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Office of Science and Technology Policy Public Access Policy Guidance

In August 2022, the OSTP at the White House issued an updated memorandum (Nelson Memo) calling on federal agencies to make **“articles resulting from all U.S. federally funded research freely available and publicly accessible by default in agency-designated repositories without any embargo or delay after publication.”**

Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) Public Access Memorandum

Key elements of this new guidance

- **Immediate access** to federally funded research articles with no embargo. Previous guidance recommended a 12-month post-publication embargo.

How the Nelson Memo (2022) differs from the Holdren Memo (2014)

- **Immediate access** to federally funded research articles with no embargo. Previous guidance recommended a 12-month post-publication embargo.
- **Immediate public access to scientific data.** Data was not included in the previous recommendations
- **All U.S. federal agencies** are included in the new guidance. Previous guidance only applied to agencies with annual R&D budgets over \$100 million.
- **New provisions for improving scientific research integrity**, such as appropriate metadata, and persistent identifiers, and for reducing inequities in publishing and access amongst underserved populations and early career researchers.



Key Implications: Faculty

Actual requirements and implementation strategies will vary between funding agencies, and will roll out from now until December 31, 2025.

1. Covers peer-reviewed articles, book chapters, editorials, and conference proceedings, and importantly, data
2. Deposit in agency designated repository
3. Learning curve and costs will affect faculty differently
4. Compliance may vary
5. Many more!



Key Implications: Libraries

Actual requirements and implementation strategies will vary between funding agencies, and will roll out from now until December 31, 2025.

1. Increased demand for:
 - a. Repository/Archiving services - including for publications and data outputs
 - b. Personnel support
 - c. Funding
2. Impact on negotiations/renewals



What can we do now?



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Education and Outreach

- Libraries and other campus units/departments working together
- Listening sessions
 - The Libraries (and funding agencies) need to know what is important to faculty
 - The Libraries has resources and support services that can help now
- What researchers can do NOW:
 - Obtain an [ORCID](#)
 - Include pub costs in grant applications
 - Provide feedback and advocacy to funding agencies



Data, data, data

- Immediate need for support for data management planning, data curation, and storage needs
- Researchers should get DOIs for their data
- Data deposit and preservation services through CU Scholar (crdds@colorado.edu)
- Exceptions for sensitive data
