Decca Romances Platter Artists

HOLLYWOOD, Jan 7 – Decca Records went all out this week to romance Coast disk jockeys, and plattery's artist relations and publicity chief, Mike Connor, spearheaded a musical task force of top plattery artists in a tour of the town's platter pilot's home grounds. Drive, which emphasizes Decca's recognition of wax whirlers power in this area, began with a lush feed tossed for town's disk spinners at Lucey's, followed the next two days by a personal tour of radio stations with a "cavalcade of orchestra leaders."

Included among orkster's who played the disk jockey circuit were Sonny Burke, Gordon Jenkins, Russ Morgan, Victor Young, and Jerry Gray. Fronters, with Connor in tow, paid call at key radio outlets, did interview stints on leading platter shows and went for a round of glad-handling with the boys who spin Decca disks. Accompanying visiting fireman was Norman Goodwin, newly appointed assistant Western sales manager and exploitation topper, who will follow up on future disk jockey promotion. Drive marks the most concerted effort locally since Decca climbed on the disk jockey bandwagon some time ago.

We had hoped, when it was first announced that Jerry Gray was organizing a recording orchestra, that it would mean something more than just another band, and his latest platter lives up to those expectations. Most record collectors are familiar with the "march" arrangements that Glenn Miller made famous during the war, and the more recent Tex Beneke disc of "St. Louis Blues March" that was so successful. Jerry Gray, who was Miller's top arranger for many years, consequently is right at home on his latest platter with a "march" treatment of the familiar "Stormy Weather." Although the Gray version of "Stormy Weather March" doesn't warrant a jazz classification, it's very interesting and different treatment places it far above the usual commercial approach of most recording bands. On the flipover side, Jerry Gray offers the "Carioca" in the familiar Miller style. Both sides are very good.



The other end shows just as well, with Jerry putting the boys thru their paces on a snappy, thrilling rendition of the standard "The Carioca." Jerry Gray Ork Cuts Two Sides In Old Miller Style

NEW YORK – Jerry Gray, orchestra leader recording for the Decca label, is giving a real bang to the many, many fans of the late Glenn Miller band and the style that Glenn Miller made the most popular in the country.

The first sides that Gray has cut in this vein are "The Carioca" and "Stormy Weather March." The latter is so similar to the Miller technique that the listener will probably do a double-take and check the record again to make sure that he is really listening to a new group. Gray, who was the arranger for Glenn Miller and was fundamental in his success, is well qualified to follow this style.

Paradoxically, Gray did not want to copy the late Miller when he stopped arranging for him and created his own orchestra. However, the phenomenal success that Ralph Flanagan has enjoyed employing the typical rhythms of Glenn Miller has persuaded Gray to follow the same arranging patterns that he did when he worked for the Miller orchestra. Gray's releases for Decca are winning much favorable comment and rank him as a "comer" worthy of serious consideration.

The two-pronged appeal of music that gives listening pleasure and is perfect for dancing made Glenn Miller the most popular orchestra leader of his era.







After a quick glance at the current line-up, the casual observer might say that music fans will be hearing more and more records in the Glenn Miller style in the weeks and months ahead than they did before the war, when the original Glenn Miller band was a magic name on a record label.

There are two Miller-styled bands recording for Victor, Tex Beneke and the currently, much publicized Ralph Flanagan. Decca has to get into the act, too, so they nominated Jerry Gray, former Glenn Miller arranger and currently one of radio's outstanding "pop" bandleaders. Tex Beneke, or course, was a member of Glenn's pre-war band and took charge of the band when Miller was killed during the war. Evidently, the only connection between Ralph Flanagan and the Miller band is that Flanagan likes the Glenn Miller brand of music.

Jerry Gray, however, steals the spotlight this week with six excellent instrumental sides. The tunes on Jerry's new discs are all-time favorites, such as "Night And Day, Blue Skies, This Can't Be Love, and Star Dust." The musicians roster for this Gray crew sounds more like the line-up for an all-star band. They're all tops, and among them is a New Britain boy, Conrad Gozzo, playing lead horn. If you're a Glenn Miller fan, you'll readily recognize the faithful reproductions of the Miller sounds. All sides are interesting for the listeners and very danceable, too.



