The Leadership Studies Minor (LSM) enables you to develop as a leader. ## **LEAD 1000 – Becoming a Leader**

Four sections total. 9:30-10:45am TTh; 12:30-1:45 TTh; 2:00-3:15 TTh; 3:30-4:45pm TTh.

The foundation course will prepare students to exercise leadership in business, government and community organizations. It will introduce leadership skills useful in a variety of settings including community and civic activities. The course will help students to improve self awareness, understand multiple theories, recognize moral courage, build analytic and critical thinking skills and adapt leadership practices to different people and contexts. Students taking this course will not receive credit for MGMT 3030.

## **LEAD 4000 - Leadership in Context and Emerging Challenges: A Capstone**

Three sections total. 11:00-12:15 TTh; 12:30-1:45pm TTh; 9:00-11:30am W Each LEAD 4000 section also requires a 1 credit practicum, where students will work with partner organizations to address leadership challenges.

Integrates leadership topics and experiences students pursued through the Leadership Studies Minor. Using advanced critical thinking skills, the seminar requires students to evidence their knowledge, competencies and skills related to leadership theory and practice through examining contemporary leadership challenges. Further, the seminar directs students to justify decision-making processes, demonstrating their ability to synthesize prior knowledge to effect desirable, ethical outcomes.

Department enforced prereq., LEAD 1000 (minimum grade C-) or approved substitute plus two of the approved LSM electives. Requisites: Restricted to students with 57-180 credits (Juniors or Seniors).

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
