#### **Course Description**

Microeconomic theory is the study of individual decisions – typically consumers and firms – in the presence of constraints. In this class, we will explore how and why economic agents make these decisions. By the end of the class, you will have acquired the tools to advance further in the study of economics and to better understand the microeconomic foundations of the world around you.

The class is broadly divided into four parts. Part 1 introduces the basics of microeconomic analysis and explores consumer behavior. Part 2 analyzes how producers/firms make optimal decisions under different market structures. Part 3 combines the consumer and producer theories from parts 1 and 2 to explore market equilibrium. Finally, part 4 explores different market structures.

#### Prerequisites

Economics: ECON 2010, and Math: ECON 1088 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or APPM 1350.

#### **Required Textbook**

Microeconomics, D. Besanko and R. Brauetigam, 5th edition (earlier editions are fine).

#### -Assignments

I will assign several (about 8) problem sets throughout the semester. **Problem sets must be handed in class the day they are due at the beginning of class. Late problem sets will receive a score of zero.** Your lowest problem set grade will be dropped. Though not graded directly, reading textbook chapters before class meetings is important to help you learn more from limited lecture time.

#### -Participation

It's assumed that all students will be in attendance every lecture. That said, I will be enforcing the administrative drop rule for the first three class meetings (January 18, 20, and 23), so be there or get booted. Participation in class discussion will constitute 10% of your final grade. Doing the reading assignments will help your class discussion.

#### -Exams

There will be three exams (two midterms and a final), the tentative dates of which are given below. Midterm 1 will cover the first 5 chapters. Midterm 2 will cover chapters 6 through 10. The final will be comprehensive/cumulative. You may not miss an exam. **No makeup exams will be given.** If you can provide me with documents showing there's emergency or other unusual circumstance, your grades may be reweighed. Because the final exam will be cumulative and encompass more questions than midterms, to improve your final grade you will want to avoid possible emergencies as much as you can so that you can take the 2 midterms. If you have three or more finals scheduled for the same day, you are allowed to reschedule the final if it's the 3rd (or 4th or 5th or ...) final. Arrangements to reschedule must be made by March 24.

Each student's weighted average score will be calculated, and a final letter grade will be computed based on a curve that ensures that the distribution of grades will be similar to that observed in other sections of ECON3070.

#### Recitation

The weekly recitation sessions are mandatory and start from the week of Jan. 23 and last through the last week of classes. Your TA will go over solutions to problem sets you've turned in and key concepts and examples covered in lectures.
