Appearing with the Gray musical group will be singers Bobby Troup and Pam Garner.

Show To Set Stage For Video Success – By DICK ALEXANDER

The University of Arizona will be the scene tonight of a show-dance that will set the stage for a nationwide television series starring TV personality-musician Bobby Troup.

Troup arrived last night from Hollywood with singer Pam Garner and band leader Jerry Gray for a program at the Student Union Bldg. beginning at 8:30 p.m.

The show will be video-taped and will be the forerunner of a new 26-week TV show featuring Troup as emcee, Miss Garner, Jerry Gray, and three name bands, playing from college campuses across the country.

The idea of the program is to bring back to university campuses the era of name bands, admittedly missing from the campuses for the past several years.

Other bands to be featured on the programs are the orchestras of Lionel Hampton, Les Brown, and Richard Maltby. The series will also present two "surprise" orchestras from a triumvirate of Duke Ellington, Woody Herman, and Stan Kenton.

Appearing on tonight's program will be the U of A singing group, The Choraliers. Troup said a singing group will be presented from each campus, with an award going to the best outfit at the conclusion of the half-year-show, which could expand into a 52-week affair.

All the shows will be video-taped for the series, which could begin next month. Miss Garner, a hip singer, appeared here a couple of years ago at the old Desert Inn nightclub on E. Speedway Blvd.

Troup, who is married to singer-actress Julie London, also appeared in Tucson a couple of years ago, and was seen locally on television with his own show, featuring name talent. Saturday night the package show will appear on the campus of Arizona State University in Tempe. Future programs call for dates at Ivy League campuses in the East, West Point, and the Virginia Military Institute.

The shows will have their origin on the U of A campus. Gray is a veteran arranger-conductor, who is responsible for many of the great arrangements of the late Glenn Miller band.

Julie London, former wife of "Dragnet" star Jack Webb, will appear Monday night in a dramatic show on the Barbara Stanwyck program. On Jan. 15, she will be featured on a CBS-TV spectacular, "The Gershwin Years," emceed by composer Richard Rodgers.

LOGAN – The junior class of USU made the most of the ruins of Rome as they transformed the Union Building into an ancient city for Junior Prom dancing Friday night.

Each year during winter quarter the junior class officers, Merlin Olsen, Dick Manning, Rosemary Wangsgaard, and committeemen take the assignment of creating a distinct atmosphere for one of the biggest and most decorative dances of the year. Planners of the prom under the chairmanship of Noel Stoker chose "Roma Antiqua" (Ancient Rome) as this year's theme.

Every corner and available floor space of the Union Building was in use from the Sky Room on the top floor to the fountain in the basement. Paul Allen and Bonnie Dansie, decorations chairmen, imported seven large fountains, water and gardens included, to adorn the Roman forum.

Mountain of Fountain

Juniors attending the dance who admired the largest fountain, 8 ft. by 8 ft., included Ann Richards and Jerry Thompson, Linda Merrill and John Budge, Joanne Rollins and Joel Fransen, Pat Turner and Charles Stoddard, Cammy Howard and Bob Wood, Margo Thompson and Dave Jones.

Those prom attenders who were not dancing to the music of Jerry Gray and his orchestra in the main ballroom were probably enjoying the music of the combo in the UB fountain. Curtains and Roman tables covered the refreshment center where Grecian girls served a variety of Roman drinks, appetizers and grapes.

Red Carpet Unrolled

During intermission the Junior Prom queen candidates, Judy Lunt, Jeanne Merkley, Peggy Preston, Ann Richards, Judy Larsen, Gerry Law, Linda Merrill, Bonnie Davies, Linda Harshbarger, and Mary Gaddie were introduced and the queen escorted down a red carpet runway and crowned by last year's queen, Geniel Anderson.

During the past week a 70-ft. banner, painted by Cheryl Parry, was strung through the UB announcing the dance. The pre-advertising campaign also included a display of Roman statues in the Union Building gallery. The statues were obtained from the USU art department and outside sources by Gaylin Thomas, gallery chairman.

Luck's Against Tux

This year the prom committee announced that tuxedos were not in order for dress and that dark suits would take their place. The usual reactions including letters to the student newspaper editor and dull rumbles of displeasure were heard from students after the decision.