The original title for DESERT SERENADE, the theme song of Jerry Gray, was PALM SPRINGS SERENADE. Listed under Jerry Gray compositions, the September 2, 1949 copyright was registered to Albert Music Corp, the publishing company of Jerry Gray.

Title PALM SPRINGS SERENADE, as marked on this matrix number 5425 acetate, morphed into DESERT SERENADE following the March 10, 1950 Decca recording session, yet prior to the date the labels for Decca 27451 were printed. Decca 27451 was the first commercial release of DESERT SERENADE.

The labels for Decca 27451 would have likely been printed much later than immediately following March 10, 1950, as the Decca 27451 release was considerably out of sequence time wise.

The reverse side of Decca 27451 is MINUET IN G, which was not recorded until August 25, 1950.

The earliest printed reference in a trade journal to DESERT SERENADE and MINUET IN G is the April 21, 1951 issue of *The Billboard*.

The title DESERT SERENADE appears on Standard Program Library "Themes 5" SRR-1704. We have been showing this disk as possibly having been recorded as early as March of 1949.

With the September 2, 1949 copyright date of PALM SPRINGS SERENADE, and with the March 10, 1950 matrix number 5425 acetate marked PALM SPRINGS SERENADE, we believe our date of March 1949 on this Standard Program Library SRR-1704 is incorrect. Too early.

The earliest known audio version release of PALM SPRINGS SERENADE/DESERT SERENADE is on the *US Marines Corps Present The Jerry Gray Show* programs #1 and #2, with a confirmed recording date of August of 1950. This was used as the opening and closing theme, yet no mention is made of the title of the theme song on the label or in the audio dialogue.

The first known radio broadcast mention of the Jerry Gray theme song as DESERT SERENADE was on July 25, 1950, the opening night CBS broadcast from the Hollywood Palladium.

The first audio transcription mention of the Jerry Gray theme song as DESERT SERENADE is on the *US Marines Corps Present The Jerry Gray Show* program #10, where Ken Niles closes the program by saying "and now that famous Jerry Gray theme, DESERT SERENADE."


We have not been able to confirm the recording date of this transcription program, yet it is likely to be mid-October 1950.

The next known audio version on a Government transcription is dated c March 1951, and no mention is made of the name of the theme song.

Going back to the Standard Program Library, the next disk with the title DESERT SERENADE appearing on the label is X-288. We have been showing this as c January 1950. This must also be incorrect. Too early.

In summary, the Band of Today theme song, initially titled PALM SPRINGS SERENADE, was likely renamed DESERT SERENADE after March 10, 1950 and prior to July 25, 1950.

Now it will be most interesting to listen to the contents of this acetate to determine if it is the released take on Decca 27451 or an alternate take. My hope is that we have an unreleased alternate take.

JO STAFFORD of CBS "Club 15"

Not long ago George Gallup took a poll and came up with the finding that Jo Stafford has the "highest enthusiasm quotient among her fans" of any female singer on the air.

Her fans, in turn, call Miss Stafford "America's most versatile singing star" and point to her successful career, which includes membership (as of 3-28-50) in CBS' "Club 15," popular five-aweek musical starring Bob Crosby as Head Man. She shares the spotlight with Crosby every Tuesday and Thursday.

Born in Coalinga, Calif., and educated in Long Beach, Miss Stafford early developed a taste for music, notably the Tennessee folk music of her ancestors. Her mother, Anna York Stafford, second cousin of war hero Alvin York, used to play the five-string banjo and sing the old songs. Her father, Grover Cleveland Stafford, now associated with an oil company in Long Beach, also liked music and, says Jo, can still "sing some neat harmony."

Miss Stafford made her first public appearance at 12, singing "Believe Me, If All Those Endearing Young Charms" at a Job's Daughters entertainment at Long Beach.

With her two sisters, Christine and Betty Jane, she formed the Stafford Sisters Trio, which landed a singing job in 1935 with "The Crockett Family of Kentucky" over KNX, Hollywood. Other engagements followed, including one on David Broekman's "California Melodies" program, with Jo branching out into solos. It's a good thing she did, because the trio soon folded when one of her sisters married. Joining Tommy Dorsey's outfit, she was featured as soloist and as a member of Pied Pipers.

Frank Sinatra, whom she met while singing with Dorsey, and Johnny Mercer encouraged her to keep singing. It was on Mercer's radio show that she made her network debut as a soloist in 1944. She stayed on for 26 weeks. Mercer also handed her a recording contract, starting her on her way to becoming one of the nation's top recording stars.

