Fellowships and Grants for Anthropology Students Field

Dolores Zohrab Liebmann Fellowship

The Will of Dolores Zohrab Liebmann created a perpetual charitable trust designated as "The Dolores Zohrab Liebmann Fund" for the purpose of funding advanced education and graduate study grants, which must be carried out entirely in the United States of America. The Dolores Zohrab Liebmann Fellowships are to be awarded only to candidates who have outstanding undergraduate records, have demonstrated a need for financial assistance, are citizens of the United States of America, are enrolled in accredited colleges and universities in the United States and have received baccalaureate degrees. Each Fellowship will cover actual tuition cost (no fees) plus an \$18,000 annual stipend to be allocated towards room, board and ordinary living expenses, as well as any income taxes thereon.

Social Science Research Council (SSRC)

Mellon International Dissertation Field Research Fellowships [IDRF] Approximately 68 fellowships averaging \$21,000 each will be awarded; there is no citizenship requirement. Support for social scientists and humanists to conduct 9-12 months of dissertation field research on all areas or regions of the world outside of the US. The IDRF program is committed to scholarship that advances knowledge about non-US cultures and societies grounded in empirical and site-specific research (involving fieldwork, research in archival or manuscript collections, or quantitative data collection). The program promotes research that is situated in a specific discipline and geographical region and is engaged with interdisciplinary and cross-regional perspectives.

Wenner-Gren Foundation for Anthropological Research, Inc.

Dissertation Fieldwork Grants of a maximum of \$20,000 to support basic research in all branches of anthropology. No citizenship requirement.

National Science Foundation Doctoral Dissertation Research Improvement Awards

(NSF-DDRIG) Grants of \$15,000-\$20,000 (depending on the program) each to support Anthropological fieldwork virtually anywhere in the world; there is no citizenship requirement (because the awards are technically made to the University). There are NSF programs in Cultural Anthropology, Law and Social Sciences, Science and Society, Linguistics, Archaeology, and Physical Anthropology. For applications that fit, there may be better odds with Law and Social Sciences and with Science and Society than with Cultural Anthropology.

HUD Doctoral Dissertation Research Grant Program

For completion of a dissertation on housing and urban development issues. Approx 15 fellowships per year of \$15,000 each. Recipients must be admitted to candidacy and able to complete the dissertation within two years.

American Philosophical Society Lewis and Clark Fund for Exploration and Field Research

Awards of up to \$5000 for exploratory field studies for the collection of specimens and data and to provide the imaginative stimulus that accompanies direct observation. Applications are invited from disciplines with a large dependence on field studies, such as archaeology, anthropology, ecology, linguistics, and paleontology. Grants are available [only] to doctoral students; postdoctoral fellows, master's degree candidates, and undergraduates are not eligible. Competition is open to US residents wishing to carry out research anywhere in the world. Foreign applicants must either be based at a US institution or plan to carry out their work in the US.

Lincoln Institute of Land Policy C. Lowell Harriss Dissertation Fellowships

The Lincoln Institute's C. Lowell Harriss Dissertation Fellowship Program assists Ph.D. students, primarily at U.S. universities, whose research complements the Institute's interests in land and tax policy. The program provides an important link between the Institute's educational mission and its research objectives by supporting scholars early in their careers.

Grants are available for both fieldwork and dissertation write up, international students are eligible to apply. Applicants must be ABD.

Dan David Prize Scholarship (Tel Aviv University)

20 scholarships of US \$15,000 annually awarded to outstanding doctoral candidates and postdoctoral researchers (students from this Department have held this for both Field Work and Write-Up) of exceptional promise in the year's chosen fields. (Topics for the fellowships change each year) Awarded to students at universities throughout the world and at Tel Aviv University, there are no citizenship restrictions. Research must be in one of the selected fields/topics for the

year in which the application is being made.

