A Regensburg Summer: Research, Roaming, and Reflections Emma Thomure

This summer, I had the incredible privilege of spending 11 weeks in the city of Regensburg. During this time, I completed an independent research project at the University of Regensburg under the guidance of Till Rudack. Outside the lab, I explored Regensburg, traveled to nearby cities, and met a host of new people from around the world who had also come to study at the university.

Research

My research project was in the umbrella of "structural bioinformatics". Structural bioinformatics examines proteins and other small molecules using dynamic computer simulations. These simulations often predict the structure and behavior of molecules by modeling the interactions of individual atoms and comparing them to known structures.

In my project, I examined the photosystem II (PSII) protein complex in the *Chlorella ohadii*, a novel organism that can survive incredible amounts of light with minimal damage. Scientists suspect that the root C. *ohadii*'s resistance to light may lie in the conformation of its PSII proteins. I was tasked with examining the structure of C. *ohadii*'s PSII using Pymol, ChimeraX, and MOBY, which are three softwares used for protein visualization and analysis.

By the end of the summer, I was able to challenge some literature assumptions about Ohadii's capabilities and help another lab resolve the PSII sequence of C. *Ohadii*.

Roaming

When I was not working in the lab, I spent much of my time exploring Regensburg and traveling to nearby cities. Summer in Regensburg is an unforgettable experience. Largely because of the numerous holidays in late May and early June, there were endless festivals to enjoy. My favorites included the Dult, a traditional beer festival reminiscent of Octoberfest, and the Jazzfest, where you could wander the city and listen to various jazz artists perform.

Another of my favorite pastimes was enjoying the glorious Danube River. The river runs directly through Regensburg's Old Town, and it was truly at the
