Homework:

• Homework for this class is administered through Cengage Mindtap. Each chapter will have an accompanying homework. Mindtap includes practice assignments aswell, but grades will be calculated based off the homework assignments alone. Late assignments will be accepted at a penalty of 40%. The 2 lowest grades will be automatically dropped, this is to cover any avoidable or unavoidable issues that come up through out the semester. If an emergency arises that prevented the student from completing *more than 2* assignments the student will be allowed to make up the assignments they were unable to complete in lieu of the 2 drops.

Reciatation:

• Recitation attendance is required for the course. You must attend the recitation that you are enrolled in. Grades will be administered per the discretion of the recitation instructor, but may not be updated until the end of the semester. The only exception to this standard is if you have 3 final exams scheduled on the same day; in this circumstance, you must notify me before the 11th week of the semester.