In 1945, she was co-star of CBS' "Ford Show."

In 1946, she sang at the White House at the annual observance of Franklin D. Roosevelt's birthday. She was a featured guest soloist at a George Gershwin memorial concert in Hollywood Bowl.

For four years Miss Stafford was star of "Supper Club," in 1949 holding the distinction of being the only girl singer with two sponsored network shows "Supper Club" and her own "Jo Stafford Show."

Miss Stafford remains a girl of simple tastes and habits. Her weekends, which she calls her "balance wheel," are spent at her parents' home in Long Beach. Sunday night, she returns to her Westwood home and all the responsibilities – and pleasures – of being the femme singer with the "highest enthusiasm quotient among her fans."

Beginning Sunday, April 30 and continuing through the period of New York Daylight-Saving Time, the Columbia Broadcasting System will again employ the method of furnishing KMBC and other stations that remain on Standard Time with a one-hour delay service over special lines from Chicago.

When the change is made, stations remaining on Standard Time would ordinarily hear the network program one hour earlier if the system of tape-recording the program in Chicago and relaying them from there were not used.

This policy, which was begun three years ago, has been adopted in the public interest and will exist throughout the 22-week period of Daylight-Saving Time.

Jerry Gray Turns Out 'Real Stuff' on His Own - By Bill Becker

HOLLYWOOD, April 1. (AP) – Musician Jerry Gray is through arranging fame for other people. From now on he intends to beat his own path to the musical big time.

Gray, whose arrangements boosted the Artie Shaw and Glenn Miller bands to the top before the war, is pushing out with his own orchestra in a big recording drive that he hopes will: (A) establish him as a leader, and (B) subdue the current rash of Miller-style bands.

"I never wanted to cash in on Glenn's reputation," says Gray, whose scoring of "Chattanooga Choo Choo," and his own "String of Pearls" and "Pennsylvania 6-5000" became Miller hallmarks.

"But with these new bands coming up and playing what they think is Miller music, I decided it was time to step in and produce some of the real stuff."

He made it plain that he has no quarrel with Tex Beneke, the man who took over the Miller band and maintained many of the ideas of the leader who apparently crashed in the English Channel on a London-to-Paris flight in 1944. (The plane was never found.)

It's the others who had no connection with the Miller that Gray objects to, but politely declines to name. Like most of the Miller organization Gray followed the leader into the air force. "St. Louis Blues March" was the arranger's best war-time product.

What Gray calls "the real stuff" is full-bodied orchestration that features lush reeds on slow ballads and hard-driving brass on rhythm numbers. Sharp attack is the keynote of the styles which Gray helped to evolve for both Miller and Shaw.

Now only 33, Boston born Gray began as a violinist-accordionist in his home town at the age of 15. His work came to the attention of another Bostonian, Shaw, then organizing a band.

Gray's arranging of "Sobbin' Blues" and "Cream Puff" made Shaw's first record in 1936 an item that still intrigues collectors. Then came Gray's scoring of "Begin the Beguine" that put Shaw in the groove leading straight to the top. The Shaw-Gray parlay was a winner until 1940, when Artie disbanded and Jerry went over to Miller.

Again, Gray – who never played in either orchestra – proved the power behind the throne. His steady stream of what the trade calls "solid instrumentals" made the Miller style a favorite of dancers here and abroad.

Since the war, Gray has been doing well in radio work, but the itch to have a big band finally got to him. His recording orchestra numbers 18 musicians, several of them from the old Shaw and Miller combines.

The Gray band has been signed by Decca, which plans to bring it along on a balanced diet of old standard tunes and Gray's own originals.

His second coupling – "Crew Cut" (his own) and "By The Waters Of Minnetonka" – is a dance-happy blending reminiscent of both Miller and Shaw. The first release, "Sitting By The Window" and "Just Like Old Times," is slanted strictly for devotees of the old Miller way with ballads.

The cuttings give hope that dance music may be on its way back to the old pre-war quality.







THE MAN who helped Glenn Miller develop his style and who was the famous leader's chief arranger in both his civilian and Army Air Forces bands is petty mad about what's happening these days to the Miller brand of dance of music. Rotund Jerry Gray, he of the bashful manner, no longer remains the silent man behind the scenes, for he is noticeably peeved at the men who are, to his way of thinking, giving nothing to music and taking a great deal for themselves. What's more, he intends to do something about it, to start his own dance band. But, unlike the Miller imitators, every one of his "future arrangements will not sound like the old ones."

Jerry, who has been encouraged by some of Glenn's friends, pulls no punches. "I can't understand," he says in a statement prepared exclusively for METRONOME, "why certain bandleaders who had nothing at all to do with the development of the Glenn Miller style have suddenly taken it upon themselves to adopt this style and to cash in on the work of other people. Ralph Flanagan did not have the slightest connection with the Miller band, except, of course, that his names sounds like Bill Finegan, who did do some very fine arranging for Glenn. As for Ray Anthony, I just remember him as having been a trumpeter who did not play with the band for too long a time.

"It's about time that the general public learned the truth, that the Flanagans and the Anthonys and others are imitators who have made no contribution whatsoever to the Miller style of music. I feel that they are abusing and capitalizing on the efforts of other people, people who did help to create this music. I intend to present the real Miller style of music, the kind that Glenn originated and which, I am proud to say during my seven-year association with the band as head arranger I helped to develop further.

"Naturally I do not intend to continue aping myself, that is, make all my future arrangements sound like the old ones, which others are doing. I am sure that if Glenn and I were working together now, we would be experimenting with new sounds and new ideas, which is exactly what I plan to do. Music that was acceptable ten years ago should be improved upon today. I hope with my band to impart some of the knowledge I received from Glenn and to carry on as best I can in the tradition of a great musician, a great leader, and a great friend."

The questions naturally arise, "Why didn't Gray do this before? Why did he wait for the current boom? And what about the Tex Beneke band, officially designated as the band to carry on for Miller?" Jerry answers them all:

"When I first came out of the Army, I received several offers either to arrange for, or to front a band that would play Glenn Miller music. I refused them all because I felt very strongly at that time that I should not cash in on the work and the reputation of a close, departed friend. What's more, Helen Miller, Glenn's wonderful wife and still, I am happy to say, a good friend of mine, has designated Tex Beneke as the man who was to lead the band that would carry on for her husband. The band was also organized so that many of the musicians who played under Glenn in the Army would have good jobs.

"Now, however, the Beneke band no longer employs these musicians – I believe that he has only one or two former Miller men playing for him. But with the Miller style re-popularized, I felt very strongly that some of the men who were associated with Glenn have more of a moral, as well as a musical, right to present his music. That is why I have started my band. It includes several of Glenn's closest associates. Zeke Zarchy played trumpet in his civilian group and was his first sergeant in the Army. Trumpeters Mickey McMickle and Johnny Best were mainstays in his prewar band. Willie Schwartz's clarinet lead was an integral part in the Miller style, and Jimmy Priddy played first trombone in both Glenn's civilian and Army bands. With the help of these men and with the encouragement of my friends, I hope to be able to give the public a true musical picture of the music of Glenn Miller, presented by men who are motivated by something more than mere financial gains."

From the sound of all this, it looks like a real open war coming up, with Jerry unleashing his musical blasts via his Decca records and a tour which he is planning for this summer. His band has already been booked for a July 25 opening at Hollywood's Palladium, following a four-week break-in tour on the West Coast. How much of the battle will be waged along Glenn Miller lines is conjectural, because if Jerry lives up to his plans and promises, his band should produce some new, modern sounds, the kind of sounds which Glenn Miller's closest musical friend believes would have been forthcoming if that dance band genius has returned to continue to lead America's dancing ways.





It was quite a festive evening. Bob Crosby flew in from Chicago to pay tribute to his old arranger and the leader of his "Club 15" radio band.

Most of the members of Jerry's new aggregation are from the old Glenn Miller and Artie Shaw bands. The arrangements lean heavily toward the Miller style and well they should, Jerry having been Glenn's right-hand man in the business for years prior to his death in 1944.

If you ever were a Miller or Shaw fan, I suggest you trot down to the Palladium next Tuesday when Jerry's new Band of the Today officially opens an engagement. You'll hear some great music from a great guy.

