Commencement Message from the Chair 16 May 2020

Greetings ladies and gentlemen and humans all who join us today in this unusual format. We are gathered here today to celebrate the accomplishments of this extraordinary group of young people who constitute the Class of 2020 of the Department of Cinema Studies and Moving Image Arts.

Paradoxically, though movie theatres are temporarily closed (and many will be reopening, even in reinvented formats very soon!), television ratings, subscriptions to cable outlets, to streaming services, subscriptions to local, state, and national newspapers, magazines, podcasts, and all sort of entertainment and critical media are reaching historic heights. Research already indicates that people can't wait to get back to the movies, to the theater, to museums, to galleries, to live music events, and to all the things that our art and humanities education has so well prepared us for. It is certain that this crisis has put in evidence our dependency in all the things that we are good at.

There's a phrase, a cliché that has been hammered into our heads the last few months by the news media and the analysts, even national and local leaders, as if it were an effort to convince us that it is true. That phrase is "this is the new normal." Well, I tell you "No, it isn't." It's new, sure, but it's NOT normal and it's NOT what your life is going to be. Of that, too, I am certain. Get out there, take over the world, and if you can't take over yet, then give'em hell, stick to the man. It's your turn at the wheel, and I can't wait to see how far you take us... Do not forget that "commencement" means "beginning..." and this beginning is yours.
