Course Content:

We will discuss foundational topics in macroeconomics in this course. This will include discussions on trade, national production, unemployment, business cycles, and monetary/fiscal policy. My goal for this course is to provide you with a strong framework for understanding the economy as a whole, which will enable you to understand a variety of common topics in macroeconomics.

The prerequisite for this course is ECON 2010, Principles of Microeconomics. *Please let me know immediately if you do not fulfill the prerequisite for this course. Failure to discuss this with me will result in your administrative withdrawal from the course.*

Lectures:

I will use lecture time to discuss new material or go over example problems to prepare for exams. Attendance will be taken in each lecture using clickers to answer questions related to the material. You are required to answer every clicker question to earn attendance points for the day. Missing any clicker question will result in a zero for the day. *You may have three unexcused absences throughout the semester.* Each lecture you miss beyond your unexcused absences will count equally against your attendance grade. All material that I discuss in lecture will be required knowledge for the exams. Please do not use any electronic devices for anything unrelated to this course. Anyone who is distracting or refuses to participate during lecture will be asked to leave. *You must attend each of the first three lectures to remain enrolled in this course. This includes lectures occurring 1/17, 1/19, and 1/22. Students who fail to record their attendance on any of these dates will be administratively dropped.* I will not distribute my lecture notes or repeat lectures to students who are unable to attend. It will be your responsibility to obtain notes from your classmates if you need to make up a lecture.

Exams:

Midterm exams will be held in class during lecture time. There will be three midterm exams and a cumulative final exam. Your lowest midterm grade will be dropped, and your two highest midterm grades will be worth 20% of your grade each. The final exam will be worth 25% of your grade and will not be dropped. Anyone who has three or more final exams on the same day in which my final exam is your latest exam of the day may notify me within the first month of class to schedule an alternative time for their exam. Please account for any scheduling conflicts you may have with work/travel on the date and time of the final exam. *There will be no make-up exams. The policy of dropping your lowest midterm is in place to account for any circumstances which prevent you from attending an exam. You must attend the final exam.*

Your final grade in this course will be determined as follows:

I will assign you a letter grade which will include +/- . I will strictly adhere to the assignment of your letter grade based on your percentage grade in the class. This means I will not individually curve your grade to move it up a letter grade (e.g. an 89.9% will be a B+, I will not move it up to an A-). Please speak to me if you have concerns about your grade at any point in the semester.

Cheating will not be tolerated in this course. This includes cheating on an exam, cheating in recitation, or cheating by using another student's clicker during lecture. If you are caught cheating I will assign you a 0% in the course. I will then meet with the Associate Chair of Undergraduate Studies for the Economics Department, and we will report this to the Honor Council to decide upon further punishment, which could include expulsion from the University. I will attend any honor council hearing and personally provide evidence for an accusation of cheating.

Practice Problems:

I believe repetition with the material in this course will be important to succeed on the exams. I will provide practice problems on D2L in place of assigned homework. These problems are designed to inform you what information may be important for an upcoming exam. You are encouraged to complete these practice sets early and come to me with questions prior to the exam.

Online homework software MindTap is available to students who purchase the textbook's online option. MindTap will provide practice problems from your textbook which you can use to supplement your understanding of the material in the text. *There will be no homework grade.*