Hollywood – Jerry Gray, with a series of road dates under his belt that set auspicious box office marks, unveiled his dance band in a special preview program at the Palladium before his July 25 opening at the show spot for a location stand that is expected to have a far-reaching effect on the dance band business. What the Jerry Gray band does, or does not do, at the Palladium can mean the end of an era for the dance band as a major attraction in the entertainment business – at least on this coast – or the beginning of a new cycle, the upward trend that frequently follows the decline.

Invitation-Only Crowd

The preview showing, something new in dance band promotion which appeared so successful that it's worth noting, was held for an invitation-only audience comprised of trade and fan magazine reporters, radio record showmen, publishers' representatives, etc.

Bob Crosby, currently on a theater tour, flew in to handle the emcee duties in his own affable and ingratiating manner.

Crosby introduced the bandsmen individually as they made their appearance on the bandstand one by one, and Jerry Gray led the organization through more than a dozen representative selections from his library. They ranged from ballads (*Bewitched*, *Star Dust*, etc.) to a Kentonish flavored (just slightly) version of *The Carioca*, and a bow to Dixie in *Sugar Foot Rag*, with vocal by brother Tony.

Not Too Millerish

The Miller flavor is not as strong as might be expected. Gray, who as No. 1 arranger to the late band leader would have as much if not more right than any other to the Miller stock trademark, seems to be trying to play it down.

He's introduced some new voicings in the reeds, including unobtrusive touches on ballads of brother Tony's accordion (we don't believe record reviewers have noted this), but on the whole he seems to be trying more for variety of tone colors without straying too far from anything conventional.

Listeners found the band interesting but not exciting. What dancers think of it will be determined by the box office figures during the Palladium engagement. They will have to be mighty big to lure Gray and his bandsmen into any venture that would interfere with their Club 15 air show, the five-times-a-week CBS Show, which returned to the air Aug. 28.

Might Raise Salary

It's a pretty good guess that Gray's main hope is that a smashing success at the Palladium will induce the money men back of the radio series to boost the budget enough to augment his radio group (only 12 musicians) to the size of his dance band – 18.

Under current Local 47 work regulations, Gray and his musicians after they return to the airshow, will be restricted from any outside work except phonograph recording dates. Inasmuch as the minimum salary for the radio job is some \$250 a week, this isn't exactly a hardship.

So – the significant aspect of Jerry Gray's venture as a dance band leader is that its success or failure will mean more, one way or another, to the dance business as a whole than it will to Gray and most members of his band.

JERRY GRAY HITS THE TRAIL

[Glenn Miller Appreciation Society Review of the Jerry Gray Band preview date at the Hollywood Palladium – from the GMAS U.S. Correspondent.]

At this preview of the Gray Orchestra, the band played for an unusual audience of trade and fan magazine reporters, radio and record shop folk, representatives from publishing establishments, and so on, and admittance by invitation only disappointed many people who had hoped to buy their way in at the door, but it pleased those lucky enough to have an invite. Yours truly thoroughly enjoyed the whole performance and had it ringing in my head for a long time afterwards, so much so that I decided to do a write up on it, and here it is.

The band, taking the stand one at a time, was introduced by Bob Crosby, who flew in specially to handle the M.C. spot in the show. Each musician rated a special build-up from Bing's younger brother till he finally arrived at the Gray man himself. Jerry Gray, leading the now complete group, took them into their number one in the book, the famous "Stardust," and led the Orchestra through a number of commercials. Particular mention should be made of the Band's versatility, a fine performance on "Carioca" – a number which certainly fit the arranging; had a Kenton flavor if only slight – and an unnaturally good interpretation of the Dixie best, found its way into "Sugar Foot Rag."

On this showing the band did not ape the Miller style as much as expected. No one expected to hear new sounds, but they did, particularly those caused by Tony Gray (brother of the leader) who played exceptionally fine accordion and made it blend most excellently with the main sections. Tony also took his share of vocals alongside the regular voc man Tommy Traynor, and both put up a fine set of chords.

Of the newer sounds, I noted that some came from the reeds who were apparently trying out some new voicings and these things all made it obvious that Gray, while still on a great big Miller kick, is anxious to try some of the ideas that Glenn most certainly would have had he returned.

Praise should be given to Gray for doing this instead of being content to ride on the bandwagon that Miller created with his original stylings and personality.

Gray is hoping that a smashing success on his new series will prompt the big money men to back him so that he will be able to up the size of his studio group (twelve-piece outfit) to a full 18-strong dance band. The studio group, incidentally, works fairly steady on its *Club 15* air spot with a five-nights-a-week appearance on it.

