#### **Overview**

The course introduces elementary concepts of economics and how they are reflected in the behavior of economic decision-makers.

Lectures with the professor and recitation sections with Teaching Assistants (TAs) will be held in person. Textbook, weekly assignments, and additional learning material will be online on Canvas.

#### **Textbook and Homework**

To keep the cost of your course materials as low as possible and access to those materials as convenient as possible, we have collaborated with the CU Book Store and the publisher to deliver those materials through a program called "Inclusive Access", which will appear on your tuition and fee bill as "Day 1 Digital Access". These materials include both the eBook ("Microeconomics" by Acemoglu, Laibson, and List, 3rd edition, Pearson) for the course as well as the online homework platform. The way to get to ebook and other course material is to click on "Course Materials" in Canvas, then launch courseware and go to MyEconlab. You will need to complete weekly homework assignments. The assignments will become available under Assignments on Fridays after a chapter was covered in lecture. Each homework is available until the following Friday, 11pm. Please do not miss the due date. Late submissions will not be accepted. Homework assignments account for 15% of your overall grade.

### Recitation

You will have a once-weekly recitation taught by your TA which will meet in person weekly. In each recitation, your TA will help you complete a worksheet related to the concepts being covered in the class. While these recitations are supplemental, they are also required and will account for 5% of your overall grade. Recitations start in the second week of classes.

There will be two midterms and a final exam. They will be held in RAMY C250. Due to the large number of students taking this class, it is not possible to schedule make-up exams. The exams account for the remaining 75% of your grade. In the default grading scheme, midterm 1 (M1), midterm 2 (M2), and the final (F) each count for 25%. We will also recompute your score with another weighing scheme. It gives more weight to the final by using 20%/20%/35% for M1/M2/F. Automatically, your class score will be the higher of the two!