It seems two years ago around 1,000 couples attended the dance. Last year when tuxedos were in order only approximately 400 couples attended. The prom committee drew their own conclusions and again are trying dark suits.

Burris Strikes Again

An original junior prom assembly was presented Tuesday to introduce the prom theme and queen candidates. The music and words for the musical comedy were written by Keith Burris with Roger Dutson casting and Susan Brown directing the production.

One of the highlights of New Year's Eve in Reno will be dining and dancing to the music of Jerry Gray and his Band of Today which will be spotlighted in the Shore Room of Newt Crumley's Holiday Hotel on Saturday, Dec 30, from 8 p.m. till midnight and New Year's Eve, Dec 31 at 9 p.m. till the late hours.

Aside from his spectacular dance music career, Gray has arranged and backed many top vocalists on recordings which include Damone, Whiting, and Froman. His credits also include three musicals for Universal International Pictures, recordings with Capitol, Mercury, Columbia, Decca, and Liberty, a long list of radio and television shows, tours with top shows as Nat Cole and Judy Garland and having played top ballrooms from coast to coast.



"Controlled hysteria." That was how Ralph Gleason, the columnist for the *San Francisco Chronicle*, described backstage at the San Jose Civic Auditorium on the night of December 4, as Barbra and her musicians and engineers prepared for her concert that night. Wisecracking stage manager Jerry Frank was rehearsing the lighting crew, who stood in a semi-circle around him. "At the end of *Quiet Time*," Frank said, "she holds the note longer than the Bank of America." He told the guys to hold the spot on Barbra until she was finished. Then it was "Cue orchestra, then out!" Looking down the list of songs, the stage manager added, "At *Down With Love* you go up, hold it a minute, then out!" Their instructions in place, the crew scurried off to their places.

Outside, the fans were lining up, waiting for the three-thousand-seat arena to open its doors. Gleason stood in the shadows watching it all, taking notes as he spoke with Marty Erlichman. "It takes her a year to work into a song," Marty told the reporter. "That song, *Quiet Time*, is the first time she's done it in public. She's had it for a year and taped it and listened to it and changed it around. That's why there's no arrangement. She has to work it out like that until she's satisfied. Then there'll be an arrangement."

"Spotlight out, out!" Frank yelled into his phone.

"She got *Happy Days* from the Garry Moore Show," Marty continued, as Gleason scribbled copious notes. "She was supposed to go on and do a quick bit ... and when the piano player started it, ta ta ta, da da do do, she said, "I don't sing songs like that, can we try it as a ballad?" Everybody thought it wouldn't work, but she sang it as a ballad and Joe Hamilton, the director, ran up and said, "Keep it in, keep it in!"

Conductor Jerry Gray passed them, heading into the audience to check on how the music sounded from far away. Peter Daniels was up on the stage, warming up the orchestra for him.

• • • • •

An unusually chilly night added to the jitters in the box office. [Advance ticket sales hadn't quite kept up with the other venues.] That was why Barbra had ventured out of her dressing room to check with Marty. That was also why Marty was taking the time to speak with Ralph Gleason. Next up after this was a concert in San Francisco, and Marty was taking no chances. He hoped that a good write-up from Gleason would ensure a rush on tickets.

"She does it herself," Marty continued telling Gleason, as final preparations were made to open the doors and let in the crowd.

Finally, the stage hands and the lighting crew were ready. The doors were opened. She gave them an hour of her songs and patter – "a lot for your money," Gleason wrote, "from a girl whose stage confidence belies her twenty-one years."

Streisand is a young woman who's accomplished singing voice, brazen assurance and kookie iridescence catapulted her from Brooklyn into a Broadway musical within a matter of months.

Subsequent television and club appearances and a wave of promotion by Columbia Records for whom she has made two albums, accelerated her still expanding career.

Even so it was somewhat surprising that San Francisco's Masonic Auditorium was sold out for the concert inasmuch as it was Miss Streisand's first such California appearance and had been staged on short notice with publicity consequently limited.

The big shock, however, did not come until the evening's end.

