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## INTRODUCTION & LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Welcome to French Beginning II!
In this class, you will develop skills for communicating in French. This is an interactive class, where we use the language to explore meaning and talk about

a variety of topics, from asking for food to

making transactions.

We also aim to build intercultural competence by critically examining our own perspectives and comparing them to those of others.

#### **Level Description**

In Beginning II, students will be given opportunities to build on prior experience with the language in order to communicate about topics in their environments and experience, such as biographical information, describing people, objects and places, things they did in the past or will do in the future, etc.

#### **Course Structure**

Each week you will engage in two live class sessions (either inperson, or remotely via Zoom) with the instructor and other students. This class time will be structured with interactive conversation activities and games.

#### How to get the most out of this class
