## Content:

This course introduces the theoretical framework and analytical tools for studying the economic behavior of individual decision-makers, such as consumers, workers, firms, and managers. The techniques presented in this course are used by almost every economist and can be applied to several fields including international economics, environmental economics, labor economics, and industrial organization.

The course is divided into five sections. We begin with a basic review of supply and demand. In Section 2, we examine consumer behavior and market demand by constructing a model of consumer choice and using the model to derive individual and market demand. In Section 3, we turn our attention to the other side of the market and analyze the behavior of firms and market supply.. In Section 4, we bring the two sides of the market together to show how price and output are determined by the market. Lastly, a variety of market structures are examined including perfect competition, monopoly, and oligopoly.

The models covered in this course require calculus. It is assumed that every student is familiar with derivatives.
