Course description: This course is the first of two courses designed to give you the mathematical background necessary for future courses in business and economics. Topics to be covered in this course include basic college-level algebra, simple linear and nonlinear equations, functions and their graphs, systems of equations, set theory, summation, logic, and proofs.

Textbook: Essential Mathematics for Economic Analysis. Knut Sydsaster and Peter Hammond with Arne Strom. 4th Edition.

Homework: I will be assigning five homework. I do this because mathematics is not a spectator sport. The only way to succeed when it comes to learning mathematics is practice, practice, practice. The homework will be assigned after we finish a chapter and due the following Friday in class. I will drop the lowest homework grade. I do not accept late homework. If you miss class the day the homework is due, you must send me an email containing a picture of your completed homework, and then I will accept the hard copy the next class you attend.

Note: your cumulative homework grade is the same portion of your grade as one Midterm. Please take advantage of this and take the homework seriously! You are welcome to work with classmates and see me in office hours if you are having trouble completing the assignments.

Participation: This portion of your grade will come entirely from the attendance of class. An attendance sheet will be passed around in class. I will drop three absences by the end of the semester.

Computers and calculators:

- I encourage you to use tools like graphing calculators/websites and computer algebra systems to better understand the material and work through the problem sets. However, "because my calculator said so" is not a good enough answer to a question with computations. Show me that you understand the mechanics.
- Cell phone calculators and graphing calculators are not allowed during exams. Calculators without graphing capability or a programmable memory are allowed during exams.
- Using computers in class for anything other than taking notes is strictly prohibited.