National Institute of Health - Ruth L. Kirschstein National Research Service Awards for Individual Predoctoral Fellowships

The National Institute of Mental Health [NIMH], the National Institute on Drug Abuse [NIDA], the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism [NIAAA] provide National Research Service Awards (NRSAs) to individuals for research training in specified areas of biomedical and behavioral research. US citizens and permanent residents are eligible to apply. NIH has an elaborate Web site, including the downloadable application, which you should consult.

Jacobs Research Funds, Whatcom Museum Society

Grants to individuals of up to \$3000 supporting linguistic and anthropological research on the indigenous peoples of North and South America -- with a preference for the Pacific Northwest. Projects that produce new data are the highest priority, including proposals to digitize, transcribe, and translate old materials that might otherwise become lost or inaccessible. Most funded projects fall within linguistics (including ethnolinguistics, sociolinguistics, and world view) or anthropology (including social-cultural anthropology, social organization, political organization, and folk taxonomy). Projects in religion, mythology, music, dance, and other areas are also eligible. (Awards of \$6000 to 2 or more collaborators, or \$9000 to individual researchers requiring an intense period of fieldwork are occasionally made.) No citizenship restriction, open to students at all levels of a degree program so long as the project is relevant. (Pre-MA applicants must have a faculty sponsor.)

Firebird Foundation for Anthropological Research, Inc.

Grants of up to \$10,000 for anthropologists and linguists for the collection of the disappearing oral literature of indigenous peoples. Literature may consist of ritual texts, curative chants, epic poems, musical genres, folk tales, songs, myths, legends, historical accounts, life history narratives, word games, etc. Grants are made for purchasing recording equipment and covering the expenses of collecting the material. Applicants are encouraged to foster the development of local teams of collectors to continue the work of recording these materials. Transcriptions of the recordings are encouraged. Copies of the recordings, transcriptions and other documents are to be deposited and archived at the Program for Oral Literature.

American Philosophical Society Phillips Fund for Native American Research

Grants of up to \$3500 to support research in Native American linguistics, ethnohistory, and the history of studies of Native Americans, in the continental US and Canada. (Grants are NOT made for projects in archaeology, ethnography, or psycholinguistics). Applications are accepted

from graduate students for research on masters theses or doctoral dissertations.

Memorial Foundation for Jewish Culture

Fellowships of up to \$10,000/year for up to a maximum of four years for doctoral students who are admitted to candidacy ("dissertation approved") and are specializing in a Jewish field.

EAST ASIA (China, Japan, Korea)

Esherick-Ye Family Foundation Grants

Small grants of up to \$5000 for travel to China for research or fieldwork for projects in modern Chinese economic, social, and political history or Chinese Archaeology. Grants may be used to supplement other grants (such as Fulbright) which limit travel to a single country (e.g., a grant for research in the PRC could be supplemented by an Esherick-Ye Foundation grant for additional research in Taiwan, or vice versa.)

American Center for Mongolian Studies (ACMS) Field Research Fellowships

Short-Term Fellowships of up to \$4000 for research in Mongolia (minimum of 6 weeks, May-Oct) on topics in the Social Sciences or Humanities. Research must be conducted under the supervision of a Research Sponsor. Students (US citizens only) may be either Pre-Field or "In the Field"

Japan Foundation (Doctoral Fellowships category)

Fellowships for doctoral candidates in the humanities and social sciences for research in Japan. Duration 4-14 months; applicants must have sufficient proficiency in the Japanese language to pursue their research in Japan.

EUROPE (Western)

Chateaubriand Fellowships in Humanities and Social Sciences

French Government Fellowships for doctoral dissertation research in France (4-8 months), in association with a French research institution. (Applicants must obtain a letter of invitation from a Professor in French university or research institution. Open to students (except French citizens) studying for the Ph.D. in US Universities. Fellowship provides €1500 per month for up to 8 months + health insurance & airfare.

