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ABOUT THE CENTER

The University of Colorado, Boulder, established the Center for Western Civilization in 2006 to promote the study of Western values and traditions. In 2013, the university launched the Visiting Scholar Conservative Thought and Policy to foster intellectual diversity on campus. These two initiatives were merged in 2014. In 2019, the Center was renamed the Bruce D. Benson Center for the Study of Western Civilization in honor of the University of Colorado System President Emeritus, in recognition for his leadership and support.

The Center's mission is twofold: to promote the study of Western Civilization and to foster intellectual and ideological diversity on campus and beyond. At the heart of this mission is a commitment to open dialogue about the fundamental values that support a free, prosperous, and just society. The Center serves as a forum for free inquiry and open debate, champions academic freedom and civic discourse, and encourages students, faculty, and the broader community to engage with the most pressing and controversial issues facing society.

The Center supports research grounded in the Western intellectual tradition, with particular emphasis on the ancient and modern worlds, the formation and history of the United States, and the distinctive contributions of the Mountain West and Colorado to the American experiment. It promotes balanced discourse, welcomes diverse viewpoints, and seeks a broad range of perspectives on philosophical, political, and economic questions. The Center is committed to intellectual rigor, while providing a venue for exploring the nation's intellectual, cultural, and political foundations. The focus on political and economic freedom, moral and legal equality, and individual liberty and responsibility offers students, scholars, and the residents of Colorado the opportunity to engage with and examine the heritage and history that have shaped the United States.

CENTER FELLOWS

Fundamental to the Benson Center's mission is to bring a diversity of voices to the University of Colorado, Boulder campus. Toward this end, this year the Center hosted its thirteenth Visiting Scholar in Conservative Thought and Policy, two Sabbatical Fellows, eight CU Faculty Fellows and one Graduate Fellow. These scholars work in fields connected to the study of Western Civilization, participate in events and programming, teach courses, and support the undergraduate fellows program.

Patrick Deneen holds a B.A. in English Literature and a Ph.D. in Political Science from Rutgers University. He joined the faculty at the University of Notre Dame in the fall of 2012. His widely-discussed 2018 book, Why Liberalism Failed, has been translated into over twenty languages and was praised by former President Barack Obama. His published books include: Regime Change: *Toward a Postliberal Future* (Penguin, 2023), *Why Liberalism Failed* (Yale University Press, 2018), *Conserving America? Thoughts on Present Discontents* (St. Augustine Press, 2016), *Democratic Faith* (Princeton University Press, 2005), *The Odyssey of Political Theory* (Rowman and Littlefield, 2000), *Democracy's Literature* (ed.), (Rowman and Littlefield, 2005), *The Democratic Soul* (ed.), (University Press of Kentucky, 2011), *Redeeming Democracy in America* (ed.), (University Press of Kansas, 2011).

OUTREACH & EVENTS

Central to the Benson Center's mission is a commitment to fostering dialogue about fundamental values, asking controversial questions, and providing a forum for free inquiry and open debate. The Center promotes balanced discourse that engages diverse viewpoints to ensure a wide range of political, economic, and philosophical perspectives are represented at CU Boulder.

During the 2024–2025 academic year, the Center hosted several events, including a conference on the future of technological change featuring remarks from Colorado Governor Jared Polis, faculty workshops, undergraduate lunches and trivia nights, and public lectures. Events explored topics such as antisemitism and Western Civilization, the potential for capitalism and democracy to coexist, and American politics in the first half of 2025. More than 2,300 people participated either in-person or virtually, including nearly 900 students. HETERODOX WORKSHOP

The national Workshop in Heterodox Moral and Political Philosophy was held for the fifth time at the University of Colorado, Boulder, April 4-6, 2025.
