



The girls, ranging in age from 15 to 20, were cherry pie baking champions from their respective states. They were competing for national honors and the privilege of presenting the winning pie to President Truman. The winner also was to receive a vacation trip and \$150 in cash.

The event was the 19th national cherry pie baking contest sponsored by the National Red Cherry Institute, an organization of cherry growers and processors.

The 30 state champions were selected in local contests from Maine to Washington during the last six months.





Talent Shifted On Five-a-Week Musical Series

In the realignment of talent for Bob Crosby's "Club 15," Monday through Friday series broadcast over CBS and KWKH at 6:30 p.m., the Modernaires, popular singing group usually heard Tuesdays and Thursdays, will appear five days a week beginning tomorrow.

Songstress Jo Stafford will handle the five-a-week stint for this week only, shifting to the Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday assignment the week of April 2. She is currently heard on Tuesday and Thursdays.

An additional feminine vocalist, yet to be signed, will appear on the Monday and Friday shows.

Like WGN, another institution in Chicago that had gained national fame through the middle of the century and into the 1960s was the Edgewater Beach Hotel, the premier lodging and entertainment destination in the Windy City. Located in the 5300 block of North Sheridan Road, the unmistakable complex with its pink buildings would blare happy music and offer dancing long into the weekend nights. The big bands of Jerry Gray, Frankie Carle, Benny Goodman, and many others would thrill patrons for hours on end. If it was summertime and the weather was right, Gray would open his set with his famous number "Dancing in the Dark" while couples took their foxtrots outside the building on the Beachwalk. An hour-long radio show called *Your Saturday Dance Date* would join the action live at Edgewater Beach for the last half of the show, after sending listeners tunes from New York in the first half. Indeed, if you were accompanied to the Edgewater, it was certainly a special date – especially if you were treated to dinner beforehand in the exquisite Marine Dining Room.

The Edgewater was also where National League teams stayed when coming to Chicago to play the Cubs. "Club officials enjoyed the location, a five-minute bus ride to Wrigley Field; the players loved the Edgewater Beach nightlife," writer John Theodore noted.

Doomed by civic progress, the Edgewater was eventually cut off from its beachfront location with the expansion of Lake Shore Drive. The famous resort hotel shut its doors in 1967. Demolition began in 1969 and was completed the following year.

PLATTER CHATTER by Fred Reynolds

A LITTLE more than 15 years ago big band swing band music rocked into popularity. The impelling force of the swing movement was the man who became known as its king, Benny Goodman. When the wars came and the men went into the military forces, swing lost its drive and the vocalists took over. "Peace" arrived and with it came a conglomeration of everything that anyone could describe in popular music: Folk songs, hillbilly, bop, Dixieland, modern, sweet, swishy, and from hunger. Now there seems to be a definite turn back to swing.

PERHAPS the thing that started it all was Columbia's release last year of the "Benny Goodman Carnegie Hall Jazz Concert of 1938," an enormous album which is great in content and grows in importance with the growing importance of swing. People heard this album and realized what they'd been missing. They bought it by the tens of thousands and asked for more. There have been certain disk jockeys, like Martin Block in New York and yours truly in Chicago, who have been pushing swing to good results for quite a spell, and if swing does come back, then some of the credit must be theirs.

OF COURSE, in order to have swing, you first must have the bands and the records. And we're getting both. Had Glenn Miller lived, had Benny Goodman stayed on the road he'd been following since 1935, there might have been no need to revive swing. It might simply have stayed on. I've often wondered whether the people ever really gave up swing; it seems to me it was just taken away from them. Where are the bands playing swing today? They're being led by many of the old swing masters, Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey, Count Basie, Harry James, Charlie Barnet, Bob Crosby, Lionel Hampton, Les Brown, Woody Herman, and Jimmy Dorsey. They're led by arrangers like Jerry Gray and Sy Oliver who used to work for the greats of yesterday. And there are new bands starting to swing – Ray Anthony, Ralph Flanagan, Ted Heath, and Ziggy Elman. To be perfectly sure, some of these bands are merely studio outfits, formed for recording purposes only. But the possibility of their becoming going commercial organizations should the swing movement take over is very real.

