The Matriculation Fee varies depending upon degree and international status as follows:

Entering freshmen & transfer undergraduate students (1+2+4+5)	\$112
Entering graduate students (1+2+4)	\$62
International undergraduate entering freshmen & transfers (1+2+3+4+5)	\$155
International graduate entering students (1+2+3+4)	\$105

### **Breakdown of Student Activity Fee**

#### **Environmental Center**

(2% of total)

Student-run resource center encouraging environmental involvement of the campus community. Promotes alternative transportation, water and energy conservation, and responsible resource use by students, faculty and staff.

# **KVCU** Radio

(1.2% of total) Radio station serving campus and surrounding community; 24 hour news, weather, sports, and music; provides 100-150 volunteers with experience in radio, production, advertising, marketing, business, and management.

#### (1.2% of total) Legal Services Provides direct legal services (i.e., counseling, negotiation document preparation, and incourt representation) to fee paying students.

**Off-Campus Student Services** (1.2% of total) Maintains listings of rooms, houses, and apartments for rent in Boulder community, and lists of students looking for roommates; offers advice about leases, security deposits, how to avoid landlord tenant problems. Student supported, administration and Board of Regents approved.

(3.15% of total) Provides the necessary funding for improvements of outdoor recreation facilities.
