## ART COURSES

### **ARTS 1171 Photography for Non-Majors - 3 credits**

Taught by Dr. Ben Nicholson

#### **Instructor Description**

This course aims to immerse you in the compelling, eclectic, and creative world of photography. During the course of this term, you will learn about the elements that create a well-composed photograph, the terms and tools used in photographic image creation, and techniques and tips to improve your photography. We will also explore the history of photography, the contributions and work of famous photographers, and the ways to critique works of photographic art.

### **Instructor Description**

Ideal class for both accomplished artists and complete novices. Explore color, innovation, and self-expression in this introduction to the field of painting in contemporary art studio practice. A combination of technical work and creative projects will allow students to find their own artistic voice and original style and effectively express themselves in a visual manner. Students will gain valuable academic and life skills through exposure to the creative process, organized design methodology, idea production strategies, discipline, risk-taking and coping with frustration and failure. Regular attendance is required.

### **LIBB 2800 Horror Films & American Culture – 3 Credits**

#### **Instructor Description**

This course looks at our fascination with American horror films by exploring the real cultural work they do. Identifying the iconographic features of cinematic horror, we trace the genre from its beginnings up to the present day to consider how horror functions to reflect not only ideology, but our fears and anxieties while also providing relief, antidote, and feedback about what's happening in our world.

## **LIBB 1600 Gender and Film – 3 Credits**

Taught by Dr. Karen Auvinen

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Distribution-Arts & Humanities  
Arts & Sciences General Education: Diversity-U.S. Perspective**

### **Instructor Description**

This course examines depictions of femininity, masculinity, sexuality, class, ethnicity, and race on film. We begin by exploring the formulaic Hollywood film and its massive influence by first looking at the kinds of stereotypes it circulates about specific people and/or groups, and then by examining films that shatter these stereotypes and seek authentic expressions of identity, human diversity, and experience. Students will learn the ways in which film influences our perceptions about each other and will expand the range of each student's understanding of the experience of individuals and groups who have been marginalized in society.

## HUMANITIES COURSES

### **LIBB 2728 Sports & Its Economics: The Relationship between Sports Teams, Markets, and Local Communities – 3 credits**

Taught By Dan Zuchegno

TuTh 12:30pm-1:45pm

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Elective**

#### **Instructor Description**

Economics and business models have increasingly been used to analyze a wide range of issues in professional sports and collegiate athletics from trying to understand wages in US professional sports leagues to the global appeal of futbol. We will look at wages paid to athletes as well as the level and sources of profits and revenues to teams and clubs. We will also look into the organizational structure of leagues and the role of government in professional sports.

On the collegiate level, we will address NCAA rules on scholarships and eligibility, and the ever-increasing role that name, image, and likeness is playing in intercollegiate athletics. We will also look into the revenues generated in college sports and the sources of these revenues.

Additionally, we will address the impact of television revenues on the ever-changing structure and alignment of athletic conferences in the US.

## **HIST 2516 America Through Baseball – 3 Credits**

### **Instructor Description**

This purpose of the course is to arrive at a better understand the history of the United States through the history of baseball. This course examines American History since the Civil War and explores how the social, cultural, economic, and political forces shaping America were reflected in the national pastime. The course also examines the events and people who shaped baseball and looks at how they influenced American society at large.

## **PHIL 2800 Special Topics in Philosophy: Ethical Puzzles and Moral Conflicts – 3 Credits**

Taught by Dr. Michele D. Simpson

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Distribution-Arts & Humanities**

### **Instructor Description**

Complex issues call upon us to take into account ethical and moral considerations such as human rights, global and environmental justice, animal rights, and a menu of other rights and responsibilities. Ethics represents the moral code that guides a person's choices and behaviors. And the idea of a moral code extends beyond the individual to include what is determined to be right, and wrong, for a community or society at large. The course will consist of lectures, case studies, and extensive student participation, all in the service of thoughtfully reflecting on the nature of the right and the good, character, and agency. Students will develop analytical abilities, and acquire reading, writing, thinking, presentation, and argumentation skills that will assist them in Ethical Puzzles & Moral Conflicts and their other courses.