WITHOUT a doubt, the success of the Jerry Gray band has had a good deal to do with the return of swing. Gray was Glenn Miller's top arranger. He was responsible for the prosperity of such outstanding items as "String of Pearls," "Chattanooga Choo Choo," and "Pennsylvania 6-5000." Gray's own band plays largely in the Miller idiom, but he's incorporated into the scheme of things many of his own ideas. When it wants to, the Gray band can rock from the heels. The rhythm is fine, the brass sharp and biting, the reeds mellow and warm. Decca has released many records by Jerry Gray. Some of the best of these are "Farewell Blues," "Re-Stringing the Pearls," "This Can't Be Love," "What Is This Thing Called Love?" "String of Pearls" and "Stormy Weather March."

The old king of swing, Benny Goodman, is recording again with a big band. And the records swing as of old. It couldn't be otherwise with arrangements by Fletcher Henderson, and with such sideman as Billy Butterfield, Lou McGarity, Will Bradley, Bobby Haggart, and Peanuts Hucko.

Goodman's first big band Columbia releases couples "South of the Border" and "Down South Camp Meeting." It seems to me that Harry James is playing better trumpet today than he has in years. Listen to his new Columbia platter, "Tango Blues" – "When the Sun Comes Out." It really drives. Finally, try the new Ray Anthony Capitol recording of "Vilia." Here's more excellent proof that swing is swinging back!

F. Dailey Plots 4-Way Tie-Up on TV Remotes

New York, Dec. 29 – Frank Dailey, owner of the Meadowbrook, Cedar Grove, N. J., is readying a promotion to attempt to revive heyday road business for new bands via a network TV remote from his nitery. Dance-spot owner is currently dickering with Du Mont Television Network and the National Broadcasting Company on a late-night package which would emanate from the Meadowbrook and feature up-and-coming young bands. His theory is that the national video build-up would subsequently hypo road business for the outfit.

Scheme (which is based on Dailey's successful radio promotion of bands like the late Glenn Miller back in the '30's) involves a four-way tie-up between Dailey, the network, band agencies and record companies. In cooperation with Victor, Capitol, Mercury, Decca, William Morris and the Music Corporation of America, Dailey has packaged his present promotion with a view toward pushing such comparative newcomers to band field as Jerry Gray, Neal Hefti-Frances Wayne, Buddy Morrow, Ralph Flanagan, Billy May and Ralph Marterie.

Plan calls for Dailey to handle broadcast arrangements at the club, with diskeries shelling out for time and talent costs, and all four joining in cross-country promotion tie-ups to stir up a razzledazzle publicity come-on for ork road dates. Video series would feature "Band of the Week" with viewers voting for monthly winners.

Dailey has already experimented with the TV pitch via a regular Saturday night remote series from the Meadowbrook over Du Mont last year. Idea was suggested by Jim Caddigan, Du Mont's program chief this month, when he set up a two and a half-hour remote (10 p.m.–12:30 a.m.) for New Year's Eve. Talent on show included Bernie Cummins and his orchestra, singer Bob Eberly, emcee Bob Russell, and the Sons of the Purple Sage. Contemplated series would feature a variety of special acts in addition to bands.



Take the old Glenn Miller band, flavor it with some of Benny Goodman's swing and the great Woody Herman band's drive and you've got what bids to be one of the best selling albums on the current market – and not a vocal in eight sides.

The album is the new Jerry Gray package put out by Decca. Play St. Louis Blues and Shine On Harvest Moon and you've got a pretty fair sample of the beautiful phrasing Miller managed in the heyday of the dance band business. Not it exactly, understand, but pretty close to it.

Listen to Dipsy Doodle and you catch the Benny Goodman swing influence. Woody Herman's touch (his 1946 crew is rated one of the all-time greatest where big band jazz is concerned) comes in on such jazz pieces as Invitation To The Waltz.

I'm a fanatic in my disapproval of the Miller imitators. That's why you don't read much in these columns of Ralph Flanagan or Ray Anthony. However, I've been wooed over to Gray's side for one reason only: He has an exceptionally fine band composed of top sideman who play wonderful music, whether it's in the Miller vein or just plain good music.

The man from Decca shoved this album in my hands (twisting my arm, all the while) and asked me what I thought of it after a quick listen. I'll tell the public just what I told him, minus any armtwisting, that musically this album is tops. Anyone who prides himself of any knowledge or taste for the better things in dance music will love it.

Commercially, it has it's moments, but whether the general public will kill each other getting to the counter is another thing. There's such a thing as being too good – and this could fall in that category. You'll be the final judge on that.

One final word – it strikes me as being the sort of music Miller might have played today, had he not gone down in that flight over the English Channel during World War II. It has its cool moments, its frantic moments. And it has promotion; the works, Decca is promising.

