

Archaeology words & signs



An <u>archaeologist</u> is a scientist whose job is learning about people who lived a long, long time ago. Archaeologists find things that the people left behind, and study them to learn what the people were like.

Archaeologists study artifacts. An <u>artifact</u> is something that a human left behind a long, long time ago. Some artifacts are big, like buildings or roads. Some artifacts are tiny, like beads or coins. Many artifacts are buried in the dirt.





Archaeologists use **GPS** to tell us where to go! A GPS is a device, or a program on a device, that keeps track of where things are.






Archaeologists go on long walks to find the things we are looking for. We wear strong **boots** to protect our feet.













If an artifact is very small, it might be hard to find. We use a **screen** to sift through the dirt. The dirt falls through the holes in the screen so we can see if there are any tiny artifacts like beads.





Archaeologists **search** for artifacts out in the field. We look in places where other archaeologists found things, and we look nearby. When we **find** an artifact, we study it to learn about people who lived long ago.



Archaeologists use <u>cameras</u> to <u>take pictures</u> of artifacts when we find them. We can show the pictures to other archaeologists, and use the pictures to help us remember what things look like before they are cleaned up.
