

SMALL GRANT AWARDEES

The CHA Small Grant program provides up to \$3,000 for CU Boulder faculty to deepen and enrich the range of humanistic and artistic activities on campus and enhance faculty scholarship.

With the guidance of the CHA Faculty Steering
Committee, we awarded a total of \$69,083 to fund 37 projects across 20 different departments at CU Boulder supporting research, creative work, special events, and virtual presentations by visiting scholars and artists.

ABOUT


The Hazel Barnes Flat in the heart of London is a gift to scholars in the humanities and arts made by Hazel Barnes, the much-admired Professor of Philosophy at CU Boulder and founder of the Interdisciplinary Program in the Humanities. Since 2010, the flat has provided opportunities to conduct scholarly research in and around London to CU Boulder faculty and graduate students. Management of the flat has been entrusted to the CHA since its inception.

APPLICATION PROCESS

To ensure a more equitable application process for all eligible users of the Hazel Barnes Flat, the CHA will be updating the application process. As such, the CHA put a temporarily hold for new reservation requests to use the flat that started on 8/1/2023 onwards. New applications to use the flat before 8/1/2023 and already existing reservations were not affected.

As of December 2022, the application process is still being reviewed.