Finally the musical greatness that is inherent in this Jerry Gray band has been caught in the groove. In the flesh, this is one of the most exciting units of the post-war era. It's never before quite made it on record. Here, tho, is the conclusive evidence that it is a crack ensemble. 

One of the most glittering packages of floor show entertainment to hit this city in some time currently is on display in the lush new Cotillion Room of the remodeled Jung hotel.

Three headline acts, plus a famous band, crammed into one show makes for multiple quality in amusement and that's what they're exhibiting on the opening bill of the handsome new supper club.

The entertainment is all top drawer and applause followed strong after every number. Pastor, who served as emcee, opened the show peppily with his band, singing "When You're Smilin" in individualistic way of his that is known across the nation via the networks and recordings. Then he turned out "Let's Fall In Love." The vocalist with the band, Dolores Martel, tall brunette lovely, showed a nice blue ballad style in several songs well received by the crowd, which insisted on encores.

The King and his Ladies stepped out in colorful Far East pantaloons to synchronize their efforts in a Siamese dance, bells on their ankles, legs flashing, and the crowd cheering.

They even got a hand for practicing their radio soup commercial, as well as for fine barber shop harmony on "Let The Rest Of The World Go By" and an unhackneyed presentation of the novelty, "Go To Sleep." They are big time.





SEGMENTS of OPS' anti-inflation campaign involving the services of radio, TV, and other talent enlisted for a series of radio programs were under GOP fire on Capitol Hill last week.

The attack was led by Sen. Styles Bridges (R-N.H.), Senate minority leader, and Sen. Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.), who questioned the propriety of such a campaign on the grounds that it would constitute advocacy of price controls. Current control law expires June 30, it was noted.

The radio series was announced a fortnight ago. The programs, Stars for Defense, will be made available without charge to radio stations throughout the country desiring to use them.

Citing the nation's inflated budget, Sen. Bridges described these plans as "a new low in the activities of OPS" and charged that the agency is utilizing "the services of movie stars from Hollywood and fan dancers to popularize the OPS." He promised to take the matter up in OPS budget hearings and with Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall.

The Senate Minority Leader also quoted on the floor a newspaper account of the proposed radio series. A *Chicago Tribune* article noted that "because of FCC regulations required the nation's radio stations to devote a certain percentage of their broadcast period to public service programs, the OPS propaganda shows have been widely used so far by radio stations . . . The theme, 'Fight inflation with price controls,' has been interpreted as a public-service topic."

Sen. Ferguson told Senate colleagues he felt it "improper for any bureau to use federal funds for the re-enactment of any Act, whether it be good or bad."

OPS officials vigorously denied that any fan dancers were involved in the anti-inflation media program. They pointed out that some Hollywood and New York radio celebrities have donated their services for transcriptions to explain the need for controls.

Burnet Maybank (D-S.C.) inserted in the *Congressional Record* a letter from an OPS official challenging certain published reports that the agency sought to use the programs to further price control. The Joint Senate-House Production Committee, of which Sen. Maybank is chairman, had requested the data.

Sen. Maybank said his committee has received "many inquiries" on the 13-week series. He took no side on the issue in his floor statement but inserted the letter "in the interest of presenting the facts." The letter was signed by Chase G. Woodhouse, Office of the Special Assistant to the Director of OPS.

Mr. Woodhouse rejected claims that the agency is using fan dancers to popularize price controls. He noted that a number of celebrities, including Bob Hope, Dinah Shore, and Bob Crosby had volunteered their services without charge, and that stations could use the transcribed series, *Stars For Defense*, as a public service. The programs have drawn fire from GOP quarters.

The OPS official stressed the importance of public information in stabilizing prices, and claimed the broadcasts are not used to advocate extension of the Defense Production Act on Capitol Hill. He conceded that it would be "most improper and illegal to use federal funds in a propaganda campaign."

Mr. Woodhouse added:

There were naturally certain expenses in producing and manufacturing these recordings. The agency felt those expenses to be small in relation to the immensity of the information job and its importance in effectively administering price controls. The 13 high-priced radio stars did not receive a penny for their services. The agency does not pay for broadcasting time. Radio stations, which wish to do so, broadcast these programs free of charge as a public service

Boston born Jerry Gray is striking out on his own.

The arranger, who helped boost Artie Shaw and Glenn Miller to fame before the last war, now intends to beat his own path to the big time. He'll appear in Salt Lake City soon.