## **MUEL 2852 Music in the Rock Era - 3 credits**

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Distribution-Arts & Humanities**

### **Instructor Description**

We will trace the development of rock as an art form as well as its cultural significance and saturation. We will consider technological advances, commercialism, record production, rock videos, concerts and festivals, and so on. We will also explore the influence that popular music, as well as other forms of popular culture, exert on various aspects of society such as social justice, human rights and individual liberties. These topics will be approached primarily from musical and cultural standpoints but also from philosophical, sociological, psychological, and political standpoints. Additionally, you will be instructed on how to listen more effectively to gain a deeper appreciation for the music we will be studying and enjoying.

## SCIENCE COURSES

### **IPHY 2420 Intro to Nutrition – 3 Credits**

Taught by Dr. Donna Louie

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Distribution-Natural Science**

#### **Instructor Description**

In this course, you will learn the biology and chemistry behind nutrition, including how your body works, what nutrients you need to stay healthy and perform well, and what happens when you do not eat right. You will learn to evaluate fad diets and maintain a healthy body that includes analyzing your food intake, lifestyle, blood pressure, heart rate, and a mock blood test. By the end of the course, you will have valuable information to share with your friends and family so that you and everyone around you can live a long, healthy life.

Topics discussed frequently in this course will include obesity, eating habits and methods, calorie counting, starvation mode, and other health issues related to nutrition.

## **GEOL 1010-280R – Exploring Earth – 3 Credits**

Taught by Dr. Lisa Barlow

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Distribution-Natural Sciences**

### **Instructor Description**

Geology is everywhere you look, especially if you know how to see! The Earth that we live with is a fascinating and dynamic planet with a rich history of tales to tell. Geology has inspired creatives of all kinds for millennia, and this section of GEOL 1010 will include works of art (sculpture, photography, painting, functional objects ...) to bring an artist's perspective to a conventional introductory Geology course. We'll learn how to recognize different basic mineral and rock types (e.g., alabaster vs. marble in sculpture) and rock types of large features (can you tell the difference between the sedimentary rocks of the Flatirons and the igneous rocks of Yosemite's Half Dome just by looking at images?), how to read topographic and geologic maps, and how to use plate tectonic theory to understand everything from why marine rocks are found at the top of Mount Everest to why some volcanoes are more dangerous (and more aesthetically pleasing) than others. We'll do a lot of armchair travel around the world seeing both beautiful outdoor geology and beautiful human expressions of this amazing planet we live with.

## **SOCY 1001-170R - Introduction to Sociology - 3 credit hours**

Taught by Dr. Robert Scott

**MoWe 2:30pm-3:45pm**

**Credit: Arts Sci Gen Ed: Distribution-Social Sciences**

### **Instructor Description**

This course highlights how social forces shape human behavior and everyday experience. It examines the history of sociology, how to conduct social research, and key theoretical perspectives and debates in the discipline. Students will analyze and evaluate ideas from various areas of specialization, including economic sociology, animals and society, the sociology of death and dying, and the sociology of mental health. In their course assignments, students will apply sociological concepts to past and current events and extend the concepts. They will learn how sociology can influence policy and practice here and now.

## WRITING COURSES

### **WRTG 1150 – 1<sup>st</sup> Year Writing & Rhetoric – 3 credit hours**

Taught by Dr. Gabriela Rios

TuTh 2:00pm-3:15pm

**Credit: Arts & Sciences General Education: Written Communication**

#### **Course Description**

Rhetorically informed introduction to college writing. Focuses on critical analysis, argument, inquiry, and information literacy. Taught as a writing workshop, the course places a premium on invention, drafting, and thoughtful revision. For placement criteria, see the arts and sciences advising office. May be repeated up to 6 total credit hours.

#### **Instructor Description**

You will have fun (yes, fun!) in this class while you become a more confident and competent writer. Towards the end of the semester, we'll "act out" what we've learned by looking at two different art groups in France during the late-nineteenth century. One art group wants to embrace Modernism, and the other wants to uphold Traditionalism. We'll first learn a bit about each group, and then we'll enjoy becoming characters (artists, art dealers, and art critics) in both groups. We'll celebrate and showcase our learning by "time traveling" to Paris in 1889 and hosting a reenactment of the significant Paris Art Exhibition. You might become Monet! This course offers you added value—and is radically engaging. Extending the notion of text-based writing, we'll play with the principles of "visual rhetorics" and circulation theory.
