1 Course Information

Course Description: In this course, we will expand on topics discussed in principles of macroeconomics using a more mathematical approach. We will discuss various models for considering important macroeconomic topics such as unemployment, productivity, and long run economic growth. We will additionally discuss short run shocks to the Macro economy and how policymakers might address those.

Prerequisites: On the mathematical side, you should have completed ECON 1078 and 1088, or MATH 1300, or an equivalent course. Models and problems in this class will require some working knowledge of calculus. Students should also feel comfortable with algebraic concepts including fractions, graphing, and solving basic linear equations. On the economics side, I expect you to have taken ECON 2020 (Principles of Macroeconomics) or equivalent. There will be no formal review for any of those topics, so please let me know immediately if you do not meet those requirements.

Textbook: <u>N. Gregory Mankiw's *Macroeconomics* is the textbook for this course. My class material is mostly based on the 9th edition published in 2016, but using previous editions can be fine too. Owning the textbook is **not required**, **but recommended**. However, all the necessary class material will be made available online.</u>