There was no hint of it in the program's first half, which began with an instrumental segment by the Jerry Gray Orchestra, whose leader, incidentally, was not present. Fifteen minutes later Miss Streisand and her pianist came on stage with a string section to augment Gray's 12 musicians.

During intermission the microphone was turned up a couple of points and the sound of the program's second half was excellent.

The mystical quality that later was to flower became evident as the orchestra played a medley of tunes written or arranged by Gray and made famous by the Glenn Miller Orchestra, of which he was a member for a half-dozen years. As the listeners recognized each tune they applauded. Though such manifestations of the emotion that Miller – gone now 20 years – still stirs, are common and beyond understanding.

When Miss Streisand returned she was the picture of sophistication in a jet black sequined evening gown and with smartly coiffed hair. [Author's Note: This was in contrast to the "Gibson Girl type grey jumper and white blouse, with floor length skirt of the first half of this program.]

The songs she sang also bore the mark of careful professional attention, even to the point – as on "Cry Me A River" – of contrivance, yet on ballads like "Color Him Gray" and "Who Will Buy?" she established a consistently tender mood.

Her belting arrangement of "Lovin' Arms" and tongue-in-cheek version of "Lover Come Back To Me" won ovations and, together with the mimicry and comedy involved in other numbers attested to her versatility.

Variety reported Streisand's show take at the Temple Auditorium grossed \$13,300 – ticket prices ranged from \$2.75 to \$4.75.

Volunteer Firemen's Fund Ball Set Saturday Night at Indio

Dancing to the beat of Jerry Gray's 15-piece orchestra, plus local talent and nationally known TV entertainers, will be the highlights of this year's fourth annual firemen's ball, to be held in the Taj Mahal on the fair grounds at Indio at 8:30 p.m. Saturday. The event is sponsored by the Coachella Valley Volunteer Firemen's Association.

Jerry Gray proved to be so popular last year that he was immediately signed up on the spot for this year's affair.


If you have not already received a letter through the mails or responded to a knock on your door, chances are that you soon will for the firemen throughout the valley want to contact as many people as possible. The support that the volunteer fireman program gives to each of the fourteen stations in the valley is considerable. Money derived from these annual balls goes wholly to support this program by purchasing protective clothing, tone-activated radio receivers (which the firemen have in their homes and by which they receive their orders for fire calls), first aid kits, smoke ejectors, self-contained breathing paks and other equipment.

The latter is to a fireman what an aqua lung is to a skin diver, permitting him to breath under water. The fireman uses his to breathe in places filled with smoke or poisonous fumes so that he can do a better and faster job of fire suppression, and to make otherwise impossible rescues of persons overcome by fumes or smoke.

The association has purchased 121 radios, and placed them in the homes of firemen throughout the valley. The cost is \$110 each. Six resuscitators were purchased, at an average cost of \$350. The breathing paks run around \$275, and there are 11 of these.

All of the money taken in from the previous three balls has been spent on such equipment, plus about \$8,500 contributed by the firemen themselves. These men are paid \$2.39 an hour for their time on fires. Most of them turn in the checks received for this to the support of their individual departments.



When you think of that great swing number – almost a classic now – "String of Pearls," who comes to mind? Glenn Miller? When you hum "Begin the Beguine" Artie Shaw?

You're only half-right. Because the man behind the throne, as it were, was the great Jerry Gray – arranger, composer, and musician extraordinaire now with his Band of Today, one of the headliners in the Topaz Room of North Lake Tahoe's Nevada Lodge.

Gray, composer of "Pennsylvania 6-5000" and "String of Pearls" and arranger in the Miller mood of "Chattanooga Choo Choo," "Moonlight Cocktails," "Adios," and "Elmer's Tune," directs his Band of Today for the exciting "Vive Les Girls" revue at the Nevada Lodge.

From the age of three, when he put two sticks together and made like a fiddle, Gray was destined to become a musician. His father, uncle, and grandfather were all musicians. When the stick fiddle came into sight, his dad took it as a sign that the violin would be the chosen instrument. He had visions of his son playing concert violin with the local Boston Symphony Orchestra.

All the time Jerry attended the schools of Boston where he was born, he practiced his violin faithfully, but every penny he had went into buying records of the big-name bands of the day, namely Isham Jones, Benny Goodman, and the Casa Loma Orchestra.

