## Text

The textbook is Robert J. Barro, *Macroeconomics* (5<sup>th</sup> Edition). The textbook should be considered as supplementary to the lectures. This makes regular attendance particularly important.

#### **Course Description**

Throughout the semester, we shall study the fundamental concepts and issues in macroeconomics such as inflation, economic growth, unemployment, business cycles and macroeconomic policy. The primary goal of this course is to develop a general analytical framework to interpret these concepts and their interplay as the aggregation of individual households' and firms' behaviors. The tentative course plan emphasizes the microeconomic foundations of macroeconomic variables and their interactions. This course does not require substantial mathematical knowledge/background, only familiarity with BASIC calculus and algebra concepts is assumed.

Lecture notes will be posted on the class webpage. It is important to come to class prepared, at least with a basic idea about the topics to be covered. You may also find it helpful to form study groups and collaborate with your classmates.

#### **Grading Policy and Exam Dates**

There will be two midterms, three assignments, a group presentation and a final exam. Each midterm will count 25%, the group presentation and each assignment will count 5% and the final exam will be worth 30% of the overall grade. First midterm will be held on October 1<sup>st</sup> and the second will be on November 11<sup>th</sup>. The final examination date is to be announced. No make-up exams will be provided.