Here's hoping that the big money boys will back the Gray man to an 18-piece outfit. He has my backing, be it only morally.

Palladium has been buying all bands on what amounts to just about scale, plus a 50 percent cut of the gross (on admissions), for the last year. So it's a safe bet a similar deal prevails for Gray, who will first take the band on a tour of short stands and one-niters as break-in dates when the Club 15 CBS Show goes off the air (June 30) for a summer layoff of eight weeks.

As Club 15, a Monday-through-Friday stint, is one of the few airers definitely set for a return in the fall, and Gray has a long contract as conductor-arranger, he's not likely to have much trouble keeping his crew intact.

AFRS Closing Theme and Comments

[Author's Note: The AFRS One Night Stand above is reportedly dated July 28, 1950. It likely contains most or all of the original CBS Network radio broadcast from the Hollywood Palladium on July 28, 1950, less references to the CBS Network and CBS programming announcements.

AFRS would edit the length of their closing theme to compensate for the time differences. Their intent was to release a 30:00 transcription. On occasion, AFRS added in a song or two from another similar broadcast to balance the time. This AFRS transcription includes 10 songs, as compared to the usual Jerry Gray broadcast of 8 songs.

Prior to this AFRS One Night Stand #2264 release, there are reportedly two additional AFRS One Night Stand programs with Jerry Gray and his Band of Today issued; AFRS programs #2249 and #2257.

Based on the sequence within the AFRS system, it is likely these two One Night Stand programs are from this opening week of the Hollywood Palladium engagement.

Program content details of the two prior AFRS rebroadcasts are unknown.]



Gray in Record Palladium Date

HOLLYWOOD, Aug 5 – Jerry Gray's Glenn Miller-styled ork is attracting record biz to Hollywood Palladium. Ork bowed at the swank dancery following an all-out promotional campaign staged by the ballroom, Decca Records and the Batoner Gray. Turnout reportedly tops attendance of any band that played location in post-war years.

In playing break-in date at Salt Lake City's Rainbow Rendevu, Gray pulled 2,900 dancers on a Saturday night, surpassing the Saturday night record set at dancery by Stan Kenton in 1948.

Palladium played a Bob Crosby transcription announcing the premiere of the new band over its p.a. system nightly. Same announcement was aired as spots over local radio stations. This was backed up with space in daily newspapers and outdoor billboards. To assure proper deejay exploitation, the dancery threw a private "preview" cocktail party a week prior to the band's opening inviting all spinners as well as disk dealers.

Decca co-operated with special dealer windows heralding the new band, while Berle Adams, Gray's p.m. at the time, hired press agent Red Doff to handle press and deejay plugs. However, Gray's success here cannot be attributed entirely to the drum beating campaign, for Palladium General Manager Earl Vollmer contends dancery is enjoying repeat biz.

Following the Palladium stand, Gray returns to his CBS airshow the first week in September.



For sheer musical values and exacting, exciting execution there's hardly a band that can put a candle to Jerry Gray's organization. It's made up of crack Coast musicians and is under the guidance of one of the most competent and imaginative arrangers. However potent the musical assets of this band, the crew nevertheless, is short of being a finished product. Consequently, the band's return to the Coast following this engagement was indeed wise, in that it is allowing for improvement and amendments before Gray actually sets out to tackle the current cross-country band route.

Summer Hoop-La

Gray's band is due for a lavish build-up during the coming summer after it concludes the year's schedule for the *Club 15* radio show. The promotion, being drawn at this point to include hoop-la via his Decca records as well as thru a boost in association with radio sponsor, Campbell's Soups, should be completely warranted by summer. By then Gray should have built a full library and developed a flare for more astute showmanship than he was able to demonstrate during this engagement.

At this point Gray is being considered, along with Ralph Flanagan, Ray Anthony, and Tex Beneke, as a contender in the sweepstakes to capitalize on the late Glenn Miller's band style. Certainly Gray, who was most closely associated with Miller in his heyday, has come up with the band which has a musical integrity and distinctive character which no other neo-Miller unit has managed to achieve. But with both Flanagan and Anthony rolling in high, it will take a great machine to compete. Anything less could deter Gray's bid. Done up properly, Gray, with an abundance of band training, song knowledge and persuasive arranging style, must move to the forefront if what he offered at the Meadowbrook will serve as a foundation for his band.