Camargo Foundation (FRANCE)

The Camargo Foundation offers the use of its residence center and reference library at no cost to advanced graduate students and scholars in the writing process of their advanced research. Work must be related to France or Francophone cultures. The residence center is located in Cassis, France (near Marseille and Aix-en-Provence), and therefore the research/writing in question must be possible at that location. The Camargo Fellowship is strictly a residential grant. Funds for board, travel, research, etc. must be obtained from other sources.

Alexander von HUMBOLDT Foundation German Chancellor Fellowships

Fellowships for 12 months of research in Germany in such fields as the arts, humanities, social and policy sciences, law, journalism and communications, management, finance, and economics, at a German university and /or research institution. Applicants may also arrange to pursue professional activity through internships, junior staff positions, or training programs with appropriate organizations. The fellowships are aimed at prospective leaders in academics, business, and government to strengthen US-German ties. US citizens no more than 35 years of age. Fluency in German is useful but not required.

DAAD Research Grants (Ph.D. Candidates & Recent PhDs)

Short-term grants of 1-5 months to enable Ph.D. candidates (& recent PhDs) to carry on study or research at universities or institutes in Germany (Can be used either for research related to an MA or Ph.D. here – or to pursue a degree at a German university) Requires adequate knowledge of German language to carry out the proposed research. Open to US and Canadian citizens and international students enrolled in doctoral programs in the US and Canada.

Berlin Program for Advanced German & European Studies

Based at the Free University of Berlin, the purpose of this fellowship is to encourage the comparative and interdisciplinary study of the economic, political, and social aspects of modern

and contemporary German and European affairs. Awards are for 9-12 months; citizens and permanent residents of the US and Canada are eligible to apply; fellowships are for dissertation research or for young PhDs who have received the degree in the last 2 years.

ZEIT-Stiftung "Trajectories of Change" Ph.D. Scholarships (2017 Focus: Reshaping the Public Sphere)

Ph.D. Scholarships – for Ph.D. students already enrolled in a Ph.D. The scholarship programme "Trajectories of Change" addresses historical and current transformation processes in the European neighborhood (Western & Eastern Europe, North Africa, Middle East, Central Asia). It offers stipends and fieldwork grants for Ph.D. students in the humanities and social sciences. For 2017, research applications dealing with the changing public spheres and their impact on transformation are especially welcome. The programme offers flexible funding schemes for Ph.D. students at various stages of their dissertation research as well as for graduate students in the phase of Ph.D. project development: program, duration up to 3 years, Stipend 1200 Euros/month (approx. USD 1400) + conference funds

Dissertation Completion Scholarships – one year/12 month awards, 1200 Euros/mo + conference funds Pre-Doctoral Research Grants – Single grants of a maximum of 5000 Euros to support dissertation project development + conference funds

Fieldwork Grants – Single grants of max. 3000 Euros supporting travel costs and research expenses during fieldwork (grant seen as supplemental to other funding from other institutions) + conference funds

American-Scandinavian Foundation

Grants (up to \$23,000) for up to one year (summer to summer) for research in Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden. Applicants must have a well-defined research or study project that makes a stay in Scandinavia essential; prior ability in the language of the host country is desirable, as is an academic or professional affiliation in Scandinavia.

Council of American Overseas Research Centers (CAORC) Multi-Country Research Fellowship

The Council of American Overseas Research Centers Multi-Country Research Fellowship Program supports advanced regional or trans-regional research in the humanities, social sciences, or allied natural sciences for U.S. doctoral candidates and scholars who have already earned their Ph.D. Preference will be given to candidates examining comparative and/or cross-regional research. Scholars must carry out research for a minimum of 90 days in two or more countries outside the United States, at least one of which hosts a participating American overseas research center. Approximately eight awards of up to \$11,000 each will be given each year.

