Course Description: This course is an introduction to the concepts of macroeconomics. Macroeconomics is a branch of economics dealing with the performance, structure, behavior, and decision-making of an economy as a whole. The course serves as an introduction to the basics of economy-wide issues such as inflation, employment, national output, government's budget, and the Federal Reserve's functions. The basic aggregate demand/supply model will be introduced and used to model historical events. Monetary and fiscal policies will be surveyed where both their benefits and shortcomings will be discussed. Alternative economic theories will also be included throughout the course.

The central goal of this course is to help you understand an overall economy. Developing the ability to interpret the world through the lens of economics will add substantially to your ability to understand the world around you. As this is an introductory course, you will spend a lot of your time learning the language of the field, as well as learning how to 'think like an economist.'

The Hybrid Course Model: A "hybrid" course is slightly different from the traditional courses offered at CU. The hybrid course is a combination of face to face class time, online activities using Canvas and Connect with various learning tools and content shared.

The course design allows students to devote more classroom time to practice and apply material that they learn at their pace from the notes and videos posted online.

Each week you will be asked to read and watch content in Canvas and complete activities from Connect before our Tuesday lesson. I will set clear due dates for the activities that I intend to be completed online. Adhere closely to these deadlines.

Formally, the attendance will not be taken but it is strongly suggested that you attend all classes. You are responsible for all information covered in class lectures. In addition to lectures, we will have in-class worksheets which you will complete in groups or individually. These worksheets will not be graded on accuracy but you will receive an extra credit towards an upcoming examination for completing them.

Grading: Your course grade will consist of one midterm exam, a cumulative final exam, LearnSmart assignments, and quizzes. Each portion of your grade will be weighted as follows:

Midterm	25%
Final exam	35%
LearnSmart assignments*	20%
Quizzes*	20%

* These assignments are completed online, using Connect. The deadlines will be clearly communicated and, generally, the completion will be expected prior to our Tuesday's lecture. Tentatively, quizzes will be due on Sunday nights and LearnSmart assignments will be due on Monday nights.

The format of the quizzes will be multiple choice, calculations, and short answers. You are allowed to use your notes and book. Your one quiz with the lowest score will be dropped from the final grade.

Treat LearnSmart assignments as your homework where you are given as many tries as you require to earn full credit!

Examinations: 80% of your examinations will be multiple choice. The remainder 20% will be short answers. All exams will take place in our regular classroom. There will be no make-ups for missed exams. If you are planning on leaving town, do not schedule your trip on an exam date. The final exam is cumulative – this means that you will be tested on the material from the entire semester. The dates for examinations as follows:
