This is the first sequence of courses on microeconomics, where the aim is to introduce classical theories and analytic tools used in modern microeconomic analysis. We will cover basic optimization techniques, consumer and producer theories, and decision-making under uncertainty.

There will be two midterms and a final exam, where the second midterm is *not* cumulative, but the final is. Each midterm counts **30%** and the final **40%** of your grade. Missed exam(s) will result in a zero unless there is a special circumstance with appropriate documentation.

We will cover **Part I** of <u>Microeconomic Theory</u> by Mas-Colell et al. (*required*), and **Part II** of <u>Mathematical Methods and Models for Economists</u> by de la Fuente (*optional*) can be read independently for those who need a review of some more math background. There is also a **course packet** available at CU Bookstore.
