Required Textbook:

For this class, we will be using Mankiw's Principles of Microeconomics, 8th edition (978133096768). The Economics department and Cengage have worked out an agreement to offer a greatly reduced price to students for [MindTap](#). Students enrolled in this class automatically get access to MindTap which includes the full interactive e-book, mobile app access, Aplia homework, quizzes, Adaptive Test Prep, videos, flashcards, and more. Students do have the option to purchase the loose-leaf print text at the bookstore as well. Students may use an older hardcopy version of the textbook, but please note that the student assumes all risks associated with differences between the editions. The course will be accessed through D2L and students will be charged through their bursars account at the add/drop date. The price to the students is \$90 (this price includes all fees). This model eliminates any need for access codes or course keys. Students simply register through D2L in their course and have access on the first day of class.

Course Description and Objectives

Economics is the study of how agents (humans, firms, etc...) make decisions under scarcity. Economists typically assume that these decisions are made in a rational manner. For this reason, in this course reasoning skills will be much more important than memorization skills. This course will provide an introduction to the economic thought process which will hopefully benefit you in your future studies.

Specifically, we will study how consumers and businesses make decisions, how markets work, how they fail, and how government actions affect markets.

Exams: You may drop your lowest midterm score and replace it with your recitation grade. **THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UP EXAMS.** If you cannot take an exam because of an emergency or other commitment, you can drop the zero and replace it with your recitation grade. Your recitation grade **CANNOT** replace the final exam.

Midterms: Midterms will take place during class and will be due at the end of the 50 minutes. Failure to turn in the exam in a timely fashion will result in a zero. Give yourself enough time to fill in all bubbles on the scantron prior to the end of the exam.

Final Exams: The final exam will take place Monday, December 18th from 7:30-10:00 PM. The midterm rules above also apply to the final exam. The recitation grade cannot replace the final. As is university policy, you can reschedule your final exam only if you have three or more exams scheduled for the same day. If this is the case, you may have your exams rescheduled except for the first two of the day. However, you must request accommodations before the 10th week of classes.

Recitations: Recitation begins the second week of class. Recitation grading policies are determined by your TA and will be outlined in their syllabus. You must attend the recitation you are registered for unless otherwise arranged with your TA.

Homework: For every chapter we cover, there will be a corresponding homework assignment. Every week there will be at least one homework assignment due. A tentative schedule is listed below, but due dates will be updated on an as-needed basis. Treat the dates in MindTap as the source of truth.

Clickers: You will also need an i>clicker. You can purchase it at the CU Bookstore, if you do not have one already. We will use clickers regularly to review examples and to solve problems, beginning the second week of class. You will receive one point for participating in a clicker question and an additional point if you answer the question correctly. You are allowed to discuss the questions with your classmates while in class to work together. Your lowest three clicker grades for the semester will be dropped. Please note that it is considered cheating to bring a classmate's clicker to class. If you are caught with more than one clicker, you will be asked to leave class for the day and you and the classmate whose clicker you have will receive an F for the semester.

Emails: This is a large class which makes answering every single email extremely costly. Therefore, I will only respond to emails if they cannot be answered by the syllabus. In addition, when I send out an email to the entire class and you have a follow-up question I ask that you do not reply to my email. Please send me a new email that way I am able to keep each student's question separate from others. Please allow 24 hours for me to respond on weekdays and 48 hours on weekends.

Laptops, Tablets, and Cell Phones: Laptops can be distracting to others in class. For this reason, I ask that if you use your laptop to take notes you sit in the last 4 rows of class. PDF copies of the slides will be posted prior to class and you are more than welcome to download them to your laptop or tablet prior to class to annotate them. Please do not use your laptop for anything other than taking notes. If you are caught using your laptop for something other than taking notes you will be asked to leave. Please silence your cell phone prior to class and do not use it except in the case of emergencies.

Curving: There will be no individual curving. Please do not email at the end of the semester asking for

your grade to be changed. Should a curve be necessary, everyone in the class will receive an equal curve (for individual exams or at the end of the semester). Recitations will be curved so that each TA's recitations have the same average.

Cheating: If you are caught cheating in any fashion (on exams, in recitation, or clickers (see above)) you will be given an F for the semester and your case will be reported to the Honor Code Council for review.
