### Purpose

This is an important moment in history we are living through as it gives us an opportunity to make decisions about Native American sovereignty, water as a human right, and whether or not we want to keep building fossil fuel infrastructure in an age of climate change. Below are Boulder, Colorado, based organizations of indigenous and environmental advocates who have been working to raise awareness about and support for Standing Rock locally.

**Earth Guardians:** A Boulder-based global network of youth activists, musicians and artists is led by an indigenous youth, Xiuhtezcatl (shu-tez-cot) Martinez. At age 16, he has addressed the United Nations three times, sued the federal government to take greater climate action, performed around the world, and been a guest on many shows. **Oyáte Native American Student Organization:** A student organization at the University of Colorado Boulder serves as a support center for Native American students (graduate and undergraduate), and offers a communal atmosphere where students can come together to share their unique cultures, backgrounds, and traditions. **CU Environmental Center FLOWS Water Leaders Program** (FLOWS = Foundations for Leaders Organizing for Water and Sustainability): A University of Colorado Boulder based campaign to educate students and community members about environmental justice and water. FLOWS provides leadership training opportunities, green job skills, and free energy and water upgrades while building partnerships between CU students and staff and community members. We partner with and work primarily for low-income communities for water and energy conservation (the communities most in need of lower energy and water bills).