Three Essentials

Gray's basic requirements boil down to three essentials:

- 1. His library should carry a larger share of pops and medleys, with the latter a particularly important need for the current dance business.
- 2. To add the needed showmanship, Gray's easiest out would be to expand his vocal department to include a live-wire thrush and a vibrant vocal group. These, in addition to current warbler Tommy Traynor, should help keep things attractive both aurally and visually on the bandstand. Traynor, incidentally, is a most impressive balladeer.
- 3. Gray has the benefit of a permanent spot of a coast-to-coast radio show, the *Club 15* airer. But, from now on until the time when he makes an earnest bid, Gray will require concentrated institutional promotion via the air seg and with the aid of his Decca records.

ONCE AGAIN your overseas reporter had the joy of seeing the Gray band in the flesh, and as before I had that wonderful feeling of listening to live Miller music. I think that at this show more than any of the others I've visited, the Gray group captured the essential fullness of the Miller sound. To date, I've seen and heard no less than seven large bands try out the Miller style and I must admit that sitting there listening to the boys under the baton of Jerry Gray made me feel that none of the others were this good. True, that being there with the band having such a rich and live Miller sound may have swayed my technical judgement. But on looking over my notes afterwards - which I'm afraid were very scribbled and often completely forgotten - I see that I penned special praise to Ted Nash, a fine tenor man previously with Les Brown; to Pete Candoli, to Gray from Herman a superb trumpeter playing high clear work that made me regret ever having heard of Maynard Ferguson. In mentioning trumpet I'd never want to forget Johnny Best who played some really full-blooded ballad solos – sound, stirring horn if I ever heard any. Also worthy of special note - tho the whole band plays amazingly well, singly and together - is trombonist Murray McEachern (once with the McKinley Band) who blew some of the richest trombone it has been my pleasure to hear and well deserved the ovation he received for his share of the musicmaking.

The band as a whole plays with amazing and unusual drive. With so many half-hearted sounding discs on the market, cut either by Beneke, Flanagan, or Gray himself, it was a wonderful thing to see the band really rock and play with perfect understanding for each other, and a team spirit that has even improved since the last time I saw the band

On summing up after the show (which to my way of thinking was much too short) I was surprised to realize that here in the Gray band were contingents from Herman, Miller, and Goodman; since Schwartz, Best, Priddy, Thomas, and Halliburton were all former Miller men, Candoli and Gozzo ex-Herman, while Rowles, Hendrickson, and McEachern are ex-BG boys. (Rowles and Mondragon were ex-Herman, too.)

Experimenting with various femme vocalists, Gray has yet to find one that he feels suits the band; so for the present he is taking them on for trail periods only and dropping them if they don't prove suitable. He still does pretty well without a regular girl singer, though, and for my money his is one of the greatest swing/dance organizations in the States today!

Jerry Gray's organization, which made its Eastern debut this week at the Meadowbrook, is another which is being prepared for a long-range build-up. Gray's current three-week Eastern tour, with two of the stanzas set in the Meadowbrook, is more in the nature of an experimental feel of the territory and a demonstration for operators and the agency's own personnel than it is the beginning of a bid by Gray for national honors.

Current plans for Gray call for the crew to return to the Coast to round out his year on the Club 15 airer. When the show takes it summer vacation in June, the agency plans to open up full blast on the Gray band in conjunction with both Decca Records and possibly Campbell Soup, sponsor of the radio seg.

In addition, the agency is scouting for other potential band leaders. It is known that the agency has made a pitch to Tutti Camarata, former London Records' artists and repertoire chief, to organize and work with a dance band. Likewise, the office still is in there pitching for veteran talent as it becomes available, with its strongest current potential grab likely in Frankie Carle, who reportedly will leave GAC when his pact runs out in February.

Ex-Richmonder Blows Hot Horn in Radio Show - By Carol Leh

HOLLYWOOD – A trumpet-tootin' ex-Richmonder, Johnny Best, of the Jerry Gray orchestra, is blowing and bouncing his way through Hollywood.

