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Course Info

Description This course is the first of a two-course sequence designed to introduce a variety of mathematical concepts which will be used extensively in future economics coursework. In order to achieve mastery of the material, a variety of topics will be introduced followed by extensive practice. Topics that will be covered include but are not limited to college algebra, solving systems of equations, set theory, logic, functions, and differentiation.

Prerequisites There are no prerequisites for this course.

Textbook

Essential Mathematics for Economic Analysis, 5th Edition, by Sydsaeter, Hammond, and Strom, Pearson Publishing, ISBN 9781292074610. You are allowed to use an older edition of the text if desired.

Structure

On the following weeks the midterms and final exam will be held, dates and times will be determined later:

- Midterm 1: September 23
- Midterm 2: October 21
- Midterm 3: November 18
- Final: Thursday, December 10 1:30-4:00 PM

The course consists of lectures, homework, class participation, and exams.

Lecture I will post recorded lectures prior to each week of classes. I highly encourage but do not require you to watch the recorded lectures. I will occasionally utilize resources such as quiz questions and polls to gauge

the level of participation but will not be counting this towards your grade in any way.

Homework Every other week during the semester, I will post homework assignments on Canvas for you to complete. The homework will consist of practice problems designed to re-enforce material covered in the relevant lectures and in-class problem sets. Homework assignments will generally be due on Fridays at 11:00 PM. Late submissions and make-ups will not be allowed. I will drop the lowest homework grade at the end of the semester. There are three options you may use to submit homework; in-person (during class), through email, or through Canvas. If submitting through email or Canvas please scan a copy of the worked out problem set that is clear and legible and submit a pdf file. If you do not have access to a scanner I recommend downloading Adobe Scan or Genius Scan to your smartphone. If you do not have access to a smartphone, a scanner, and cannot submit homework in-person please let me know.

Class Participation Each week during the semester, I will post a practice problem set on Canvas. During our in-person classes I will allow you to work on these problem sets, clarify any issues from the posted lectures, and ask questions. By attending class in-person or through Zoom you will receive credit for these problem sets, even if you don't finish them. If you are unable to attend class in-person or through Zoom, to receive credit you must submit a completed practice problem set by Friday at 11:00 PM through the same procedure as submitting homework. I will allow you to work in groups on these problem sets and submit them as a group if you desire. Furthermore, each week I will start a discussion post on Canvas. The purpose of the discussion thread is for you to ask your classmates for help on the practice problem sets. Over the course of the semester, to receive full credit for the discussion posts you must ask at least two questions and respond to at least two of your classmates' questions.

Exams Exam dates are listed above. Midterms will be held during the weeks of 9/23, 10/21, and 11/18. The final will be held on December 10 at 1:30 PM. Midterms will consist of free-response questions which are non-cumulative to the extent that material builds on itself. The final will consist of free-response questions which are cumulative. You must take the final exam in this course; failure to do so will result in a failing grade. The topics that each exam encompasses will be announced in class prior to the exam. University policy allows students who have more than three finals to reschedule the last final of the day. If students wish to reschedule a final, they must inform me by November 1.

Grading

Your grade will be determined by the following components and weights:

• In-class Problem Sets: 16%

• Discussion Posts: 4%

• Homework: 20%

• Highest Midterm: 20%

• 2nd Highest Midterm: 10%

• Lowest Midterm: 0%

• Final Exam: 30%

I will assign letter grades with a +/-. I will follow economics department guidelines which means the average grade will be curved to a B-. The size of this curve will not be known until after all components of the course have been graded.

Missed Assignments In the case that an extreme illness is experienced leading to missing homework and/or problem set I will shift the weight of these to subsequent homeworks and/or problem sets. In the case that a midterm exam is missed then this midterm will be considered as your lowest midterm and will not be counted against you. Proper documentation will be required for all missed assignments. A time-stamped note from Wardenburg does not qualify as an extreme illness.

Communication Outside of in-person classes, office hours, and Zoom, the optimal way to contact me is through email. I will not respond to emails if the answer to your question is in the syllabus.
