## PLAN DE CURSO

De Miguel de Cervantes vamos a leer un libro (¿o son dos?): el libro normalmente conocido como *Don Quijote de la Mancha*. No haremos ni más ni menos que eso. Al ir leyendo, iremos investigando, inquiriendo, relacionando, haciendo y deshaciendo teoría y praxis de la novela y de la palabra escrita. Iremos preguntando cada vez más cosas, hasta que, al final, todos quedemos listos para re-leer el *Quijote* como han hecho los críticos: una vez más, y otra, y otra. Al menos lo habremos leído una vez.

### Textos requeridos:

—*Don Quijote de la Mancha*. Ed. De Tom Lathrop. Newark, DE: Juan de la Cuesta.  
—Del mismo editor se recomienda el tomo de vocabulario del *Quijote*.

### Evaluación:

- Un examen de medio semestre take-home (40%)
- Participación activa en clase, sin la cual el curso es una gran pérdida de tiempo (20%)
- Un trabajo final, sobre un tema específico del *Quijote* acordado con el profesor. Este trabajo debe ser entregado el último día de clase. (40%)

### Distribución del curso:

Se tratará de leer cada día 4 ó 5 capítulos del *Quijote*, aproximadamente, comentarlos y discutirlos en clase, acumulando progresivamente los grandes temas de discusión que han interesado a la crítica. Es **absolutamente imprescindible traer a clase el material asignado bien leído**. Durante cada clase, se hará más énfasis en unos capítulos que en otros, pero el estudiante debe leerlos todos atentamente.
