COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed as an introductory survey of economy-wide issues such as inflation, unemployment, national output, employment, and government deficits and debt. The basic aggregate demand/supply model will be introduced and used to model historical events. Monetary and fiscal policies will be surveyed where both their benefits and shortcomings will be discussed. Alternative economic theories will also be included throughout the course.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

ECON 2010 (Principles of Microeconomics) with a C- or better course grade.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of the course, students should:

- identify the data and tools of macroeconomic policy;
- describe the costs and benefits of economy-wide phenomena such as inflation, unemployment, government debt;
- evaluate public policies in an informed and objective manner;
- recognize the institutional surroundings that impact macroeconomic phenomena;
- describe the role of international trade in the macroeconomy; and
- further their analytical, research and writing skills.

REQUIRED COURSE MATERIALS

Textbook (required): Schiller and Gebhardt: The Macro Economy Today, 15th edition with access to Connect. Connect is where you will read your textbook and complete some graded assignments. You will access Connect through our course website, Canvas.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY AND DELIVERY

This course is delivered via distance education format using the CU Canvas system. This format will use a combination of readings, online discussion, and other web-based resources. You will interact with the instructor and other students using the communication functions provided by Canvas. You will submit assignments in accordance with the course outline using Canvas.

COURSE PRESENTATION AND PROCEDURES

There will be 16 modules and 8 weeks of classes, so you should expect to proceed through two modules per week. They will be comprised of readings from the course texts, supplemental class notes, graded discussion questions, homeworks and quizzes, exams, and various outside sources of information such as additional readings and video content, among other content.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

This course is designed to engage you through class discussions on the topics covered in the course materials. It is important that you participate in class discussions to facilitate learning by other students and gain exposure to different viewpoints of other students in the class. It is therefore necessary to participate throughout the week in the discussion questions, *not wait until the last minute to post on discussion topics*.

ASSIGNMENTS

Paper (100 POINTS) – There will be one (1) writing assignment focusing on a written application of a macroeconomic topic (1.5-2 pages in length, single spaced, Times New Roman 12 point font, 1" margins). This writing assignment will be submitted through Canvas.

The evaluation of the assignment be based in part on the following criteria:

- a) The ability to convey a theme or argument clearly and coherently.
- b) The ability to analyze critically and to synthesize the course material.
- c) The ability to acquire and apply information from appropriate sources.
- d) Competence in standard written English (including proper use of syntax, grammar, punctuation and spelling as well as use of appropriate vocabulary, formatting, and references).
- Keep in mind that plagiarism is a form of academic dishonesty. Plagiarism is defined as the use of another's ideas or words without appropriate acknowledgment. Examples of plagiarism include: failing to use quotation marks when directly quoting from a source; failing to document distinctive ideas from a source; fabricating or inventing sources; and copying information from computer-based sources, i.e., the Internet. Discussions (150 POINTS) – There will be (6) online discussions posts and discussion responses associated with some modules. The discussion will occur asynchronously; I will post a discussion topic and you will write an initial discussion post about that topic, at your convenience prior to the due date. You then also have to respond to the discussion post of one of your classmates. Each time you participate, you earn up to 30 points. Your lowest discussion (post and response) is dropped from your final grade calculation. Discussions are open book and open note and will be submitted through Canvas. See the class schedule for due dates of posts and responses. The due dates for discussion posts and responses can be found on the class schedule.

Quizzes (330 POINTS) – There will be (12) quizzes associated with most modules each worth 30 points. The format of the quizzes will be multiple choice, calculations, and short answers and will be open book and open notes. Your lowest quiz will be dropped from your final grade calculation. Quizzes will be submitted through Connect, and are due on the dates posted on schedule. You have two attempts at each quiz and the attempt with the highest score counts.

Practice Exam (10 POINTS) – There will be one (1) practice exam.

Exams (400 POINTS) – There will be two (2) exams. The proctored midterm exam is worth 150 points and the proctored cumulative final exam is worth 250 points. The format of the exam will be multiple choice and calculations and will be closed book. The exams are completed on Connect in a proctored setting.

This course requires proctored examinations.

The Department of Economics at the University of Colorado Boulder requires students to use the online proctoring tool, Proctorio, for their proctored exams. Proctorio allows students to complete an

assessment at a remote location, such as their home, while helping to ensure the integrity of the exam. There is no cost to use this tool.

- Note that you are required to have a computer with a functioning webcam and microphone or have access to a computer with a functioning webcam microphone to complete your exams.

EXTRA CREDIT

Up to 50 points of extra credit may be available (= 5% of the course grade).

- 1. Module LearnSmart learning activities on Connect. Each time you complete an assigned LearnSmart activity by the due date, you will receive 2.5 points extra credit, up to 32.5 points total (= 13 LearnSmarts * 2.5 points).
- 2. An additional 17.5 points extra credit **may be** available during the semester for completing certain activities, such as listening and commenting on a podcast, etc. These extra credit opportunities will be determined by the instructor and announced on Canvas.

- 6. Respect the time of others. This class is going to require you to work in groups. Learn to respect the time of others in your group and your experience will be much better.