EUROPE (Eastern & Russia)

American Councils for International Education ACTR-ACCELS Programs

All of these programs are funded by the US Department of State, Program for the Study of Eastern Europe and the Independent States of the Former Soviet Union (Title VIII); the application is thus restricted to US citizens and permanent residents. Relevant countries are Belarus, Central Asia, Russia, the South Caucasus, Southeastern Europe, Ukraine, and Moldova. Fellowships include round-trip international travel, housing, living stipends, visas, insurance, affiliation fees, archival access, research advising, and logistical field support in the field. NOTE: "Scholars in the humanities and social sciences are eligible to apply. While a wide range of topics (listed on the web and easily accessible, take a look AMC) receive support each year, all funded research must contribute to a body of knowledge enabling the US to better understand the region and formulate effective policies within it. All applicants should clearly describe the policy relevance of their work, be it in anthropology, literature, history, international relations, political science, or some other field."

Research Scholar Program (More likely for FIELDWORK than pre-field research)

Fellowships valued at \$5000-\$25,000 for 3-9 months research trips to 13 countries in Eastern Europe and the Independent States of the former USSR [list on the web site]. (Applications for support of research in more than one country are acceptable.) Applications require a 700-word synopsis of the research in the language of the proposed host country

Combined Research and Language Training Program (Definitely either Pre-Field or Field Work) Fellowships valued at \$5,000-\$25,000 for 3 to 9 months of advanced language training (10 hours per week of private tutorials – prerequisite is at least an intermediate level of proficiency in Russian or the proposed host-country language) and research support in 13 countries in Eastern Europe and the Independent States of the former USSR [list on the web site]. (Applications for support of research in more than one country are acceptable.) Applications require a 700-word synopsis of the research in the language of the proposed host country.

LATIN AMERICA

Inter-America Foundation (IAF) Grassroots Development Fellowship Program

Fellowships to conduct dissertation research in the independent countries in Latin America and the Caribbean (except Cuba) on topics related to grassroots development. Funding is for 4-12 months. Applicants must be currently enrolled in a US university and must be citizens of the US or an independent country in Latin America or the Caribbean (except Cuba). Applicants must demonstrate a substantive collaboration with a development or applied research institute in the Latin American or Caribbean country of the research. Fellowship supplies round-trip transportation, a research allowance of up to \$3000, a stipend of \$1500/month for up to 12 months, and health insurance. This fellowship does NOT cost-share with any other grant very well.

Junior Fellowships for dissertation research/write-up in-residence at Dumbarton Oaks in fields of Byzantine Studies (including related aspects of late Roman, early Christian, western medieval, Slavic, and Near East studies), and Pre-Columbian Studies (of Mexico, Central America, and Andean South America). The project must be relevant to the holdings of Dumbarton Oaks.

MIDDLE EAST

ACOR (American Center of Oriental Research)

Amman, Jordan Various fellowships for pre-field, field, and post-docs for both social/cultural anthropology and archaeology. The most relevant: ACOR-CAORC Fellowships: 2-6 months, maximum award \$23,800, open to all areas of the humanities and social sciences, topics should contribute to scholarship in Near Eastern Studies; US citizenship required; fellows must be at the ACOR facility in Amman while conducting their research; Jennifer C. Groot Fellowship: \$1500 to support beginners in archaeological fieldwork [undergrads & graduate students] who have been accepted as staff members on archaeological projects in Jordan w/ ASOR/CAP affiliation; US & Canadian citizens; Harrell Family Fellowship: \$2000 to support a graduate student for participation in an ACOR supported/funded archaeological project.

Institute of Turkish Studies

Grants (in various categories) for supporting and encouraging the development of Turkish studies in American higher education. Summer Language Study Fellowships of \$1000-\$3000 for US citizens/permanent residents. Dissertation WRITING Grants of \$5000-\$15,000 for the Write-up of a dissertation related to Turkey (grant may not be used for in-country research).

ARIT (American Research Institute in Turkey)

Fellowships for 3-12 months of research in Turkey on ancient, medieval, or modern topics (making use of ARIT's facilities in Istanbul and Ankara) for doctoral candidates and post-docs in any field of the social sciences and humanities. Stipends generally range from \$2500-\$15,500.

