Course Overview

This course studies macroeconomic theories. We will investigate how an overall economy grows in the long run, and what determines the short run economic fluctuations. Also we study the collective behaviors of consumptions, investments, and government spending. Throughout the course we will seek to understand important theoretical models of macroeconomics. Specific topics will include GDP, labor and capital markets, inflation, and the Great Recession and so on.

Required Textbook

Charles I. Jones (2011), *Macroeconomics*, 2nd edition, W.W. Norton & Company.

The first edition is okay to use.

Economics prerequisites: ECON 2020 or ECON 1000

Math prerequisites: ECON 1078 & 1088 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1080 & 1900 & 1100 or APPM 1350 or equivalent.

This class covers the models that require algebra and calculus and every student is assumed to have a working knowledge of them. As such, the mathematics prerequisites will be strictly enforced. Classes taken in the same semester are not sufficient.

Grading

There will be two midterms, a final, and assignments.

No exam will be given early, and there will be **no makeup exam**. You can drop one midterm, in which case your final exam will worth higher. You will fail if you miss more than two midterms or final. Specifically, I will calculate all three ways below and pick the highest of them for your grade.

1. midterm1 20% + midterm2 20% + Final 40% + Assignments 15% + Participation 5%
2. midterm1 20% + Final 60% + Assignments 15% + Participation 5%
3. midterm2 20% + Final 60% + Assignments 15% + Participation 5%

Each exam will be composed of two sections: short answers and multiple choice problems. You should bring a #2 pencil and a calculator to the exam. Graphing or cell phone calculators will not be permitted. You will write on the exam forms, so no blue books or other papers should be necessary.
