T is Tuesday and TH is Thursday).

**Bldg.**—The building abbreviation. See the list on the campus map.

Room-The room number.

**Instructor**—Instructor's name is printed when available.

Limit—Approximate class size.

### **Application Instructions**

Please follow instructions carefully. Type or use ink and print legibly. Place an "X" in the appropriate boxes. Complete all applicable required information. No part of any previous record may be disregarded. Missing information will result in processing delays that could affect your chances for admission. Incomplete applications will either be held until the necessary missing items are provided or will be returned to you for completion.

Applications may be submitted for one semester and one major only. If you wish to change your semester or major, please notify the Office of Admissions in writing. Applications and credentials submitted for admission become the permanent property of the University.

If you are applying for financial aid and your University student number is different from your social security number (see Question 2 below), it is important that you notify the Office of Financial Aid of both numbers. Your financial aid application will be matched with your admission decision by your social security number.

Graduate Students: Former graduate students returning to the same degree program may use this application form. However, new graduate applicants or former students applying to a new degree program must consult with the department to which they wish to apply for appropriate application forms and instructions.

Foreign Students: Foreign students who have previously enrolled in a degree program at the University of Colorado, Boulder may use this application. Other foreign students must request the appropriate application forms by writing the Office of Admissions, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Boulder, Colorado 80309-0065.

Foreign students are considered to be those applicants who will be applying for or who already have a temporary visa. Note: Students who have established permanent resident status in the United States and have alien registration numbers are not considered foreign students and may apply to the University using this application form.

The following instructions correspond to the questions on the front of the application form:

Question 1: Full Legal Name.

CU will use the full legal name you give on this application for all of your CU records, unless you request otherwise.

# Question 2: University Student Number.

New Student Social Security Number: Social security numbers are used for record-keeping and identification of students only. This number will be your University student number.

Former/Continuing CU Student Number: You are a Former or Continuing CU student if you have ever attended any campus of the University as a graduate, undergraduate, or Special Student. If you attended CU beginning with Summer Session 1972 or any semester thereafter, your University student number is your social security number. If vou attended CU before Summer 1972, your University student number is a six-digit number preceded by three zeros. If you do not remember your former six-digit number, please write in the first three zeros and leave the rest blank.

# Question 6: Address to Which All Mailings Should Be Sent.

It is imperative that this address be current at all times, as it will be used to reach you until you arrive on campus. Mailings regarding admission notification, registration, orientation, and other pertinent information will be sent to you at this address. If it changes, please notify the Office of Admissions immediately.

Question 10: CU College or School and Major to Which You Are Applying.



## UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO RESIDENCE HALLS AGREEMENT --- SUMMER 1986

**GENERAL:** This agreement and application for room and board, accompanied by a \$60 advance payment per individual, is required to reserve your accommodations. Send the application and advance payment to the Residence Halls Reservation Center, Hallet Hall 80, Boulder, Colorado 80310. All checks and money orders should be made payable to the University of Colorado Residence Halls. This application is for summer accommodations only.

NOTE: University regulations require that all freshmen live in the University residence halls for the summer term as well as the following academic year unless they are married or live with parents or relatives in the Boulder area and have permission to commute.

**CANCELLATIONS:** If a cancellation is received in the Residence Halls Reservation Center prior to two weeks before the beginning of the term or period for which the reservation is made, half the advance payment will be refunded. If a cancellation is received after two weeks prior to the beginning of the term, the entire advance payment will be forfeited.

**UNIVERSITY LIABILITY:** The University shall assume no responsibility for the theft, destruction, or loss of money, valuables, or other personal property belonging to, or in the custody of, the student for any cause whatsoever, whether such losses occur in the student's room, storage room, public area, elsewhere in the hall, or in baggage handling related to shipment or storage. Students are encouraged to carry their own personal property insurance.

WITHDRAWALS AND REFUNDS: If a resident withdraws from the University at the end of a term that is shorter than the term in-

damages as provided for in the Residence Halls Agreement

dicated on the front of this application, no liquidated damages will be charged, provided two-weeks' notice is given.

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Residents who check out of the residence halls at any other time and for any other reason will be charged for the period of occupancy plus 10 days. There will be no refund for checkout during the last 10 days of the term. The period of occupancy is terminated only by formal checkout at the building office.

Freshmen may not move out of the residence halls during the term unless they withdraw from the University or are released by the Assistant Director of Housing, Hallett Hall 64.

TERMINATION BY THE UNIVERSITY: Upon reasonable notice (normally 48 hours) the University reserves the right to terminate this Agreement for: (1) failure of the student to make payment of charges promptly, (2) failure to comply with A Guide to Residence Hall Living or University of Colorado Student Conduct Policies and Standards which are by reference made a part of this Agreement, (3) suspension from the University, (4) disciplinary action, (5) behavior which is incompatible with the maintenance of order and propriety in the residence halls. If this agreement is terminated by the University, the charge will be for the period of occupancy plus 10 days.