ARCE (American Research Center in Egypt)

3-12 month fellowships for doctoral candidates and postdocs for research in Egypt in Archaeology, Social Sciences & Humanities, Islamic Studies, Art & Architecture, Development, Egyptology

CAORC (Council of American Overseas Research Centers) Multi- Country Research Fellowship

Supports regional or trans-regional research in the humanities and social sciences for US doctoral candidates and postdoctoral scholars. Preference will be given to candidates doing comparative and/or cross-regional research. Applicants are eligible to apply as individuals or in teams. Scholars must carry out research in 2 or more countries outside the US, at least one of which hosts a participating American Overseas Research Center. US citizens only.

AIMS (American Institute for Maghrib Studies) (North Africa)

Grants for doctoral and post-doctoral research pertaining to North Africa in any field, with a strong preference for a project involving fieldwork in North Africa. AIMS offers 2 categories of grants: 1) Short Term Travel Grants (approx 10 per year) covering travel and per diem only with a maximum of \$6000 per grant; these awards may be used in combination with grants from other sources for a project of longer duration. 2) Full Research Grants of up to \$15,000 (approx 5 per year) for 3-9 months duration. Awards provide funds for travel, monthly living allowance, and research activities. US citizens only; recipients of AIMS awards in either of the two previous funding cycles are ineligible to apply. Applicants must be members of AIMS at the time of application.

Palestinian American Research Center (PARC)

Doctoral research fellowships in Palestinian studies for tenures typically of 3-4 months (maximum 12 months) and in amounts ranging from \$6000-\$9,000. (Any area or time period of Palestinian studies will be considered. Research must take place in Palestine, Israel, Jordan, or Lebanon.) Applicants must be US citizens or Permanent Residents and must be admitted to candidacy by the time the fellowship commences.

Lady Davis Fellowship Trust (Israel)

9-12 month fellowships awarded at Hebrew University of Jerusalem or Technion for Doctoral or Post Doctoral (within 4 years of the award of the Ph.D.) research, or for Visiting Professors (research &/or teaching; Associate or Full Professors only). Open to all nationalities, with some preference for Canadian citizens. Prospective candidates must establish contact with the relevant department at Hebrew University or Technion and ensure that there is a scholar willing to sponsor the application.

MUSEUMS, LIBRARIES, FUNDS FOR ARCHAEOLOGISTS & PHYSICAL ANTHROPOLOGY

American Philosophical Society Library, Resident Research Fellowships

1-3 month fellowships of \$3000 per month for doctoral candidates (and post-docs) to use the collections of the American Philosophical Society Library in Philadelphia. Relevant holdings include materials on American Indian languages; anthropology including the papers of Franz Boas; the papers of Charles Darwin and his forerunners, colleagues, critics, and successors; 20th-century medical research; the history of American science and technology and its European roots. (Applicants are strongly encouraged to consult the Library staff by mail or phone regarding the collections.) Fellows are expected to be in- residence during the period of the award. No citizenship requirement.

John Carter BROWN Library Research Fellowships

Fellowships for research in holdings of the John Carter Brown Library at Brown University in Providence Rhode Island. Pre-Doctoral students are only eligible to apply for the Short-Term Fellowships – which are available for periods of two to four months and carry a stipend of \$2100 per month. There is no citizenship requirement; graduate students must have passed their Ph.D. qualifying examinations at the time of application. (Types of JCBL holdings—an extensive collection of primary materials relating to virtually all aspects of the discovery, exploration, settlement, and development of the New World – both North and South America; numerous works dealing with Native Americans in North and South America, including materials on Indian languages; numerous legal works reflecting the response of European legal systems to the growth of overseas empires; major collection on the adaptation of religion and religious institutions to the New World.)

Smithsonian Research Fellowships

For dissertation research done in-residence at the Smithsonian in association with the research staff and using the Institution's resources. (See brochure/Website for possible areas of research.) Available to doctoral candidates for periods of 3-12 months. The stipend is \$15,000 per year; prorated for periods of less than 12 months.

