Course Description: This class is the first of a two course sequence, building the foundation for ECON 1088. We will learn how to improve our mathematical reasoning, our ability to read and work with graphs, and master algebra. A strong grasp of these concepts is necessary, but not sufficient, to succeed in later economics courses.

- Class time will be devoted to lecture, but will also present you an opportunity to practice problems in peer groups and get assistance from the instructor.

- Initially there will not be a graded component to attendance. If attendance is poor a graded component will be added to the participation score.

Participation

Homework

- I will only accept homework from groups. Each group must consist of 3-6 students.
- Homework is due every Monday at the start of class.
- Homework solutions will be posted at the end of class each Monday.
- Your two lowest scores are dropped.

Exams

- Quizzes: We will have 6 quizzes. The calendar for quizzes is on Canvas. All quizzes are held on Wednesday. No makeups or separate time quizzes will be given unless you have documented accommodation. You must notify me with documentation of your accommodation before the first quiz. All quizzes will be held in the normal classroom during the normal time.
- The lowest quiz score is dropped.
- If you will travel during the semester for **university sponsored content**, you **must** meet with me at the **start of the semester** so we can map out which quizzes you will miss and develop a fair plan for evaluation.
- Final: The final is cumulative. The final exam is on Saturday 12/13 7:30 10:00 pm in our normal classroom.
- Partial credit will be awarded on all quizzes and the final.
