

HIND 3811
The Power of the Word:
Subversive and
Censored 20th-Century
Indian and Pakistani
Literature





This 3-credit course explores modern South Asia through radical, provocative, and revolutionary literature and film. This course will introduce students to courageous voices from the region's recent history, who challenge hegemonic visions of the nation, gender, caste, religion, and other locations of identity. Among others, we will read Premchand, Manto, Faiz, Mahasweta Devi, and Ismat Chughtai. Additionally, the course will study how film has been used to consider revolutionary formations from Bhagat Singh's Hindustan Socialist Republican Army up to the Naxalite legacy. All materials and lecture for the course will be in English. There is an optional one-credit co-seminar (CLAC) with selected readings in Hindi and/or Urdu.*
