Course Description: In this course, we will learn how to work with several different macroeconomic models. Students will become proficient at solving and interpreting these models using algebra and calculus. Along the way, students will learn about important documented trends in macroeconomics. After completing this course, students should feel confident going into any other model-based economics course and should have a better understanding of the macro economy.

- Grades will be uploaded to canvas as assignments are graded.
- I will not curve any individual assignment or quiz, but I may apply a curve at the end of the course.

Homework

- These are multiple choice assignments taken through Canvas due every Monday before class beginning on 8/31.
- You will get three times to attempt each assignment and your highest score will be kept.
- Each student must complete the homework themselves, but I suggest you work in groups.
- The two lowest homework scores are dropped automatically. No more drops are allowed.

Group Work

- Students will be randomly assigned into groups of 4-5 students for the first project.
- Each group must deliver a 3-5 double spaced report. The report need not only be text.
- The report will cover one or more current event(s) and relate them to the models we have covered by that point in the course.
- Students should clarify why the model is appropriate to use when discussing the topic and determine how the parameters and exogenous and endogenous variables will behave.
- This is your opportunity to work together to approach a problem as an economist would.
- After the first project, students can choose their own groups.
- If you wish to change your group, please work to ensure all members of your group have a new place to go.
- The second report will be similar to the first, but my expectations will be higher so it will be worth more points.

Exams

- We will have 6 quizzes: one every two weeks. The calendar for quizzes is fixed. A copy is included in the syllabus and on the Canvas calendar.
- Quizzes are always held during a Wednesday class meeting.
- Quizzes are taken through Canvas.
- Quizzes will primarily be multiple choice, but there may be some free response questions.
- You will have 35 minutes to complete the quiz. Quizzes become available to take at 11:30 am MT and close at 12:05 pm MT.
- I will drop your lowest two quiz score at the end of the course. No other drops are allowed.
- If you will not be able to take the quiz during the semester for **university sponsored content**, you **must** meet with me at the **start of the semester** so we can map out which quizzes you will miss and develop a fair plan for evaluation.
- Final: The final is cumulative. It will have a similar format to quizzes.
- Final: The scheduled final will take place December 13th 1:00 pm 3:00 pm MT
- Final: You can propose an alternate final. You must deliver a written proposal to me by the end of September for consideration. Your proposed evaluation plan must be more rigorous than the planned multiple-choice exam. It must also be feasible and respectful of both the student's and instructor's time.

- Both: Quizzes and the final are designed for the student to take individually. Students cannot seek outside help, use their notes, or search the internet for answers.
- Both: You should do work, take a picture of your work, and then upload it to Canvas as a pdf for each quiz and the final. This should be done within 15 minutes of the end of the quiz/final.
- Both: Students can earn up to half credit for each missed multiple choice question based on the quality of their submitted work.

Cheating

- Don't do it.
- If you cheat, you will earn a 0 for the quiz/final and you will be reported to the Honor Code Council.
- The second instance of cheating will result in the student failing the course and another Honor Council report.
- Currently I am not requiring any anti-cheating software. That may change depending on class behavior.
