#### DESCRIPTION

Delve into cutting-edge topics such as the science of climate change, biotechnology, biomedical devices, advanced materials, renewable energy, and environmental sustainability! This course will introduce undergraduate students to the most recent concepts in technology and how these concepts impact all aspects of life, including human health and the health of the planet.

### REQUIRED MATERIALS

- Readings will be assigned in advance on Canvas, but no textbook is required.
- An iClicker remote transmitter device is required.

### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, students will:

- Better understand a broad array of cutting-edge technologies.
- Gain science and technology literacy, both with respect to better understanding basic concepts and finding reliable information.
- Think critically about technology and the way technology interacts with government policies, culture, and societal equity.
- Understand the scientific method and how to interpret quantitative data from visualizations.

#### **GRADE ELEMENTS**

<u>Midterm Exams</u>: There will be four in-class exams during the semester; dates are listed on the Course Schedule. Each will cover the material assigned since the previous exam. Please do not schedule anything (plane flight, wedding, social engagement, etc.) for any of the dates. **There will be no make-up exams.** 

<u>Final Exam</u>: The final exam is cumulative. The final exam will take place on Monday, May 5 1:30–4 p.m.

Note: All exams will consist of multiple-choice questions; the instructor will provide you with a Scantron sheet. You should bring a pencil and your student ID to all exams.

On-line Reading Quizzes: Reading quizzes will be posted with deadlines distributed throughout the semester. In general, you will be doing the readings <u>before</u> we discuss the topics in class. Occasionally, we will cover something in class before you read about it, but an attempt will be taken to keep this to a minimum. Quizzes are found and submitted on Canvas. Each quiz will be open for approximately 5 days; <u>once you start the quiz, you will have 30 minutes to complete it</u>. Therefore, you should do the reading <u>before</u> opening the quiz. There will be approximately 8-10 quizzes throughout the semester, and they will not be spaced evenly.

Clickers: Some classes will include clicker questions. Many clicker questions will be survey-type questions; on these, you will receive all 3 points for responding to the question. Some clicker questions will be "quiz" type questions. Here, you will receive 2 points for responding to the question, and one additional point for the correct answer. Up to ~ 10% of clicker points may be dropped to allow for unexpected absences or missed questions.

*Report:* One creative technology project will be assigned, which will connect and contextualize creative technologies seen in your home discipline or primary field of study. This will be introduced and completed during the 4<sup>th</sup> course module (led by O'Harra).

<sup>\*</sup> If your reading quiz average is >70%, the lowest midterm will be dropped and each of the remaining exams will count 20%.

Your final grade will be based on the average you accumulate. The following scale can be adjusted during the semester, but only in your favor.

# Attendance:
