Course Overview

This course will provide a comprehensive framework for analyzing the behavior of aggregate economies. We will discuss issues relating to long-run economic growth and short run business cycles, as well as macroeconomic policies that can affect both. The primary objective of this course is to demonstrate how the economy actually works.