"I never wanted to cash in on Miller's reputation," says Jerry, whose scoring of "Chattanooga Choo Choo" and his own "String of Pearls" and "Pennsylvania 6-5000" became Miller hallmarks, "but with these new bands coming up and playing what they think is Miller music, I decided it was time to step in and produce some of the real stuff."

Gray's "real stuff" is full-bodied orchestration that features lush reeds on slow ballads and hard driving brass on rhythm numbers. Sharp attack is the keynote of the styles which Gray helped to evolve with both Miller and Shaw.

The new band leader's arrangement of "Sobbin' Blues" and "Cream Puff" made Shaw's first record in 1936 an item that still intrigues collectors.

Then came his scoring of "Begin the Beguine" that put Artie in the groove that led to the top. Jerry joined Glenn Miller in 1940.



It pains this writer to conclude today's popular record buyer no longer listens to the sound of the horn. All he can hear is the noise of the propaganda put out by the band agents and record companies.

At least that is the way I interpret a conversation the other night around the bandstand. Someone mentioned Jerry Gray is bringing his outfit this way soon.

"And who," asked a couple of Flanagan and Anthony fans, "is this J. Gray?"

A check around the dance floor proved at least half of those there, the ones who came out to dance of a Saturday night, could tell you at once that Flanagan and Anthony are battling it for the spot of top band in the land, but they couldn't quite place Gray.

Are we so outdated to remember the Jerry Gray who wrote "String of Pearls" and "Sun Valley Jump" for the Glenn Miller band, and had a hand in "I Dreamt I Dwelt In Harlem" and "Pennsylvania 6-5000." Gray's arrangements are the ones that put Miller's band on the still-unrivaled top of the heap.

Don't take our word. Try out the "Tribute to Glenn Miller" album Gray cut for Decca, and a couple of new originals, "Re-Stringing The Pearls" and "Pair of Trumpets." Sure, you heard them on the Bob Crosby radio show, but without the promotion didn't rate them in their class.

Perhaps Gray is happier with second billing on the air, without the trouble of a struggle for fame. Perhaps he doesn't care that Decca doesn't give out the build-up Victor and Capitol have made for Flanagan and Anthony.

The dance floor conversation certainly is a tribute to Flanagan and Anthony's propaganda divisions. With proper promotion Jerry Gray would pass the league leaders so fast they couldn't blow their trumpets for the smoke.

BOB CROSBYS GET TOGETHER AT LAKE – By BOB EMAHISER

Once upon a time a young Spokane man rounded out his high school and college education by singing "spot" engagements around town.

He was so successful that he decided to make a career of music. And did. Today Bob Crosby is well at the top.

They weren't quite sure what to call it back in 1935 when the Bob Crosby orchestra played its first engagement in a tobacco warehouse far below the Mason-Dixie line. But a style is a style.

Crosby and his Bob cats were the bell-cows of an exciting new era in music. Today, Crosby, a popular star of radio, motion pictures and television, insists that his band is nearest and dearest to his heart – with one exception.

For Crosby has been successful domestic-wise also. He's the father of six children, three girls and three boys. That's where he has it over brother Bing, who has four songs.

Last week we greeted Bob and the three boys, Chris 10; Bob Jr., 7; and Steve, 5, at Hayden Lake, where the family is vacationing for the summer.

Now we have me the distaff side of the family: Mrs. Crosby, the former June Kuhn of Chicago, and a charming redhead; Elizabeth, 18, a sophomore at the University of California; Cathy, 13, whose recent recording of the song "Cathy" by Jack Elliott (title by Crosby) was an immediate hit; and Junie Malia (the Malia is Hawaiian for Mary), 9 months old and the real charmer of the family.

She flirts.

The family hadn't any more than settled at Hayden than Bob shuffled off to Buffalo for a one-night stand at the Paramount theater there. He flew back to Spokane, was met at the airport by brother E. J. (Ted) Crosby, and the Crosbys' and yours truly arrived at the summer home at Hayden all on the same breeze.

It was an adventure of what happens in the household of a famous musician when Daddy comes home from a trip.

I don't know how the Crosby family lives in their home in fashionable Brentwood, a movie colony adjacent to Hollywood, but I'll put their vacation routine alongside that of any other normal American family involving children.

For an hour and a half while we waited to get acquainted with Mrs. Crosby and the girls, the boys romped, shouted, yelled, and pleaded until weary Bob Crosby succumbed and took them fishing.