National Gallery of Art (Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts)

Fellowships to support doctoral dissertation work in the history, theory, and criticism of art, architecture, and urbanism. Applicants must have completed graduate course work and Ph.D. qualifying exams before the date of application and must have certification of competence in 2 foreign languages. Applicants must be either US citizens or enrolled in a graduate program in the US. The Fellowships of relevance to anthropology are The Andrew Mellon Fellowship -- \$16,000 annually for 24 months for research in a field other than Western art, to be held partly in residence at the National Gallery of Art, Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts, and partly elsewhere in the US or abroad. The Fellows are expected to spend the second year of the fellowship at the Center to complete the dissertation. The application requires nomination by the

Chair of the Anthropology Department, and the application packet has to be requested by the Dept.

Rust Family Foundation Archaeology Grants Program

Grants from \$5000-\$10,000 (most in the \$5000-\$6000 range) to support small but worthy projects, including initial field seasons, specific components of larger projects, post-excavation analysis, processing, and publication, as well as conservation and preservation projects. The Program is primarily aimed at funding the development and dissemination of direct archaeological evidence gained through field and laboratory work - the main focus of proposals should be to detail the procedures of the gathering of evidence, and how these field and laboratory procedures are designed to help answer major questions about cultural prehistory and development in the region concerned. In the 2018 funding cycle, the Foundation especially invites proposals for projects dedicated to the documentation, protection, or conservation of sites or regions under pervasive or imminent risk from organized looting activities, especially in regions where government protection of archaeological sites or materials is limited. (Application must be made by the Principal Investigator sponsored by an educational or scientific institution. Grants can only be made to tax-exempt non-profit organizations. Florence C. and Robert H. LISTER Fellowship in Southwestern Archaeology \$10,000 stipend to assist a Ph.D. student whose dissertation project is based on archaeological, ethnoarchaeological or paleoenvironmental research in the Southwestern US and Northern Mexico (particularly as related to American Indian cultures). (In some years the fellowship may be restricted to individuals whose research focuses specifically on the archaeology of the Northern San Juan region, an area of particular interest to the Listers. A single fellowship is offered in alternate years and is not renewable.

Various fellowships in amounts ranging from \$3,000 to \$15,000 for Classical Archaeology broadly including Greece, Italy, the Aegean Islands, Sicily, Asia Minor, Mesopotamia and the Western Mediterranean (certain fellowships are limited to certain areas); various citizenship requirements apply depending on the fellowship, all are open to US citizens, some to permanent residents and Canadian Citizens.

Mary Isabel SIBLEY Fellowship (Greek Archaeology - Women)

This Fellowship, administered by the Phi Beta Kappa Society, is awarded alternately in the fields of Greek and French. 2022 is a France year, 2021 Greece, etc. The award (\$20,000) may be used for the study of the Greek language, literature, history, or archaeology or the study of French language or literature. Candidates must be unmarried women between 25 and 35 years of age (inclusive), must be formally admitted to doctoral candidacy (or already hold the doctorate), and must be planning to devote full-time work to research during the fellowship year that begins September 1. Eligibility is NOT restricted to members of Phi Beta Kappa.

Wiener Laboratory, American School of Classical Studies at Athens

To conduct research at the Malcolm H. Wiener Laboratory for Archaeological Science of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens that addresses substantive problems pertaining to the ancient Greek world and adjacent areas through the application of interdisciplinary methods in the archaeological sciences. Laboratory facilities are especially well equipped to support the study of human skeletal biology, archaeobiological remains (faunal and botanical), environmental studies, and geoarchaeology (particularly studies in human-landscape interactions and the study of site formation processes). Research projects utilizing other archaeological scientific approaches are also eligible for consideration, depending on the strength of the questions asked and the suitability of the plan for access to other equipment or resources available elsewhere in Greece. The stipend of \$20,000 for 12 months.