Jerry Gray started playing with the Boston bands at the age of 15 and got interested in arranging. He spent every spare moment writing arrangements for all the bands he worked with. His work came to the attention of another New Englander, Artie Shaw, then organizing a band.

Gray's arranging of "Sobbin' Blues" made Shaw's first recording in 1936 an item that still intrigues collectors. Then came Jerry's famous scoring of "Begin The Beguine" that put Shaw right on top. The Shaw-Gray association was a winner until 1940 when Shaw disbanded and Jerry Gray went over with Miller.

Again Gray proved the power behind the throne. His steady stream of what the trade calls "solid instrumentals" made the Miller style a favorite of dancers here and abroad. His scoring of "Chattanooga Choo Choo," "Moonlight Cocktails," "Adios," "Elmer's Tune," and many others are still popular today and re-released by the Miller Band on Victor records. His own compositions done for Miller are still best sellers – "A String of Pearls" and "Pennsylvania 6-5000."

Gray followed Miller into the service and "St. Louis Blues March" was Jerry's best wartime product. Gray and Miller often talked about their plans when he got home from overseas when the war was over. Part of Jerry's plans were to form his own band and Miller was going to help.

Upon his discharge from the Air Force, Jerry's first job was to land the coveted NBC Philip Morris Show with Johnny Desmond, Herb Shriner, and Margaret Whiting.

In addition to the radio show, Jerry arranged and backed many vocalists on records, Vic Damone, Margaret Whiting, Jane Froman, etc.

Following the Philip Morris Show, Jerry went to the West Coast to do a five-year stint on the CBS show Club 15 for Campbell Soups, with Bob Crosby, the Andrews Sisters, and Dick Haymes.

It was during this period that Gray started branching out with his dance band playing college dates and ballroom dates in and around California. His opening ballroom date at the world-famous Hollywood Palladium was a smash beginning and then he started recording for Decca and has hundreds of record releases plus four best-selling albums.

Milt Rogers brought Justin Gordon into the Billy Vaughn organization. It was Gordon who provided the distinctive twin alto harmony that would make help Billy Vaughn a household name.

Gordon: "When Dot started recording in Los Angeles, the first thing I did for them was the Gale Storm session when she recorded Ivory Tower. The first time I worked with Billy Vaughn was a Pat Boone session, the time he recorded Friendly Persuasion.

"We had to cover a record called Raunchy. Randy Wood thought it was going to be a big hit. I played the sax solo. It was going to be put out on a little 45rpm single, and we were wondering what the hell to put on the back. Billy said, "Well, I've got a little old song here called Sail Along Silvery Moon and I think it would go just great. I'd like to have it with two saxophones and I'd like to have Justin play both parts."

Justin Gordon recently explained at length how the twin saxophone sound was created. "We had it down to a science. First, we would record the songs and I'd play the melody. Then after everybody had left, I'd stay for perhaps an hour or so and overdub the things we had recorded.

We didn't waste any time. Sometimes we'd do twelve tunes in one session. It was easy if I had a competent engineer who knew what he was doing and could set it up to suit me. I could not play wearing earphones, because I couldn't hear myself. What he had to do was set up a small speaker next to me that I could hear, and play the music very low. I could hear what I had done on the first session, and then match it. I very carefully marked all my parts, like where did I take a breath, how long did I hold this note, how long did I hold the last note, and so forth. I got to be pretty efficient at it. I could overdub an album in an hour. Occasionally, when they were pressed for time, they would have one of the other guys play the second part, but they really preferred the sound of one guy playing both parts, which was fortunate for me."

The big-band sound has come to Reno at the Hotel Riverside with Jerry Gray and his "Band of Today." Also appearing with Gray in the main showroom is creative jazz singer Anita O'Day and singing comedy star Bill Dungan.

Now recording for DOT recording company, Gray is best known for his orchestration which was typical of the Glenn Miller era. Gray is recognized as one of the great song-writers and arrangers, as well as a giant among the orchestrators.