If you listen to Bob Crosby's Club 15 Show, for which Gray's orchestra plays five days a week over CBS, you'll hear a loud, syncopating horn – or an occasional hot solo. That's Johnny, the same plump, rosy-cheeked musician who used to drive his Richmond neighbors slightly mad when he practiced on the roof of the Sevilla Apartments.

If you visited Hollywood and went to the Club 15 broadcast in the CBS studio on Sunset Boulevard, you'd find Johnny on a platform with the other musicians, playing into the mikes on stage and the mikes suspended among the audience. Before them Gray waves a baton. Behind them a white backdrop with the sponsor's name, Campbell's Soup, shines in silver and red letters. Maybe they're doing "I Love That Guy."

Whatever they play, Johnny Best is all motion: puffy-cheeked from blowing, patting the beat with his right foot and sliding the trumpet back and forth with his right arm, working the keys with his nimble right fingers, whole body swinging.

Likes Sport Clothes

Chances are Johnny will be wearing some kind of California sportswear, like gray slacks and brown jacket over a white shirt, with a white tie on which fishes swim happily up and down. Johnny's black hair is thinning and graying on top, but his mustache is dark. His lips are small and pink, and his face is ruddy and round. He wears brown tortoise-shell glasses.

Between Richmond, where he lived and played with George Walker's orchestra in the early 30's, and Hollywood, where Johnny has resided for the last four years, came stints with such name bands as Artie Shaw, the late Glenn Miller, Benny Goodman, and Bob Crosby. He also "played" through the war with a Navy band in the Pacific and later in England.

Despite famous engagements in this country, and abroad, Johnny thinks the "fanciest job" he every did was for the Beaux Arts Ball in Richmond. "That was a real classy affair," he says, and his brown eyes twinkle shyly. "Sure was a lot of Southern beauty there."

Johnny also recalls several seasons at Virginia Beach, and working other Old Dominion cities from headquarters in Richmond.

Born in the little village of Shelby, N. C., Johnny might never have become a musician if his brother Herman hasn't bought a trumpet – for Herman. "Herman brought it home but Johnny learned to play it," Johnny explains. "I was 13 then and took lessons from my high school music teacher, W. T. Sinclair, who later joined the Richmond public school system. Pretty soon Herman switched to trombone and I kept on with the trumpet – and we were both playing in the school band."

Like most musicians, Johnny Best organized his own band – as a high school senior. "We called ourselves the Carolina Troubadours and played Western North and South Carolina – even broadcast from Charlotte and Spartanburg. We thought we were plenty hot stuff."

Best attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Davidson at Charlotte, and Duke in Durham – with a nip and tuck game between education and music. He would study awhile and play with university bands, like Les Brown at Duke, then take off with an orchestra touring the South.

"Fact is, I'm still going to school," the 37-year-old musician announces proudly. "I'm taking a correspondence course in American History from Chapel Hill. I sandwich that in between broadcasts, which run from 1:30 to 5:30 every afternoon including rehearsals; and between practices, which I do at a spot on the Los Angeles river bed – dry and concrete and isolated so I don't disturb anybody – a lot more satisfactory than the Sevilla rooftop in Richmond."

Since the Southerner first started playing, he's had 10 different horns. "You get the feeling they wear out, or that one plays better than the other," he says.

He is married to a pretty Texas girl, the former Helen Burt, of San Antonio. They live in North Hollywood valley where there's room for their two Shetland sheep dogs, Winkie and Jaycee.



It is likely this Los Angeles telecast on the 28th is actually a delayed/kinescope airing of the live 14th East Coast telecast of Jerry Gray for West Coast viewers. The Dumont technology and network distribution cross-country was in it's infancy.

NBC broadcast of "Campus Night at Club Del Mar" with Jerry Gray and his Band of Today may have been a "pilot" program. Disc label indicates this program was broadcast live over the NBC Radio Network and the Armed Forces Radio Service, and transcribed on an E.T. for AFRS.

Yet, there is NO confirmation in any observed radio log of this broadcast. A possible broadcast time if carried live in New York City was following the Midnight top-of-the-hour 5-minute newscast on WNBC. The West Coast area newspapers do not list this broadcast or show an NBC Network broadcast by Eddie LeBaron the following week as suggested by the announcer, Don Rickles.

This could well have been a "pilot" program that was not broadcast over the Network or the AFRS. The labels may have been representative of what could have been if the series was implemented.




Fairbanks To Shoot 2 Segs For Campbell