Meanwhile Mrs. Crosby set the table, Elizabeth washed dishes, Cathy looked after little Junie and brother Ted cooked.

"Remember the Swiss Family Robinson?" Crosby said wryly. "You can rename it the Swiss Family Crosby. Here is camping, bag and baggage, in all its glory."

Cathy, a self-assured young lady very much at ease, is in the eighth grade in school at Brentwood. Bob taught her to sing and she isn't sure about more recordings.

"That's up to Daddy," she said. "I'd like to, though."

Elizabeth is the writer in the family. She is studying journalism at Berkeley.

Mrs. Crosby, with the two older girls and the baby, drove up from Hollywood.

The trip, via Sequoia, Yosemite, Lake Tahoe, Winnemucca, and Sun Valley, Idaho, was not all pleasure.

"We tried to time it to about 300 miles a day on account of the baby," she said. "But we missed out on reservations at Payette Lakes, Idaho. After already driving more than 300 miles, we left there at 9 p.m., drove to Lewiston, and then decided to come on in.

"We arrived at Hayden Lake at 5 the next morning."

It was a weary Mrs. Crosby who greeted Bob and the three boys, but little Junie took the long jaunt in stride.

The Crosby's plan to stay at Hayden until August 1 when they return to Hollywood. Bob and his Bobcasts go on the Jack Benny radio and television show in September.

Announcer Del Sharbutt wrote "A Romantic Guy, I," "Nickel Serenade," "My Love" and the current Crosby-Sharbutt novelty, "Silver And Gold."

Hal Dickinson of the Modernaires collaborated on such song standouts as "These Things You Left Me," "The Whistler," "Jingle Bell Polka," "I Met My Baby In Macy's," "A Little Bit Of Dixie," "Vampin'" and, with Alan Copeland, "A Friend Of Johnny's."

Carroll Carroll believes in writing his songs the "hard way." Carroll works with Dick Manning, a Manhattan orchestra leader and conductor, sending his lyrics to Manning in the East for the music. They've turned out such songs as "You Say The Nicest Things, Baby," "Why Won't You?" "When You Take Her Out To Dine," "When Honeymoon Land Becomes Memory Lane," and others. In addition, Carroll wrote "Christmas Is For Children" and "Never Underestimate The Power Of A Woman" with Cy Miller.

There'll never be a lack of suitable song material for the "Club 15" program, what with the tune writing talent available within the show's own cast.

I'M A VERY LUCKY GIRL by Cathy Crosby

Now that I'm thirteen years old (and practically a grown woman) Mother and Daddy let me go to a movie with the boy next door. When I got home from that first date, Daddy asked, with a smile, if I went to see "Two Tickets To Broadway" – because he's in it.

"Gosh, no," I answered, "who wants to sit in the balcony with a boy and have your Dad watch you from the screen!"

Of course, Daddy laughed hardest. Because he knows I'd really be lost without his guidance and companionship. When I was a little girl I used to think my dad, Bob Crosby, was just about the most wonderful man in the world. Now that I'm grown, I see no reason for changing my mind. I still think so. In fact, the older I get the nicer he gets . . . and smarter, too. Look at the way he handles his job on the Jack Benny Show, as well as his own *Club 15*!

Until my little sister Junie Malia was born in 1951, I was the only girl in pretty much of a masculine household. There was Mother, of course, but we were sort of outnumbered by my three brothers and Dad. Three younger brothers and a father who sings can be pretty noisy at times. Now that we have Junie Malia (that's Mary in Hawaiian) I feel the girls are coming into their own around here.

Since Mother is red-haired, we've all wanted another redhead in the family. And when Junie Malia was born, nobody hoped more than I did that she'd be a carrot-top. In fact, the lady across the street had a baby just about the time we had ours and who got the redhead? She did. But we love our little Junie, even if she is another brunette. Daddy already calls her "Junie with the light brown hair" and that's good enough for me.

Dad calls me "Matilda." I really don't know why, but it's his pet nickname for me. Unless he's kind of annoyed at me – then he says "Ca . . . thy" in sort of a long breath. But that's not very often. When he sees me sneaking into the candy box, then he calls me "Chub-Chub" or "Fatty" and I'm mortified to the quick. But candy does taste so good and I don't see why anything that tastes so good can make you fat!