Gray has written such million-sellers as "A String of Pearls," "Re-Stringing the Pearls," "Pennsylvania 6-5000," "Flag Waver," and "Jeep Jockey Jump." He has done the arrangements for such million-sellers as "Begin The Beguine," "St. Louis Blues March," "In The Mood," "Adios," and "Anvil Chorus."

Gray and his band are heard on over 30 albums containing more than 300 of his arrangements, and he just recently scored "Michelle" for the Billy Vaughn Orchestra which turned out to be another million-seller for Jerry.

Gray also has been working on and off with Henry Mancini scoring motion pictures, but in between he works dance dates with his own orchestra with which he played most of the major theatres in the country as well as top ballrooms and hotel locations throughout the world.

For four years, Jerry Gray's orchestra was heard on the CBS show, "Club 15," and is a favorite with dancers and listeners the world over.

Now those days of yesteryear can be relived at the Hotel Riverside where Jerry Gray and his orchestra can be heard nightly with such all-time favorites as "Star Dust," "In The Mood," "Who's Sorry Now," "Shine On Harvest Moon," and "Stars Fell On Alabama."

The swing to the big band sound fills a needed void in the Reno entertainment scene, according to Bernie Richter, co-owner of the Hotel Riverside.

On the same show is jazz star Anita O'Day who possesses the natural qualities of husky tone, drive, control, rhythmic sense, and confidence which mark the style of any good jazz singer.

With Gray and O'Day is singing comedy star Bill Dungan who projects a gracious manner into his songs, yet his versatility goes from slap-stick to sophistication.

Anita O'Day Displaying Jazz Style at Riverside

Anita O'Day, currently sharing the spotlight with Jerry Gray and Bill Dungan at the Riverside Hotel, was once fired from a job in 1940 because she didn't sing the melody. She went on to become one of the nation's top jazz singers and remains today as an influential force in the field of jazz vocalizing.

Anita's first job at singing came as an emergency substitute for an ailing principal at a small Chicago club where she worked in the chorus. This led to a job as a singing waitress at the famous Kitty Davis Club on Wabash in 1937. It was during that engagement that Downbeat editor Carl Cons heard her and subsequently gave her billing at his new Offbeat Club, where she worked for nearly two years with such greats as Max Miller, Roy Eldridge, Art Tatum, Wingy Manone, Jimmy McPartland, Stuff Smith, and other jazz stars of the day.

From the instrumentalists, Anita learned the lift, the phrasing, the accents, and the improvisational ideas that mark her style. When applied to the natural qualities that she possessed – the husky tone, the drive, the control, the uninhibitedness, the rhythmic sense, and the confidence – the result was a truly creative jazz singer, and Anita O'Day joined the select group of "originals."

Anita joined the Gene Krupa band in 1941, and her rise to national prominence during the next two years encompassed all the leading hotels, ballrooms, theatres, clubs, and radio shows from coast to coast. It was while she was with Krupa that she cut her first Columbia recording. Her version of "Let Me Off Uptown" alone sold over a million and a half copies.

Anita went out on her own to tour the country as a single and record for Capitol, and then joined Stan Kenton's new band and recorded "And Her Tears Flowed Like Wine," another million plus seller and Kenton's first hit. She won the Downbeat, Metronome, and Esquire awards, and other recording "Are You Livin', Old Man" was voted the best record in 1944.

She made several movies for Universal-International and shortly thereafter rejoined the Krupa band and recorded her third million seller, "Boogie Blues." Her reappearance with Krupa at New York's Paramount Theater in 1945 brought one of the greatest ovations in that theater's history. In less than five years, Anita O'Day was at the pinnacle, and she still didn't sing the melody straight.

Anita's merits are many and in 1960 she went into semi-retirement only to prove that she was not only a singer, but a musician, composer, arranger, movie star, and writer. Not one to be idle for any length of time, it wasn't long before she came out of retirement and back into the spotlight.

Many talented and informed writers have attempted to describe Anita's singing and her status as a singer, and in one thought they are in general agreement: when people say jazz singer, they think of Anita O'Day.

Anita O'Day, the jazz singer, sums it up with her own observation: "I'll sing until I die – not necessarily jazz but all music."

That is exactly what she is offering patrons of the Riverside Hotel's Show Lounge.


