MUSC 2131: Semester 4 Aural Skills

Required texts: Berkowitz, Fontrier, Kraft, Goldstein, Smaldone: *A New Approach to Sight Singing*, 5th ed. Kazez: *Rhythm Reading*, 2nd ed.

Bring books to class each day, as well as manuscript paper, pencil(s), and eraser. You will also need a device to video yourself (e.g., smartphone, tablet, computer camera).

Course Description: MUSC 2131 is the final course in the four-semester sequence of ear training and sight-singing required of all music majors. This class and the companion MUSC 2111 (fourth-semester theory) are designed to develop musical skills required of all literate musicians. We will focus on aural recognition and performance of rhythms and melodies, recognition of harmonic progressions, general improvement of sight singing skills, improvisation, and a bit of melodic and harmonic keyboard facility as well. These skills all contribute to our general musicianship and to our ability to pre-hear, conceptualize, and learn music in particular.

The class is structured in 3 cycles each lasting 5 weeks that incorporate in-class drills (including sing and plays), lab assignments, a performance video, a transcription, a dictation quiz, and a performance recitation (singing, rhythm, and possibly keyboard).

Except for dire emergencies, late work of any type will not be accepted, and makeup assignments, quizzes, recitations, and extra credit will not be given. The semester schedule is attached, so please plan accordingly.

Grading: Evaluation is based on five components, weighted approximately as follows:

Quizzes	30%
Recitations	30%
Lab Assignments	20% (0.25*Lab .1 + .75*Lab .2)
Performance videos	10%
Transcriptions	10%

Lab assignments are posted at **www.colorado.edu/music/courses/musc2131**. Each cycle has two. The .1 lab is simply for completion: you will earn credit just by turning it in, and we will check it over in class. Bring a pen of a different color and self-mark your errors to focus on skills you need to improve. The .2 lab will be similar in content but will be handed in for a grade. Labs also prepare you for each cycle's quiz. You are held to the CU Honor Code, and so do not collaborate on labs.

Performance **videos** of assigned melodies and rhythms will prepare you for recitations and class performances, and also ensure that you are consistently practicing outside of class. Your instructor will provide more details about uploading/sending your file(s). **Transcriptions** of real music reinforce what you have learned over the past two years. **Be responsible** about your work and your attendance. Since this is a skills course, daily practice in and out (at least 15 minutes) of class builds success. Stay aware in class: avoid unrelated distractions (e.g., working on a different course's assignment, using an electronic device when not relevant). Absences may cumulatively affect consistency of skill level and mastery, and we will notify the undergraduate dean when you exceed three absences. Notify your instructor in advance about date(s) you will be away (e.g., performances, auditions, etc.). If you must miss class due to an unavoidable and dire emergency, let your instructor know as soon as possible (beforehand is better). Consult your instructor early if you have concerns about your progress. We are here to help you in the gradual and sometimes trying work of improving your aural skills. Let's have a successful and fulfilling semester!