Nobody has too much of a chance to get fat around our house because we're all so active. We have a big backyard and Dad gets in and plays baseball with us or a fast game of ping pong. During the summer we visit our neighbors and go for a cool swim in their pool. I've suggested to Dad that we ought to have a pool but he says he'd rather not because Junie Malia is still so tiny. But he forgets he said this eight years ago when Chrissie was little. Then it was because Stevie was a baby and then Bobby. Just looks like we'll never have a pool – or a redhead.

We all pitch in and help Mother with the chores. It's one of the ways we earn our allowance. And because I don't like to do the dishes, I always manage to busy myself with Junie. I'd so much rather take care of her 'cause she's such a pretty cuddly baby.

But Daddy sees me and says, "Ca . . . thy," in that special way. And so I go back to the dishes.

Now that I'm in the eighth grade, I pick out my own clothes. I have an eye for a bargain, I think, and I just can't resist sales. Last summer I chose so many sleeveless dresses that Mother said I should go into the dress business myself!

But I'd be more interested in singing than going into the dress business. I think I'd like to sing and maybe, someday, be in the movies. When I was younger I was just dying to sing. I still love it – and even have made quite a few appearances – but I think I see now why Dad used to say, "Wait until you grow up, Cathy. Then you can decide." Now that I'm growing up, I'm quite content to wait and see what I really want to do.

Daddy helped write a song called "Cathy" and it's about me. I have appeared on his *Club 15* program, the Peter Lind Hayes – Mary Healy TV show, Uncle Bing's program, and several others where I dueted with Dad on the song. Of course, I was a little nervous – Dad says the time to worry is when you're not – and you know, I liked television best! (Daddy says for me not to let Mr. Benny hear that! Now that Dad's with Jack Benny, he says we ought to sing "Benny's From Heaven!")

Daddy is wonderfully helpful with my singing. Although I still don't take lessons, I practice around the house. "Don't sing through your nose, Cathy," he says when I don't even think he's listening. When I appeared on his *Club 15* show, Dad got Kay Starr to give me a little coaching. I was so thrilled by Kay Starr I can't remember what she told me. But I'm sure it was good, because Daddy and I got a nice round of applause.

My friends mostly forget to listen to me when I'm on and I've even missed myself. I think it's a good thing, because there just doesn't seem to be such a word as "star" around our house. I know I'd never even been in a movie studio until a few years ago when Dad took me with him to visit Paramount. He introduced me to people named Olivia de Havilland, Joan Fontaine, Joseph Cotton, and of course we saw Uncle Bing. I guess I was unimpressed, because Daddy recalls I asked, as we were leaving, "But where are the movie stars?" Just then I saw Sabu, the famous Elephant Boy, walking toward me. "Oh, look," I cried, "there is a movie star!"

I'm really no different from most girls my age. I have my favorites, too. I think Tony Martin, and Frankie Laine on some numbers, are just wonderful. Among the girl singers I like Patti Page and George Gibbs.

Last summer "we girls," Mother, Junie Malia and I, went to Hayden Lake, Idaho, for a month's vacation. Dad and the boys joined us a week after we had gotten there. It was wonderful, as I'd never been there before. Dad used to go there when he was a boy because it was near his home, and he told me I'd like it. "But why?" I asked. "What will I do away from my friends for a whole month?"

"Don't worry," he answered, "there'll be plenty of boys there." And there were.

But I'm not really interested in boys. I think they are very nice and it's fun to swim and play baseball with them. And I like dancing with them. Well, I guess they are sort of important – you couldn't have a party without them, for instance.

On my thirteenth birthday – which really was June twenty-first, but Mother and Daddy celebrated with a birthday party for me on June eleventh before we went to Hayden Lake – I had fourteen couples over. It was dreamy! We dance and played games and then Dad fixed a big barbecue out in the backyard for us. It really was the nicest party I've ever been to – even if it was mine!

Daddy is so much fun with all my friends and they don't mind at all having him tease them. He calls my girlfriend Kitty, "Pretty Kitty from the City," and her little brother Bill, "Wild Bill." He's just as much fun to have in a baseball game as any of the gang – and a lot better player, too!

I think I'm a very lucky girl that my name is Cathy Crosby. Because that makes Bob Crosby my dad!



