COURSE OVERVIEW

This course introduces a theoretical framework to model the behavior of individual decision makers. The course is divided into three parts: preferences and consumer behavior; decision making by firms; and interaction of firms and consumers in markets. We will consider three market structures: perfect competition, monopoly and oligopoly.

The techniques covered in this course will be useful for anyone intending to pursue field courses in economics such as industrial organization, international trade, labor and environmental economics.

PREREQUISITES

- 1. Economics prerequisites: ECON 1000 or 2010
- 2. Mathematics prerequisites: ECON 1078 & ECON 1088 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1080 & 1090 & 1100 or APPM 1350 or equivalent.

The material covered in this course requires basic calculus. It will be assumed that every student has a working knowledge of calculus. The mathematics prerequisites will be strictly enforced.
