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## INTRODUCTION & LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Welcome to French Intermediate I!
In this class, you will develop skills for communicating in French. This is an interactive class, where we use the language to explore meaning and talk about a variety of topics, from describing yourself to talking about your routine.

We also aim to build intercultural competence by critically examining our own perspectives and comparing them to those of others.

#### **Level Description**

Intermediate I will focus on authentic situations for the student to show what they can do with the language in terms of speaking, listening, writing and reading. Students should be able to manage a number of unfamiliar tasks related to the target language and culture, and respond to simple, direct questions and requests. Fluency and accuracy will become more consistent.

## **FRENCH**

#### **Course Structure**

Each week you will engage in two live class sessions (either inperson, or remotely via Zoom) with the instructor and other students. This class time will be structured with interactive conversation activities and games.

#### How to get the most out of this class