After comments inserted by the GMAS staff regarding the birth of Jerry Gray's son Al since Jerry Gray wrote this letter, the published portion begins]:

"We're back on the Campbell Soup's *Club 15* radio show for the sixth year, recording for Decca and doing casual engagements around town weekends and some weekdays, such as San Diego for the Navy, the new Hotel Statler in Los Angeles. And I've got a whole new crew practically, with Shelly Manne on drums with us. You'd be surprised how well he fits in with this style. Harry Babasin on bass, who also doubles on cello electrified plunk style. So the line-up stands as of this moment (letter dated Nov 7):

Saxes: Dale Brown (lead alto), Ryland Weston (lead clarinet), John Rotella (bari and alto), Ron Perry (lead tenor) Bob Cooper (jazz tenor); tpts: John Best (lead), Tommy Patton (sweet and Jazz), Frank Beach (everything), Whitey Thomas (4th and laughs); tmbs: Jimmy Priddy (lead), Johnny Halliburton (solo), George Arus (jazz tmb), Jimmy Harwood (4th tmb); piano, Marty Paich (a new friend and great arranger); guitar, Bob Gibbons; bass, Harry Babasin; drums, Shelly Manne; vocalists (at the moment I have two) Lynn Franklin and Jenie Stone.

Of course we still predominently play the Miller style but am gradually getting more and more modern stuff in, just enough, I feel, like Glenn would have done. No, I don't think we'll ever lose the Miller style. People want it judging by the business we do, and now with the Miller picture coming up, which I've something to do with, we're sticking with it. And don't forget, I'm very proud to be Honorary Vice-President of the Society.

Here's something I think you'll be glad to hear. You know up until now I couldn't very well go all out with the dance band because of my radio commitments. But after January I think you'll find it a different story for I intend to use the full band in all my work. We're working on a TV idea of the story of a band which I hope will come off. So I think in 1953 you'll see a real honest effort on the part of Jerry Gray to make the band click.

Now to answer your question, page 60, September 17th issue (Memo to Decca), V-Hop, Flagwaver, and Intro To A Waltz were written by yours truly for Glenn in 1940-1941 but they were never recorded. I did re-write the arrangements but the titles, composition, and nucleaus of arr. are the same. Granted they are a bit different then when I wrote them in '41 but, what the hell, if I were writing for Miller now that's the way I would have written them. No? Yes!!

Guess that's it for now. Keep up the great work, it's a wonderful newsy mag, and I promise not to forget you in the future and certainly hope it won't be too long before I'll be able to make a trip across the pond with my wife and see so many of my friends I made there during the last war.

Campbell is sponsoring *Double or Nothing* in the East and *The Aldrich Family* on coast-to-coast television. There isn't enough in the budget to handle both radio and TV so *Club 15* will go.

Club 15 costs the sponsor \$9,000 per week for talent plus line charges. Show has been on the air since July 1947. Ward Wheelock agency has the account. Show's cast includes Bob Crosby, Gisele MacKenzie, the Modernaires, and Jerry Gray's ork. Campbell intends to continue Walter O'Keefe's *Double or Nothing* morning series on the National Broadcasting Company.

Campbell has explored possible TV conversion of the Club 15 show. Kine was filmed late in 1950 and both the agency and the sponsor seemed receptive to TV.

However, sponsor later acquired its present TV shows which inflicted enough of a dent in the broadcasting budget to not only rule out a TV version of the show but the radio show itself



The shows will be sold cheaply. "*Junior Miss*," for example, can be bought for \$1,425 gross once weekly. Its cost as a strip is \$6,500 a week. CBS has also become the sales agent for "*Beulah*" having taken over the sales rights from Jimmy Saphier.

The network also intends to program more of Cedric Adams, the Minneapolis columnist. Currently on a five-minute Sunday show and two 10-minute evening slots for sponsors, Adams will go 10:35-10:45 three times a week more.

AGLOW WITH LIGHTS, filled with flowers and thronged with guests in party attire, El Mirador was a glamourous setting for the elaborate dinner dance arranged by the management for the formal opening.

Joan Taylor, pretty Paramount film starlet, cut the ribbon at the main entrance of the hotel, and General Manager Frederick Clausen gave a speech of welcome.

Cocktails followed the formalities and then the banquet was served to the guests, estimated at around 700. Every table in the El Mirador Room, the Garden Room, the Starlight Patio and the Supper Club was filled and several latecomers without reservations, including Hollywood personages, were turned away.

THERE WAS DANCING throughout the evening to the music of Jerry Gray and his Band of Today, assisted by Bill Bardo and his combo.

A crush of people filled the dance floor to capacity every time Jerry Gray and his Band of Today played.

Many disappointed late comers, including some famous names, arrived hoping to find a table . . . but there were none available. So, the big lobby was well-filled all evening.

Fabulous El Mirador opened December 13th in a blaze of glory that dimmed the desert moon and stars. Society notables, celebrities of stage, screen, radio, television and newspaperdom were there for the gala occasion. Famed beauties, gorgeously gowned and jeweled, important personages, and visitors from far and near joined Villagers in the festivities.

Early in the evening, lovely Paramount star Joan Taylor, currently co-starring in "Savage," snipped the wide silk ribbon at the main entrance to El Mirador, formally opening the beautiful resort to the world, and General Manager Frederick R. Clausen and Mrs. Clausen stood by to welcome the guests.

Newsreel cameras whirred, pencils scratched furiously, flash bulbs flared, and microphones hummed, as notable after notable entered the expansive contemporary-styled lobby.

There was a flare of flash bulbs and the clicking of cameras in the great lobby, where masses of flowers and planter effects, and fire in the enormous circular fireplace enhanced the stage setting. An intriguing indoor-outdoor effect has been achieved by the use of plate glass floor to ceiling so that it permits a spectacular view of the terrace, the lighted palm trees, and the illuminated blue pool.

Later, mink and sable coats and stoles overflowed the cloakroom as the huge, exclusive gathering converged in the El Mirador Room, Starlight Patio, Garden Room, and Supper Club for a sumptuous dinner prepared by world-famous chef Gabriel Anet.

Beautiful El Mirador Room, with its luminescent pastel mural, its draperies fashioned of enameled bamboo and hand weaving, its amusingly unreal birds in wrought iron cages, and its impeccable table settings, was a brilliant scene as the hundreds of guests dined and danced to the music of Jerry Gray and his Band of Today assisted by Bill Bardo and his combo. Rare foods and costly champagnes were on the menu.

Huge Success

The evening was a huge success and both society and entertainment folks agreed that, indeed, El Mirador will take a top step among beautiful American resorts.

JERRY GRAY PLANS OWN MUSIC STYLE - By Bill Becker

Musician Jerry Gray, who Saturday played the dance music at El Mirador, is through arranging fame for other people; from now on he intends to beat out his own path to the big time.

Gray, whose arrangements boosted the Artie Shaw and Glenn Miller bands to the top before the war, is pushing out with his own orchestra in a big recording drive that he hopes will: (1) establish him as a leader, and (2) subdue the current rash of Miller-style bands.

"I never wanted to cash in on Glenn's reputation," says Gray, whose scoring of "Chattanooga Choo Choo" and his own "String of Pearls" and "Pennsylvania 6-5000" became Miller hallmarks.

"But with these new bands coming up and playing what they think is Miller music, I decided it was time to step in and produce some of the real stuff."

He made it plain that he has no quarrel with Tex Beneke, the man who took over the Miller band and maintained many of the ideas of the leader who apparently crashed in the English Channel on a London to Paris flight in 1944. (The plane was never found.)

It's the others who had no connection with Miller that Gray objects to, but politely declines to name. Gray, like most of the Miller organization, followed the leader into the Air Force. "St. Louis Blues March" was the arranger's best wartime product.

What Gray calls "the real stuff" is full-bodied orchestration that features lush reeds on slow ballads and hard-driving brass on rhythm numbers. Sharp attack is the keynote of the styles which Gray helped to evolve for both Miller and Shaw.


Now only 33, Boston-born Gray began as a violinist-accordionist in his home town at the age of 15. His work came to the attention of another Bostonian, Shaw, then in the process of organizing a band.

Gray's arranging of "Sobbin' Blues" and "Cream Puff" made Shaw's first record in 1936 an item that still intrigues collectors. Then came Gray's scoring of "Begin the Beguine" that put Shaw in the groove leading straight to the top. The Shaw-Gray parlay was a winner until 1940, when Artie disbanded and Jerry went over to Miller.

Again Gray – who never played in either orchestra – proved the power behind the throne. His steady stream of what the trade calls "solid instrumentals" made Miller style a favorite of dancers here and abroad.

Since the war, Gray has been doing well in radio work, but the itch to have a big band finally got to him. His recording orchestra numbers 18 musicians, several of them from the old Shaw and Miller combines.

His second coupling – "Crew-Cut" (his own) and "By the Waters of Minnetonka" – is a dancehappy blending reminiscent of both Miller and Shaw. The first release, "Sitting By the Window" and "Just Like Old Times," is slanted strictly for devotees of the old Miller way with ballads.
